

## Override Tax Levy Vote Is May 16

Next Tuesday, voters in Kendrick Jt. School District No. 283 will go to the polls to vote or reject a \$220,000 override levy. In an effort to explain just how important this issue is to the community, Supt Eldon Taylor has taken two of the more frequently asked questions and explains them here.

Why are some districts able to reduce overrides and others, such as ours, have to raise theirs?

Answer: Each district is unique in Idaho on what their local needs are: Whitepine is keeping/ their override the same as last year but are asking their voters for a \$75,000 plant facility levy in addition to their maintenance and operation override. Potlatch has a student enrollment increase of 50 students which generates more state monies and therefore feels they can lower their override. We compared the 1994-95 school overrides in the Gazette last week. Since we have budgeted so closely the past 7 or 8 years to keep quality education at the lowest amount of dollars to the taxpayer, we do not have a cushion for unexpected expenditures. Because of the additional costs created by Senate Bills 1560 and 1494 reported in last week's Gazette, we have to pass the \$30,000 plus expenditures on to the taxpayers. At the time of this Gazette article, override levies for the 1995-96 school year for the same districts listed last week are:

How much will the \$30,000 increase in the maintenance and operations supplement override going to cost us?

Answer: As you remember from last week's article, we have two things occurring at the same time. The M&O override will increase one's taxes by 47/1000 of market value but because of the 1995 legislative H. R. 156 going into effect at the same time, which will relieve the property tax by 95c/\$1000 of market value, the bottom line will be a 48c reduction in property tax.

Therefore the following are examples of this increase and decrease for various categories of properties yielding a net decrease.

## Heart Attack Claims Daisy T. Hoidal, 73

A funeral for Daisy T. Hoidal, a longtime Troy area farmer, was held Monday at Short's Funeral Chapel in Moscow. The Rev. Marc Stroud of the Zion Lutheran Church at Deary and the Rev. Kathy Williams of Elmore United Methodist Church near Moscow officiated.

Mrs. Hoidal died of a heart attack at age 73 Wednesday, May 3.

She was born April 15, 1922, at Deary to Henry and Laura Olson Femreite. She grew up on Texas Ridge between Deary and Kendrick and attended Buchhorn School near her home. She graduated from Deary High School in 1940 as valedictorian of her class.

She is survived by two brothers, Jerry, of Kendrick, and Ronald of Filer, Idaho and numerous nieces and nephews. She was predeceased by a brother, Deryl.






