It's also important not to under estimate your recovery period. 'Just because you go home just a few hours after surgery doesn't mean you're ready to resume your normal activities," Davis cautions. Although pre- and post-operative preparation will vary depending on the procedure, there are some things everyone should do to prepare for same-day surgery.

 Recruit someone to spend at least the first 24 hours with you. The anesthesia may make you grogneed someone to make sure you get ample liquids and nourishment, take your medication on schedule, and help you get to to the bathroom. Your caregiver will be better able to notice any post-operative problems that you might miss in your groggy state.

- Do a safety check around your house. Make sure you have a clear path from your bed to the bathroom. Use a night light or leave a light on to help you find your way at night. - Stock the pantry. You can generally eat whatever you can tolesate as long as it's not restricted, although it's best to steer clear of greasy or spicy foods. Good choices include foods that are high in fiber, such as grains, fruits, or vegetables. Get plenty of your favorite juices; fluids are necessary to flush the anesthetic from your body.
