State Engineers Tell of Plan for Reconstruction of Kendrick Main Street

Reconstruction of that portion of State Highway 3, which serves as Kendrick's Main Street is scheduled to begin by July 1 of next year, if not sooner, State Transportation Department engineers told a group of residents Tuesday evening at a public meeting in the Kendrick Fire Hall. Over 30 interested persons attended the meeting. "Basically we're just replacing what's there," said project engineer for District 2, Jim Carpenter, who is himself a Kendrick area resident.

Carpenter also gave a brief update on the state's plans to improve all of Highway 3 from Arrow Bridge

on through to the Little Bear Creek Bridge east of Kendrick, work that will be ongoing until the year 2000.

Doug McAtee, a District Design Engineer, told the audience that the Tuesday meeting was, "to provide information on what's going on" as the state proceeds with its current project—which is estimated to cost \$750,000 and reconstruct this .8 of a mile which is Kendrick's Main Street. There will be no major changes in the size of the street and no land acquisitions are planned. The street will continue to have 2, 12-foot travel lanes, with parking space on the sides ranging from 8 to 12 feet. The road height will be taken down to eliminate the "crown" that has developed from repeated seal coating and patching over the years. Old curbs will be removed and new ones installed and a new storm sewer system will be put in. In answer to concerns previously expressed about damage to trees along Main Street, the engineers said that, at most, only five trees will be affected by this project.

In order to get a good job done on the street, Carpenter said, it will be necessary to see that the street has a good base. This will require digging down in certain sections at least three feet. There would be little use of putting a good surface on the highway if it doesn't have the base to support it, Carpenter said.

A major question mark in the plans to reconstruct the highway is the condition of the city's water and sewer lines that will be under the highway. It is known that much of this system is old and in poor shape at present time. The state does not want to go to the time and expense of building a new road over utilities that will probably need repair and replacement. The state asks for assurance that the utilities under the new highway to have a 25-year expected life. This means the city is facing a project to replace its existing lines that provide water and sewer service along Main Street before the road work is completed. Kendrick Mayor Jerry Brown said after the meeting that the city is making every effort to determine the exact condition of these utilities, what the extent of repairs will be necessary and how the work can be financed.

Asked what the State will do if the city cannot provide the required good utility systems by the time the state is ready to begin its reconstruction work, Carpenter replied, "We'll just patch". Indicating the city will not get its new, well-built highway, but will have to be satisfied with a continuation of the present patch-up maintenance.

Income Survey to be Conducted in Kendrick

Members of the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Assoc. will conduct an income survey of Kendrick residents on Monday, July 24th as part of an effort to determine if the city can qualify for a financial grant from the state to help pay its share of improvement and repair of water and sewer lines prior to the reconstruction of State Highway 3. Members will be going door-to-door on the 24th between the hours of 1:00 and 3:00 p. m. and again from 7:00 to 9:00 p. m.

Residents will be asked to respond ANONYMOUSLY to a few simple questions concerning household size and annual income ranges.

This survey will assist the City of Kendrick in determining eligibility for federal funding of the City's portion (sewer and water utilities) of the renovation of Main Street.

Next week's Gazette will carry a sample of the form to be completed and a more precise schedule.

If sufficient interest exists, then a meeting would be arranged for planning and discussion with Latah County Deputy Steve Jarvis. Time and date of such a meeting would be announced later.
