## Despite Facts, Rumors Persist On Main Street

Despite last week's thorough review of plans for the reconstruction of Kendrick's Main Street, rumors continue to circulate. Two examples: "There will be no parking on Main Street". And, "Your water bill will go up a hundred dollars a month." Don't you believe it!

No one has reason to circulate or believe such nonsense after the detailed presentation made by Idaho Department of Transportation engineers at the July 11 meeting in Kendrick's Fire Hall. Check Bill Roth's story in last week's Gazette if you want the facts.

True, discussion concerning the replacement of water and sewer lines under Main Street did not touch on costs. The reason: Results of the engineering study are not in yet. How can one calculate costs if one is unable to spell out what is required to bring the system to the standard required by the Transportation Department? What will it take to be able to say to the state of Idaho, "Yes, our water and sewer lines under Main Street have an assured life expectancy of 25 years."

After a broad outlining of future plans for Highway 3 to the year 2,000 and a detailed review of plans for the reconstruction of Main Street, the state's engineering representatives responded to questions and concerns about the project. The give-and-take between the audience and the engineers was wide-ranging and at all times civil and respectful. Even the project's biggest critics were on their best behavior.

A major issue, of course, was that of the need to replace the water and sewer lines. In a variety of ways various persons tried to discover some "wiggle room" in the State Transportation Board's policy. It was pointed out that the "owner" of the utilities system must pay the cost of proving that the system is sound. As the speaker put it, so far as the Highway folks are concerned, "They're all bad unless you can prove otherwise."

Another speaker tried to negotiate approval for a utilities system that is, while not 100%, say 50 or 60% sound. No sale. Another ploy was to ask for confirmation that the Transportation Board could grant a variance while a legal possibility, replied district engineer Jim Carpenter, he would never support such an application for variance. "I would not waste Idaho taxpayers' money on a less than quality project." Emphasizing that the Main Street project is a partnership and that good solid design should be the object, Carpenter stressed that the entire structure is designed to last many years.

One possibility that no one introduced for discussion was that of the Burlington Northern in fact pulling out—period—and leaving the railroad right-of-way as a possible new route for traffic around Kendrick. One person recalls that in earlier conversations the Transportation Department had talked about the possibility of rerouting sections of Highway 3 along that right-of-way. Whether this is even a faint possibility remains to be seen as local forces attempt to rejuvenate the idea of a short line from Moscow to Arrow.

True to their plan, Kendrick City Council members present did not get into any discussion regarding the utilities replacement project. From their point of view, they don't know enough at present—a position they surely don't enjoy. One other party not heard from at the meeting was CEDA, the economic development agency. The concern in that quarter is that Kendrick may not qualify for grant money to help pay for the project. Things are so grim that thought is even being given to the possibility of Kendrick's qualifying for what is called a slum/blight grant—comparable to what the state calls an imminent peril grant.

However all of this finally sorts out, one thing seems clear to your reporter and that is that this crisis in city government and finance has been a coming. Like many small towns in Idaho and across the country, Kendrick has been very slow to acknowledge ownership of the problem. Keeping taxes low and just getting by sooner or later catches up with you. And those with funds to give away at the state and Federal level do not look kindly on those cities with an inadequate record of putting money aside to deal with infrastructure crises when they arise.

Meanwhile, readers are encouraged to challenge the nonsense being spread by rumor-mongers. Get the facts. It would be a big help if the City of Kendrick could mount the Transportation Department's detailed map of the Main Street project and make it available for public viewing at the Fire Hall. At present it's locked up, hardly the way to share public information.

## Income Survey to be Conducted In Kendrick July 24

Members of the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Assoc. will conduct an income survey of Kendrick residents on Monday, July 24th.

The City of Kendrick is conducting this survey to obtain information necessary to apply for an Idaho Community Development Block Grant to partially fund improvements to the municipal water and sewer system. The public's cooperation is essential for the city's block grant application.

All responses to this survey will be kept confidential.

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

**CITY OF JULIAETTA, IDAHO SUMMARY OF ORDINANCE NO. 95-5**

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, A MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE STATE OF IDAHO, PROVIDING FOR REGULATIONS FOR MANUFACTURED HOUSING AND MOBILE HOMES; PROVIDING STANDARDS; PROVIDING FOR REPEAL OF ANY INCONSISTANT PROVISIONS; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Ordinance, which governs placement of mobile homes and manufactured housing, was passed by the City Council and approved by the Mayor the 27th day of June, 1995. Section 1 provides for the Ordinance to apply to all mobile homes and

manufactured homes placed in the Section 2 provides regulation and conditions of placement for manufactured and mobile homes 22 feet or more wide on residential lots.

Section 3 provides for regulation and conditions of placement for manufactured and mobile homes less than 22 feet wide.

Section 4 provides for regulation and conditions of placement for manufactured and mobile homes within mobile home parks.

Section 5 requires permits for placement of manufactured and mobile homes.

Section 6 requires a permit for repair and remodeling of mobile homes.

Section 7 provides for appeal of any decision of the building inspector.

Section 8 repeals inconsistent provisions.

Section 9 provides that violations are misdemeanors and provides penalties.

Section 10 provides on effective date. I hereby certify that the foregoing is a true and complete summary of Ordinance No. 95-5 and provides adequate notice of the contents of Ordinance to the public. The full ordinance is on file with the Julia-

**Calories Still Count  
When Eating Low- or  
Non-Fat Foods**

It used to be easy to distinguish non- or low-fat food products from their original counterparts. Bland flavor, irregular consistency and limited choices left many people with a bad taste in their mouth.

Today, thanks to product research and improved low-cal sweeteners, dieters don't need to sacrifice taste or selection when cutting down on fat intake. From ice cream and cheese to cookies and cakes, low-fat food looks and tastes good—almost too good.

"If the product is low in fat, some people feel they can eat without concern," says Brenda Buck, research dietitian for the University of Washington at the Northwest Lipid Research Clinic.

A low-fat reading on a product's nutrition label, Buck explains, can fuel "guilt-free" eating habits, causing dieters to indulge in a few more crackers, another scoop of ice cream or a dollop more of mayonnaise. But when it comes to stepping on the

scale, it's the calories—not the fat—that really counts.

Calories, derived from proteins, carbohydrates and fats, are burned by the body to produce energy. Excess calories, which are consumed through foods but not used for energy, are stored in the body as fat. Because fat is a highly-concentrated source of calories, cutting down on fat intake may result in weight loss. However, Buck explains, people who eat larger portions of low- or fat-free foods can end up consuming the same amount of total calories and find they don't lose weight.

A study comparing an average American diet with a low-fat, increased-consumption diet illustrates the point. The average diet, including 2 percent milk; the use of regular butter, mayonnaise, and salad dressing; and snack items such as a doughnut, fried chips, cookies and ice cream, totaled 2,738 calories a day and 34.63 percent fat.

The low-fat diet, on the other hand including skim milk; the use of low-fat mayonnaise, non-fat cream cheese and salad dressing; and snack items including baked chips and reduced-fat cookies and ice cream, totaled 2,736 calories and 9.67 percent of fat. Extra calories in the low fat diet were accounted for by a few extra cookies and chips, a tablespoon more of mayonnaise and a slightly larger portion of ice cream.

"A person would not lose weight on this low-fat diet because they would be eating the same amount of calories," Buck explains.

By remembering that fat-free does not mean calorie-free, dieters can make the right choices when deciding what, and how much to eat. The most important figures on a nutrition label, Buck says, are the amount of calories and the serving size. Because extra sugar, flour and starch thickeners can be included in reduced-fat foods to make them taste good, the amount of calories in these products may equal their standard counterparts.

Cutting down on fat intake is still a recommended step toward maintaining a healthy diet. Lower fat levels can, in turn, bring down cholesterol levels, reducing the risk of heart disease, and can also increase a person's energy. In addition, most reduced-fat products offer nutritional value similar to regular foods.
