## Lyons Return from Mid-Western Travels

Tuesday, July 25, Clem and Flo Lyons returned home from a 20-day trip which took them through eleven states, with the farthest point being Toledo, Ohio, where they attended the annual International Convention of the Automobile License Plate Collectors Association.

After four days at the convention, Flo and Clem were guests at the home of John and Norma Andree of Grand Rapids, Michigan, for several days of sight-seeing in their home area and then to the upper peninsula of Michigan, a vacation area for many of the residents of the Chicago area and surrounding cities. One day was spent touring historic Macinac Island where there are no automobiles used—transportation is on foot, by bicycle, or by horse drawn wagons of various sizes and types. The ferry boats from Macinac City used to reach the island was the only mechanized transportation used for that trip.

The Lyons' took the horse drawn carriage ride which passed the Grand Hotel, the Governor's summer cottage (actually a mansion), some miles through the forest, past historical points such as Fort Macinac which was established to protect the fur trading enterprises during the late eighteenth century and into the early nineteenth century. The wagons are quite comfortable, seating twenty passengers in the larger ones and drawn by either two or three horses, rubber tires, no less. Even the horses were shod with Poly-urethane pads on the steel shoes to save both the pavement and the horses' feet.

Next day, Clem and Flo traveled the six-mile long Mackinac Bridge which crosses the channel between Lake Michigan and Lake Huron enroute to the Andree's summer camp at De Tour Village at the lower end of the Saint Mary's River, the channel from Lake Superior to Lake Huron. Their last day in Michigan was spent on a tour to Sault Ste. Marie, site of the famous Soo Locks leading from Lake Superior.

During the time the Lyons were there, they were fortunate in seeing three of the gigantic freighters pass through the locks—one was over 600 feet in length, a medium-sized one was over 800 feet and the granddaddy was some over 1,000 feet long. There was a platform area where visitors could actually look down on the giants as they were moving through, probably less than a hundred feet from the viewers.

Enroute home, their first night was spent in a motel at Ashland, Wisconsin, where they were just a few feet from the waters of Lake Superior, which was the fourth of the Great Lakes which they had viewed in less than a week. Four nights later they were home, tired but happy to be back in Idaho. They had traveled 4,785 miles and the only road they traveled a second time was from Waunuch Gulch to their home.

## Neighborhood Watch Program Info Meeting Draws Interest

Almost fifty people from Kendrick, Juliaetta and rural areas were present at the Kendrick Grange Hall last Wednesday evening at an informational meeting on the possible establishment of a neighborhood watch program in the community. The program was presented by three officers from the Latah County Sheriff's Dept. and representatives of similar programs in nearby towns. Neighborhood Watch is part of a national program designed to help individual citizens help themselves prevent crime and is part of a response to the request of hundreds of law enforcement agencies for assistance in developing crime prevention programs based on citizen participation. Since 1972, the program has been funded by the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration of the U. S. Department of Justice.

Wednesday's meeting had been arranged by Mrs. Deana McGarvey of Juliaetta, who is acting as the local coordinator of the program in cooperation with the K-J Community Development Assoc. Also present at the meeting were Vern Moses, Steve Jarvis and Dock White, all Latah County Deputies, and Charles Bower, who also works with the sheriff's office. Moses the Chief Deputy from the department.

Also present was Marlene Spencer

of Pullman, who is involved with the neighborhood watch program in that town.

"This (the meeting), is the culmination of a lot of hard work on the part of the Sheriff's Department," Moses told the group. He and the other deputies appeared to be very impressed at the interest and attendance the meeting had created. Moses went on to explain how a neighborhood watch program might work, stressing that each community would be able to set up its own program as to how the program would be operated the hours each volunteer might work, what the goals would be and how it would be organized. Watch program may be operated in a number of ways, all depending on the desires and goals of the community. It could range either from just individuals watching from their home windows with a telephone number to call if they observe anything suspicious to volunteers who actually walk regular routes, watching for unusual behavior. Training and direction will be provided the audience was told, but "This will be your program—You are the eyes and the ears."

The deputies emphatically stressed that, "Block Watch is not a vigilante group." Moses added that the program is not designed to put the individual at risk.

Deputy Dock White, who lives and was raised in the Deary community touched briefly on some things business owners in a small town could do to curb shoplifting and petty theft, problems that are a continuous problem. "You have to mean what you say," White said. "If it happens, you've got to go through with it," he added, meaning that if someone is caught shoplifting or stealing, the owner has to be prepared to report the crime and press the charges with authorities.

Moses said that October is the goal to have a program set up in this area, if interest is great enough.

"By the first of the year we hope to have the whole county on the network," he added.

It is understood that Mrs. McGarvey will continue her efforts to work with those who want to see a neighborhood watch program established in the community. If there is sufficient interest, undoubtedly more meetings will be held. Mrs. McGarvey also has Neighborhood Watch registration forms available for those who didn't pick them up at the Wednesday meeting. She may be contacted at her home at 276-7461.

While the deputies quickly established a rapport with the audience, they did have to field some sharp questioning and comments from those present concerning why some individuals who are arrested for a crime are back out on the streets the next day, why response from the sheriff's office is slow or inadequate, and an apparent lack of follow-up procedures.

Whatever else may come from the meeting Wednesday, one point did come through loud and clear—there are many residents in the Kendrick and Juliaetta area who are deeply concerned with crime in the area and these people just might be willing to band together to help relieve the situation.






