This flight, however, he did not sit in the pilot's seat as he often did with his flying friend, Ivan Gustin, for so many years. This time it was Brock Hill (owner of Dennis Flying Services), who was at the controls, and Carrie Minden, Brock's daughter, who were his flying companions for the day. Adventurous? "You bet!" Doc would often say in his younger years. Going flying was dream of Doc's, and this is how his adventure came about.

When Carrie Minden, one of the nursing assistants at Latah Care Center (now Latah Health Services), and a co-worker, Denise Frame, found out that Doc had been quite a flyer most of his life (mainly hunting, flying into Buffalo Hump back country and other areas), Carrie suggested to her father, Brock Hill, to take Doc flying once again. Brock willingly took the time to take Doc flying on the afternoon of February 4, over Moscow and Kendrick (Doc's hometown), then over Lewiston, and back.

Carrie and Denise transferred Doc from his wheelchair into the plane and back out again after the plane

ride was over. The transfers were challenging, because Doc is primarily bound to his wheelchair, but they did it. Doc's slower paced lifestyle at the Care Center had a tremendous boost that afternoon. Not long after Doc's flight opportunity, other family members, Doc's granddaughter Sonja, and Neil Atkinson, made arrangements for him to attend the Lionel Hampton Jazz Festival at the University of Idaho.

Bethany Memorial Chapel Held Memorial Day Services

Members of the Bethany Memorial Chapel Association and friends met on Monday, May 30, for the annual Memorial Day service and potluck dinner held at the Lutheran church on Big Bear Ridge. About 60 were in attendance.

Stan Cox, president of the association gave a brief history of the church building.

In May, 1903, the building site and adjacent cemetery was selected by the early Norwegian settlers in the area. The church was finished in late 1905 or early 1906 and the congregation was incorporated Jan. 8, 1912. On Dec. 6, 1979 the Bethany Lutheran Chapel was placed on the register of National Historical Places in the United States by the Dept. of Interior. Mr. Cox worked with others to make this possible and the Bethany Memorial Chapel Association was formed.

Cox reminded those at the Memorial Service that our forefathers gave their lives in battle in wars throughout the world in order that we might have peace. He also noted that our Pledge of Allegiance was written in 1892, written especially at that time for children to commemorate the celebration of Columbus Day in public schools throughout the nation. That year it is estimated that more than 10 million American school children recited the Pledge of Allegiance that Columbus Day.

The principal speaker was Pastor Jim Miller of the Southwick Community Church, who remembered for the group that the first recorded Memorial Day celebration was found in Exodus 13:3. He asked that we not forget what Christ has done for us. He paid the price for us when he took upon himself to die on that cross for us.

Those bringing the music were: Clarence Johnson, several numbers on the accordion; Ron Jones and son Justin, with guitar; Betty Chisholm and Margarette Cox, with Omni Chord. The group sang several selections accompanied on the old pump organ by Ruth Silnd, who has been playing in this church and at other functions in the community for 65 years.

There were people from Spokane, Kennewick, California, Moscow, Lewiston, Clarkston, Coeur d'Alene and local communities attending.

Hope for Branch Rail Line Revived ... Again

Every time your writer crosses over the newly painted RR J-ing sign on the highway out of town, he wonders if the Highway Department folks know something we don't concerning the abandoned rail line that passes through Kendrick-Juliaetta.

Apparently all is not lost yet according to the Moscow-Latah County Economic Development Council's latest newsletter. Recently, according to that publication, the Port of Lewiston and the Port of Whitman County invited interested shippers to discuss the fate of the Moscow to Arrow Junction branch rail line. Idaho and Washington State Department of Transportation representatives were also present.

This segment, although abandoned, has been identified as the key segment of rail that provides the link between grain and wood product shipments. Combining the traffic from the two commodities would provide the greatest opportunity for a short line railroad to operate profitably in the Palouse—and for our local community development association to revise its long-range plan regarding the railroad right-of-way.

Because of the pending merger between the Burlington Northern and the Santa Fe railroads, concern has been expressed that the BN would pull the tracks. There are two regional railroads operating in the area that have expressed a desire to operate over the line, and the shipper on the line, including those in Kendrick and Juliaetta, have a keen interest in seeing the line re-opened.

Those present at the meeting appointed a committee to work with the manager of the Port of Lewiston to come up with a plan to present the BN. Our own George Brocke serves on that committee. We look forward to his keeping his community informed concerning the committee's progress.
