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**Summer Safety for Your Furry Friends**

After being cooped up all winter long, it's fun to your pet enjoy the great outdoors. But our pets need special attention and care to avoid the potential dangers posed by heat, increased activity and other risks associated with the summer season. Dr. Barbara Deeb, assistant professor of comparative medicine at the University of Washington's School of Medicine and a Seattle veterinarian, offers these tips to help you keep your pets safe and healthy.

Heat exhaustion and heat stroke are the most serious problems that

pets encounter, said Deeb. Since our four-legged friends can't sweat, they are much less efficient than we are at cooling down. Add to that a permanent fur coat and you can see that even mild days can be uncomfortably warm for dogs, cats, rabbits, ferrets and other fauna.

Dogs are often victims of heat stroke because they will over-exert themselves to please their person, no matter what the temperature is. Try to schedule running, games of fetch or frisbee and other activities with your dog in the cooler morning and evenings, and always have water available, both for drinking and for pouring over the animal to cool it down.

Of course, a cat isn't likely to get heat stroke trying to please anyone. However, any animal that is confined to hot space with limited ventilation is at risk for heat stroke or exhaustion. If you're running errands on a hot day, leave your pet at home. Temperatures inside cars rapidly escalate, and even "just a few minutes" can be too long for an animal to wait in a hot car. And if you're traveling with a pet in a cage, such as a hamster or ferret, make sure that the cage is not in direct sunlight and that the animal has at least an air vent open near

Rabbits and ferrets in particular are very sensitive to high temperatures. Apartments with windows that face into the sun and no air conditioning can easily reach 85 degrees Fahrenheit on a hot day. You can provide a cool place for your pet by freezing plastic pop bottles of water and placing them around the animals' cage or sleeping area. Aim a fan at the bottles and voila! your pet has air conditioning.

Often a component of heat stress, over-exertion is another hazard that animals face. If Rover's been a couch potato all winter, don't expect him to take 25-mile hikes or go for long runs. Animals, like humans, need time to get back into shape. Remember too, that hot pavements are tough on even seasoned paw pads. If you do a lot of running with your pet on city streets, make sure you check its paw pads after every outing for abrasions, cuts and other injuries.

Water and boat safety rules apply to pets as well. Not all dogs (and certainly not many cats or rabbits) are good swimmers. If you have a swimming pool, make sure that either your pets can't get to it or that your pets are able to get out of it if they fall in.

If you take your animals boating with you, make sure that they have life jackets, too. The best kind of life jackets fits snugly (but not too tightly), is brightly colored and has a handle on the back so you can easily pluck your animal out of the water. Make sure that the jacket has the flotation material evenly distributed as well. Vests with too much buoyancy in the front can actually be dangerous for certain types of dogs and cats.

On hot days, our glacier-fed lakes and rivers feel pretty refreshing and

it's easy to let water-loving dogs swim longer than is healthy for them. Even in the summer, pets, like their owners, risk getting too cold (hypothermia) if they spend too much time in icy waters. Deeb advises that you make your animal take frequent breaks from swimming to avoid both exhaustion and hypothermia.

Hands down, the most consistently annoying summer problem is flea infestation, said Deeb. In addition to the skin irritation, fleas carry tapeworm larvae. Cats appear to be more susceptible to tapeworm infestation. Continued on Page 3

There are many products that are effective, but they must be used on a frequent and regular basis to discourage reinfestation. Pet owners might want to talk to their veterinarians about a new medication, "Program" (lufenuron), which is given once a month to pet and stops the flea life cycle. Used with other flea eradication strategies, this may help you avoid the summer flea circus.

**CITY OF JULIAETTA, IDAHO SUMMARY OF ORDINANCE NO. 95-5**

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, A MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE STATE OF IDAHO, PROVIDING FOR REGULATIONS FOR MANUFACTURED HOUSING AND MOBILE HOMES; PROVIDING STANDARDS; PROVIDING FOR REPEAL OF ANY INCONSISTANT PROVISIONS; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Ordinance, which governs placement of mobile homes and manufactured housing, was passed by the City Council and approved by the Mayor the 27th day of June, 1995.

Section 1 provides for the Ordinance to apply to all mobile homes and City after the effective date. manufactured homes placed in the Section 2 provides regulation and conditions of placement for manufactured and mobile homes 22 feet or more wide on residential lots.

Section 3 provides for regulation and conditions of placement for manufactured and mobile homes less than 22 feet wide.

Section 4 provides for regulation and conditions of placement for manufactured and mobile homes within mobile home parks.

Section 5 requires permits for placement of manufactured and mobile homes.

Section 6 requires a permit for repair and remodeling of mobile homes.

Section 7 provides for appeal of any decision of the building inspector.

Section 8 repeals inconsistent provisions.

Section 9 provides that violations are misdemeanors and provides penalties.

Section 10 provides on effective date. I hereby certify that the foregoing is a true and complete summary of Ordinance No. 95-5 and provides adequate notice of the contents of Ordinance to the public. The full ordinance is on file with the Juliaetta City Clerk and will be promptly provided to any citizen on personal request.
