

Harris, Browning Re-Elected Trustees

By certificate of election the Board of Trustees of Kendrick Joint School District No. 283 took action at their regular board meeting May 11 to declare Doug Harris, Zone 4 Trustee (rural Latah County), and Gary Browning, Zone 1 Trustee (Juliaetta west of school street and rural Latah County west of Juliaetta to the Nez Perce County border) duly elected. This action was taken as a result of a relatively new law, 33-502B Idaho Code, which makes it permissible for a board of trustees to save the election expenses if there are no declared or write-in candidates, to declare the one filed candidate the winner and cancel the election. As of July 1, 1994, the legislature amended this section to make it mandatory a board of trustees cancel an election to save election expenses.

Kindergarten to Senior Students Invited to Math/Science Night

Thursday, May 18, is Family Math/Science Night at Kendrick High School. You can try to solve puzzles, view science project displays, and/or make slime. It will be in the math and science rooms (1, 2, & lab) from 6 to 9 p.m. Drop by anytime.

There is a saying to help distinguish the sciences:

If it's green and slimy, it's biology.

If it stinks, it's chemistry.

If it doesn't work, it's physics.

There are exceptions to everything. Teachers, Miss Cozort (biology-chemistry, math), and Mr. Blount (physics, math), invite you to learn about a few.

What's good about slime? Biological slime (algae) produces megatons of oxygen. It is the first line of food chains throughout the biosphere. Chemical slime has a bad name, too—toxic or "ghostbuster" waste. Slime is actually a great innovation and source of inspiration.

Slime is a polymer. Polymers are long chains of repeating molecules. In your body, amino acids repeat to make proteins. Starches are polymers of sugar(s). Synthetic compounds from fossil fuels are linked to make strong flexible polymers such as vinyl, polypropylene, nylon and plastics. You've heard of polymers in advertising for car products, beauty aids and other products. Now is your chance to make your own in any color.

This is a family event. Admission is a family member. Children K-12 must have an adult to attend. Adults must present a student. Grab a pal from another generation, see what the new generation of science and education is offering, and get "slimed".

Override Levy Passes With Large Margin

Continuing a long tradition of support, voters of Kendrick Joint School District No. 283 went to the polls Tuesday, May 16 and approved a \$220,000 override levy by an 82.8% margin. Of the 187 votes cast, 155 were Yes votes and 32 were No votes.

Supt. of Schools Dr. Eldon Taylor said Tuesday evening after the ballots had been counted, both he and the board of trustees "appreciate the continued support of the patrons of the district." "We are very pleased," he added.

72 votes cast: Yes, 55, No, 17, 76% Cameron: 29 votes cast: Yes, 25, No 4, 86%.

Albert Lawrence residence: 10 votes cast. Yes, 8; No 2, 80%.

In May, 1946 he married Pearl Flesham Long. They made their home at Bates, Oregon, where he continued woods work until about 1955. They moved to Raton, New Mexico then later to Amarillo where he drove freight trucks for Red Ball until his retirement in 1982.

He and Pearl were divorced in 1985.

He took great pride in taking care of his yard and flowers. He enjoyed traveling and made a point to be in Kendrick many years for the Locust Blossom Festival. He was great to help others with yard work and odd jobs.

He is survived by one brother, Ray at Peck, Idaho; a nephew Randy of Meridian, Idaho; a sister Helen Hinrichs, and a nephew, Herman Hinrichs of Kendrick. A brother Paul passed away in 1959.

The registration system is routinely overworked on the first and the last day of every month. This causes considerable delay in issuing registrations. Increased system capacity is planned but may not be on line by the Memorial Day weekend rush. County offices traditionally register five times the normal amount of vehicles on the Friday (May 26 this year) that starts the official Memorial Day weekend, reported registration services manager Herb Kinney.

"Registration fees do not decrease if you wait. If you want to avoid long lines and make certain everyone has an opportunity to get their

A Little Advance Planning Helps Same-Day Surgery Go Smoother

The next time you have surgery, odds are you'll be part of the fastest-growing trend in health care: same-day surgery. You arrive at the hospital in the morning, have surgery, and return home later in the day. While same-day surgery saves patients time and money, it also means patients must take more charge of their recuperation.

"Some of the surgeries we did as inpatient procedures just five months ago are now being handled in same-day surgery," explains Dianna Davis, nurse manager for the post-anesthesia care unit at the University of Washington Medical Center's Surgery Center. Davis says much of this change can be attributed to advances such as faster anesthetic agents. People are simply waking faster from surgery, and as a result are able to go home sooner.

Davis cautions against underestimating a surgical procedure simply because you're released just a few hours later. "Any time you receive anesthesia, there are risks involved," she explains. "It may leave you groggy for a good 24 hours after surgery, and you won't be functioning at full effectiveness during that time."

It's also important not to underestimate your recovery period. "Just because you go home just a few hours after surgery doesn't mean you're ready to resume your normal activities," Davis cautions. "Patients should think about what they would be doing if they had stayed in the hospital following surgery. You wouldn't be cooking dinner, or strolling the supermarket aisles. You'd be in bed, resting, with people taking care of you. That's exactly what you should do at home."

Although pre- and post-operative preparation will vary depending on the procedure, there are some things everyone should do to prepare for same-day surgery.

— Recruit someone to spend at least the first 24 hours with you. The anesthesia may make you groggy for at least that long, and you'll need someone to make sure you get ample liquids and nourishment, take your medication on schedule, and help you get to the bathroom. Your caregiver will be better able to notice any post-operative problems that you might miss in your groggy state.

— Do a safety check around your house. Make sure you have a clear path from your bed to the bathroom. Use a night light or leave a light on to help you find your way at night.

— Stock the pantry. You can generally eat whatever you can tolerate as long as it's not restricted, although it's best to steer clear of greasy or spicy foods. Good choices include foods that are high in fiber, such as grains, fruits, or vegetables. Get plenty of your favorite juices; fluids are necessary to flush the anesthetic from your body.

— Decide where you'll be resting, and set up a table or tray where you can keep food, juices and other supplies handy to eliminate trips to the kitchen.

— Pick up some books to read while you recuperate, or stop by the neighborhood video store and rent some movies.

— If you have children, find someone who can care for them while you recuperate. Not only will you be physically tired, you'll also be mentally "fuzzy" and shouldn't be responsible for child care.

— Since it's recommended that you keep the surgery site above the level of your heart to reduce swelling, round up enough pillows to help with

If you'll be unable to walk unassisted after surgery, Davis recommends practicing with crutches beforehand because it's easier to learn to handle crutches when you aren't groggy and don't have an IV line in one of your hands. By the same token, if the surgery will be on your dominant hand, you might want to practice writing with your other hand.

Davis also warns that well-meaning family and friends can do more harm than good, especially if their constant calls and visits keep you from getting the rest you need to recover. If friends really want to help, Davis suggests asking them to bring you a particular dish for dinner, or rent a movie for you to watch. They'll feel good for having helped and you'll be getting the help you really need.
