## A Sister Remembers . . .

Carrie Cook Ampaugh, a teacher and educator for over 40 years, passed away Feb. 12 at Lewiston of Leukemia. Here is a little remembrance of her.



It was September, 1946, I was 6 years old and starting first grade at Juliaetta Elementary School. Carrie Bell was 17 and off to teacher's college at N. I. C. E. at Lewiston, Idaho. I watched as she and Mama put labels on her clothes, packing her Lane cedar chest she had received for high school graduation. Mother had just had twin babies in July and was expecting her first grandchild in October. Carrie knew daddy needed her on the large 1200 acre ranch but she also knew she needed to make a way for herself. After that she was home at holidays and birthdays and summer vacations. She took me to my first movie, "Circus", trips and vacations. She took us out to eat, for haircuts and shopping. Once, when I was 12 and she was 23, I was looking for a dress for choir. The sales clerk came up and said, "Your daughter has looked at everything in the store and doesn't seem to be able to find a thing." Carrie grabbed me by the arm and said, "We're not buying anything here!"

Once, daddy sent her down in the canyon to bring the milk cows home. When a coyote lured her two farm dogs into a deep pool of water and tried to drown them, Carrie got off her horse and waded in with a big rock and hit the coyote over the head. The dogs finished him off and she threw him across the saddlehorn and brought him up to the barn to skin. After all, she got \$5 a pelt in those days.

Ridge in 1870. Roberta's first love has always been "the ranch" . . . complete with cattle, horses, dogs, geese, chicken, and other farm animals. She has ridden many a mile horseback and truly loves horses and the beautiful setting nature provides.

Reminiscing her grade school experiences, Roberta tells of a particular young man who sat behind her and liked to pull her long curls. One day, having had enough, she jumped up, slapped him out of his chair, and cussed him all the way to the floor. The teacher was completely aghast at her behavior and ordered her to the principal's office. When the principal demanded to know when a nice young lady like her had learned language like that, she was quick to reply, "from my Dad and uncle (Eldon McKee.)"

Another time, she recalls, a neighbor, Fred Bailey, offered some valuable advice. By now she was in high school and she had red hair and lots of freckles. Fred asked if she wanted to get rid of the freckles. She replied in the affirmative, he than gave her the secret remedy. If she would smear on a fresh "cow pie", the freckles would disappear. She launched into the mission, quickly finding and smearing on the miracle mud. She showed up at home much later with her face covered with the secret recipe. Her mother demanded to know what was on her face. She blurted out, "Just fresh cow manure." Her mother swept her up and scrubbed her unmercifully until all evidence was removed.

Besides Roberta, Everett and Maybelle also had a son Nolan. Nolan married Adele Beckvoild. After Nolan's death, she moved to California.

Roberta had one child, Gary Abbott born to her and her husband Reed Abbott. Gary was born Dec. 20, 1937, and who died of cancer five years ago. He was 53, which incidentally was the same age his father died of cancer, and ironically the same age that Nolan, Roberta's brother, died of the same disease.

She worked for twenty-eight years at Potlatch Forests, Inc. as a computer programmer, before retiring in 1979. She was affectionately referred to as "Blindy" by all her co-workers.

Roberta, to, has shown courage in the face of much illness. She has had cancer 5 times in he past 27 years. She has survived two heart attacks and two bouts of pneumonia. In spite of all this, the doctors assure her she very healthy. She related to me that she "only has two of her original parts left—her gallbladder and her teeth. Everything else is off or out."

Anyone who knows Roberta knows Roberta knows that she loves a good laugh. She is somewhat of a spitfire who doesn't mind telling you exactly what's on her mind. She is admired for her courage and unique personality.

Besides the VFW Roberta belongs to the Eagles, Moose, and Elks Lodges, and the Order of the Rosacruition. She works with the Special Olympics.

Her escort for the day is her cousin Bob McKee from Spokane. He is retired from the Forest Service. His wife, Lyn, is researching the McKee and Riley family history.

Emil Silflow, prior to the debilitating stroke he experienced in 1992, was the one man you could always count on to not only be there, but to do more than his share of the work. His thoughtfulness and kindly nature are reflected in the number of people who call him friend. Emil has always worn cowboy boots prior to his illness, and even today he is

picking out just the right cowboy shirt and shining his cowboy boots for the Locust Blossom parade.

He has given to the community in an unselfish way as well. Many times the Lions Club would ask Emil and his brother, Harold, for use of the horses and/or sled to carry someone special down the street on parade day, or to just enter the parade for other's enjoyment. Few realize how many hours of preparation that requires.

Emil is on a first name basis with Santa Claus and many times saw it that he came to town in the stylish horse-drawn sled. He has provided happiness for young and old alike with horses and wagons or sled. Kids attending Bible School could count on a ride as well as older kids attending Senior Citizens. Any friend or neighbor had but to just ask to get a ride.

Speaking of horses, Harold related to me that he really believed that Emil's love of horses began way back when they were children living on the "home place" that is now the Marvin Silflow farm. They played "horses" constantly with small blocks of wood, clothespins, or even marbles. The game was played inside or outside the house. In the dirt field or in the barn, or anywhere. It wasn't the location that mattered. It began a lifelong love of horses that endures even to this day.

Emil was born to Fred and Ione Silflow at Cameron. He grew up with two brothers and a sister. Marvin, Emil and Harold, and Ida have given the old home place a memory or two. Harold relates that once, when his father had a batch of raisin wine in the making, he and Emil decided to have a taste or two. In the sampling process, they dropped and broke one gallon jug. While Harold strongly favored refilling the jug with water and setting it back on the shelf as if nothing had happened, Emil chose the path of honesty and adamantly declared that they would just tell their father and take the punishment (Harold believes to this day that was the longest day of his life . . . as they awaited the arrival of their parents who hear their confession and administer the proper razor-strap punishment.) Emil's way proved best. Upon hearing the confession, their father simply told the boys to go clean up the mess and go to their rooms.

Likewise, Emil's wife Doris has given countless hours of service to the church at Cameron as well as being a homemaker and raising their 3 sons, Fred, Gary, and Ron. A marriage that began with a blind date arranged by brother Harold's late wife, Mildred, has endured well over a half century. She met Emil while working as a secretary at Moscow. They were married at Brownwood, Texas, January 23, 1944. They lived a year there before Emil was shipped overseas in WWII.

The newlywed couple moved into a house in Leland. After living there for a few years, they built their own home (the present Fred Silflow home.) The couple farmed and ranched for 40 year prior to retiring in 1981. Being named "Grassman of the Year in 1971 was a real honor for Emil.

A good share of his life has been dedicated to the ongoing maintenance and ministry of his church, Cameron Emmanuel Lutheran, at Cameron. There are those who count the number of times someone has been elected to a church council position, or the number of times they taught a Sunday School class as the indication of how good a person they might measure up to being. Emil has held all kinds of offices and served his church unselfishly, not that he might gain recognition as a good person . . . but because he is a good person.
