Saturday morning. The victory was

especially sweet for Pastor Steve

Caskey, an experienced and enthusiastic runner, was never quite able to win "his" race before, but he managed it this year in a time of 36:22 minutes. Steve Rishling of Juliaetta placed second at 37:20 and Wayne Brown of Clarkston was 3rd at 40:05. Dawn Tucker of Kendrick was fourth and also the first woman finisher with a time of 42:04. Beth Caskey also competed, finishing in 51:25 minutes.

In the 2-mile run, Rob Parsells of Lewiston finished in 11:54 minutes to claim first place; Des O'Rourke, Fullman came in second at 12:06 and Richard Gleesner of Deary finished third in 12:27.

There were a total of 24 runners.

Kendrick's baseball team won the Idaho Class A-3/A-4 State Baseball championship over the weekend at Ontario, Oregon. The Tigers won games from Nampa Christian Thursday, from Frith Friday and rallied to defeat Homedale for the title on Saturday afternoon. The team compiled an 18-4 record on its way to the championship.

Phil Brown swung the big bat in Thursday's opening game against Nampa Christian. Brown, a KHS senior drove in six runs with two home runs, including a grand slam in the fourth inning that broke the game open.

Brown, who has six homers on the year, put Kendrick ahead 7-0 in the fourth when he took the first pitch and put it over the 350-foot mark in left-center field. He then added a two-run shot in the sixth down the left-field line as Kendrick ended the game in the sixth because of the 10-run rule.

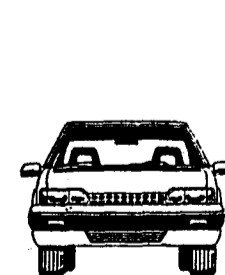

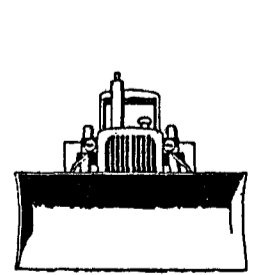

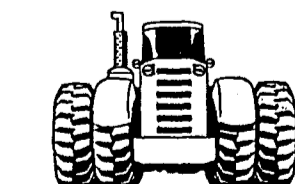
