

Grange will Seek Listing for Building On Historic Register

At its April 18 meeting, Kendrick Grange instructed its Master to take preliminary steps toward the nomination of Kendrick's Fraternal Temple Building for listing in the National Register of Historic Places.

The National Register is a list of cultural resources worthy of preservation, including buildings which are significant in American history, architecture, and culture. The Temple Building's purpose, serving as the meeting place of fraternal organizations important to our rural history, is a chief reason for seeking this recognition.

Even as the Grange undertakes this latest step toward attempting to restore the Fraternal Temple building it is understandably disappointed to learn that the Northern Region Advisory Panel of the Idaho Community Foundation is not recommending to its Board Grants Committee that Kendrick Grange's request for restoration funding be approved.

Master Frank Jacobson, however, will for now pursue the matter of having a structural engineer assess the building's physical integrity for reasons of public liability if not as the first step in a projected restoration of the building. Funds for this needed professional service could be those ear-marked as matching funds had the grant been allowed.

Jacobson, who is not one to give up easily, is already considering other possible sources for funding and will pursue them if the Grange so desires.

The Grange will not be meeting on May 2 because of the Master's attendance at a meeting in Sun Valley. The next scheduled meeting is on May 16, a potluck to honor 50-year member Elsie Onstott, who twice now has not been able to make it to the celebration—once because of snow and ice, and last month because of a return bout with pneumonia. Pancake Feed May 7 To Help Keep Center Open for Community

The pancake breakfast to be held by Golden Sunset Seniors on Sunday, May 7, will help keep the doors of the J-K Senior Center open. Currently the expenses of maintaining this important community building very nearly equal the annual income of the Golden Sunset Seniors. Income for the period October 1993 through December of 1994 totaled \$6,925.80, while expenses were \$6,039.55. The year-end balance of \$886.25 quickly disappeared after the first of the new year as the seniors paid out \$964.00 for fire and liability insurance. It is, as the reader can see, a scramble just to keep even financially.

Expenses in that same fifteen month period included the following: Insurance, \$924.00 and janitor, \$1,378.00, totalling well over one-third of the total expenses. Utilities added up as follows: Washington Water Power \$1,486.78 (at the commercial rate, thank you, paid by downtown businesses, about one-third more than the household rate), City of Kendrick, \$607.99 (now at \$42.00 monthly); and telephone, \$381.19, for a sub-total of \$2,475.96, very nearly 42% of total expenses. And, finally, under the board heading of building operations is some \$176.40 spent on equipment and/or equipment maintenance, about 10% of the overall expenses. An additional \$597.29 went toward miscellaneous expenses.

To sum up the foregoing, about nine dollars out of every ten in expenses goes toward keeping the doors to the Senior Center open for community use.

We include all of these figures not out of a desire or need to complain but rather to make you, the general public, aware of the importance of your participation in this and other money-raising efforts of Golden Sunset Senior Citizens. Without your help throughout the year, we could not keep the doors open. Thanks for being there for us and community in the past—and thanks for planning now to join us on Sunday, May 7.

type of headache you have. Chronic headaches tend to fall into 3 categories: tension-type, migraines and cluster headaches. Tension headaches are thought to be caused by the tightening of the muscles of the scalp and face, usually as a result of stress or bad posture, and can last for days or even weeks. Migraines are typically characterized by sudden, severe pain on one side of the head, nausea or vomiting and sensitivity to light, sound and odor. They are generally disabling for several hours or more. Cluster headaches, a blessedly rare type of headache, cause intense pain behind one eye and may wake the sufferer nightly for periods of weeks or months.

Medications are roughly divided into two categories, continued Galer. There are symptomatic medications, which are taken at the onset of a headache. These may be analgesics, like aspirin, or they can be drugs designed to ward off a particular type of headache, such as ergotamine for migraines. The second category are called prophylactic medications, because they are taken daily to avert the onset of headaches. These include high blood pressure medications, like propranolol and calcium channel blockers, and other neuroactive drugs, such as tricyclic antidepressants.

Galer is also seeing people who are getting "rebound headaches", headaches that occur from taking too much pain medication. He works with patients to gradually wean them from their overuse. To avoid the rebound headache syndrome, Galer advises that you never take more than eight doses of pain medication per

month for your headaches. "The key to successfully keeping your headaches at bay is to keep working with your physician to find the right kind of drugs, or even combination of drugs, that alleviate your symptoms," said Galer. "New drugs, like sumatriptan, a highly effective migraine reliver, are being developed and studied all the time. Also, complementary treatments, like biofeedback for stress reduction, and dietary precautions, can make a world of difference in the intensity, duration and frequency of your headaches."

Galer and his colleagues are experimenting with a new technique to relieve chronic muscle tension headaches by inducing intramuscular stimulation using an acupuncture needle. Patients with chronic tension headaches who are interested in these experiments are invited to call the Headache Clinic, (206) 548-4476 for a screening interview.
