Harold A. LaBolle, 95, Dies April 30

Harold A. LaBolle, 95, a longtime Deary-area farmer, died of causes related to age Sunday, April 30 at Moscow Care Center.

He was born Jan. 12, 1900, on the family farm near Deary to Alfred and Sarah Tout LaBolle. He attended school on Texas Ridge.

Until his mother's death in 1937, he lived with his parents and helped operate the family farm.

During World War 11 he served in the US Army.

Following his discharge he returned to the family farm.

He continued to farm and raise cattle on Texas Ridge until retiring in the early 1970s.

For a time he lived at Juliaetta before moving to Moscow in 1983. He had lived at the care center since 1990.

He never married. Two brothers and a sister died previously.

A graveside service was held on Wednesday at the Elwood Cemetery on Texas Ridge near Deary. Sister Bernadette Marie Walters, OSU, officiated.

Theodore Kleth, 92, Former Area Resident, Dies May 1

Theodore O. Kleth, 92, a longtime Deary-area farmer, died of causes related to age Monday at Latah Health Services at Moscow.

He was born May 13, 1902, at Yankton, S. D., to Albert and Mary Elde Kleth. When he was 5 years old the family moved to Kendrick where he grew up and attended schools.

He married Eunice Swan on Mar. 1, 1932, at Asotin.

During the Depression he worked on construction projects and helped build the Helgeson Hotel at Orofino.

The couple lived at Kendrick for a time before moving to Deary in the late 1930s.

They farmed southwest of Deary until moving to Lewiston in 1980. He continued to work as a carpenter.

His wife died in October 1981 and he moved to Moscow about five years ago to be near his daughter.

He enjoyed carpentry work, flower gardening and spending time with his family.

He is survived by his daughter, LeeAnn Colberg of Moscow; four sisters, Marie Kay and Esther Oslund, both of Lewiston, and Othello Morrison and Mildred McGraw, both of Moscow; and a granddaughter.

Three brothers, two sisters and a grandson died previously.

There will be a graveside service at Lewis-Clark Memorial Gardens at Lewiston Thursday morning at 10. The Rev. John Blom of Emmanuel Lutheran Church at Moscow will officiate.

Infant, Child Development Screening and Kindergarten Registration

The Kendrick School District will be providing a free development year screening for all ages 0-6 years old on Friday, May 12. The screening will be held at the Juliaetta Elementary School from 9 a. m. to 2:30 p. m.

This screening will be informative and is meant for every infant and child. This is not just for infants and children with suspected delays.

Each child's skills will be checked in the areas of speech and language, gross and fine motor skills, basic concepts, social skills, self-help skills, and vision and hearing testing. The children will be asked to take part in play activities which will determine developmental levels. The entire screening process takes approximately 45 minutes for infants and 1½ hours for pre-schoolers. The results will be shared with the parent when the screening activities are completed.

School Supt. Discusses May 16 Override Election

On Tuesday, May 16, tax payers will be asked to approve a \$220,000 override levy election for Joint District No. 283. Supt. of Schools Eldon Taylor said he has been asked questions from patrons and to help understand the levy, he has listed a few of the more frequently asked inquiries and answers them here.

Question:
Will a \$220,000 override levy increase one's property tax, living within the boundaries of Kendrick school District No. 283?

Answer:
The honest answer to this is "yes" and "no". Yes, the override levy itself will increase the override levy from \$190,000 (1994-95 tax year) to \$220,000 (1995-1996 tax year). No, your overall property tax total will go down because of the "property tax relief bill", H. B. 156, passed by the 1995 legislature. The total property tax relief bill will pass on a \$62,400 savings to District No. 283 patrons. Consequently, \$62,400 tax relief, minus \$30,000 supplemental override increase, will result in an overall tax decrease of \$32,400 to District No. 283 patrons.

Question:
Why is a \$30,000 increase needed?

Answer:
It is needed to off-set the costs of S. B. 1560 and S. B. 1494 that went into effect the first of this current school year, July 1, 1994. The effect of Senate Bill 1560 was both good and bad to Kendrick Jt. School District No. 283. There was no way that the local taxpayers could have picked up several hundred thousand dollars of tax burden of the state's new experience and education index that is now paid at the state level. Likewise, it allowed Kendrick district to increase its certified staff by 3, lower class size, meeting special needs students, and adding art and girl's P. E. at the 7-12 level. However, the reimbursement of FICA and PERSI (state retirement) benefits no longer paid at the state level (school lunch, federally funded and transportation employees), will come to a total of \$24,505 according to our best calculations. Another major unexpected expense of Senate Bill 1560 was the loss of July and August 1994 FICA and PERSI reimbursement. Local districts were on an accrual method of accounting and the state on a cash method of accounting for these benefit expenses. Consequently, District No. 283 lost \$25,703 in this switch over in distribution of state educational dollars.

The effect of Senate Bill 1494 cost District No. 283 an additional \$14,080 above the former expenditures for medical benefit to those classified employees over 20-hours per week at a pro-rated amount at this year's rate.

Question:
How does this year's override levy amount compare with surrounding school district's overrides?

Answer:
The following figures come from the State Department of Ed Tax Levies for School Purposes 1994-95:

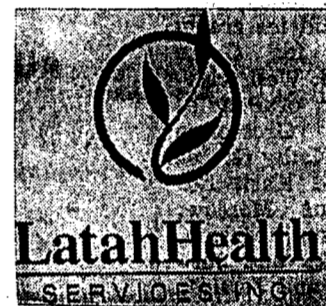
