Kendrick Schools Explain Free Milk, Food Policies

Kendrick Joint School District No. 283 this week announced its policy for free and reduced price meals and free milk for children unable to pay the full price for meals served under the National School Lunch Program and School Breakfast Program, and Special Milk Program. Kendrick High School's District Office has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

The following household size and income criteria will be used in determining eligibility. Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free and reduced price meals and free milk.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals or milk, households should fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available from the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials.

For school officials to determine eligibility, households receiving food stamps or AFDC must list the child's name, their food stamp or AFDC case number and the signature and name of an adult household member. Households not receiving food stamps or AFDC must list: Names of all household members; the name and Social Security number of the primary wage earner or the household member who signs the application, and the entire household income with the amount and source of the income received by each household member. The signature of the adult household member who signs the application certifies that the information provided is correct. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

Under the provisions of free and reduced price policy, Dr. L. Eldon Taylor, Supt., will review the applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official(s) may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official(s) on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal may make a request either orally or in writing to Douglas Harris, Kendrick, ID 83537, telephone 289-4622 for a hearing on the decision.

Households that list a food stamp case number must report when the household no longer receives these benefits. Other households approved for benefits are required to report increases in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the household must contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for benefits if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown below.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for school meal benefits. If a household wished to apply for benefits for foster children living with them, the household should contact the school for more information.

The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for the purposes of determining eligibility and verifying data.

In the operation of child feeding programs administered by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age, or handicap. If any member of a household believes he or she has been discriminated against he/she should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. 20250.

Grange to Wrestle With Its Future At Aug. 15 Meeting

Nine members of Kendrick Grange met last week and approved the text of a letter from its Master, Frank Jacobson, that has gone out to all its members. Because the future of the Grange—or its lack—will have an impact upon the community at large, the text of his letter appears below in the hope that our readers will also respond to Jacobson's challenge.

Dear Grange Members,
As the Master of your Grange, I want to share with you some concerns I have regarding the operation and future of Kendrick Grange No. 413.

As the membership of our Grange has aged, we have seen the inevitable loss that accompanies age. Unfortunately, despite the efforts of National Grange programs to attract new members, we in Kendrick have seen no growth. And as members move to retirement homes or are unable to physically to attend our meetings, our active participation has declined to the point where we are having difficulty just achieving the required quorum to conduct business—seven members. Quorums alone will not, of course, produce the man and woman power required to carry out Grange products. Without the resource of people the Grange cannot do its work.

Another issue that confronts our Grange is the condition of our Grange Hall, Kendrick's historic Fraternal Temple. Now in its tenth decade as the gathering place for fraternal societies, the building desperately needs attention to assure that it doesn't become a liability. Given the facts concerning our marked decline in active membership, there is no way that a handful of us can raise the funds necessary to repair and maintain the structure.

I invite you to give some thought to the concerns I've expressed here and either share your ideas with me in writing or come to our regular Grange meeting at 7:00 p. m. Tuesday, August 15, to discuss with us what we should do. The future of Kendrick Grange is in our hands. We must act.

The Grange also approved seeking a bid to repair the second and third story windows in the Fraternal Temple Building, those on the east side of the structure. This will be done not in an effort to begin restoration of the building but to respond to the demands of public liability. In recent weeks glass from upper story windows has fallen on the sidewalk below. Fortunately no one was present at the time!

Appearances suggest that the windows in this building have not been reglazed in over ninety years. Anticipating that the costs of reglazing might be prohibitively high, Jacobson will also get figures for wood coverup as a means of assuring public safety.

Earlier in the evening the Grange draped its charter in memory of departed member Joyce Dean who along with her husband Cecil was a long-time member of Deary Grange. Remembered as a Lecturer, Joyce had a dry sense of humor that helped her overcome the effects of a stroke early in life. She was always an active supporter of Grange activities. She will be missed.

The Grange finally approved the transfer of the ownership of the Pie House to the Search and Rescue unit, at the same time reserving the right to use it annually for the Locust Blossom Festival. Search and Rescue has not yet formally accepted the property.

Monday Ra'n Halts Harvest

Harvest operations in this area were getting a good start until a storm moved in drenching the ripe fields of grain and peas with almost an inch of rain and stopped both haying and combining. The storm came in Sunday evening, first with a thunderstorm and moderate rains. The heavy, steady rain started later Sunday night and continued to fall until almost mid-day Monday. Estimates of total rainfall were from three-quarters to over an inch. Whatever the total was, it was enough to keep farmers out of the fields and probably until later this week if no further moisture is received.

Until the rain stopped the pea growers Sunday, Dean Brocke of Brocke and Sons, estimated that the company had taken in about two-thirds of their expected deliveries of small sieve Alaska peas and that in the lower elevations Columbia Alaska peas were just getting a good start. A few Austrian Winter peas were also coming in. Both the quality of the peas and the yields were good, Brocke said. "Now we're getting a little concerned," he added. Unless more rain is received, the harvest could be going again late in the week, he reported. Brocke said the harvest was running about two weeks late this year.

Dareld Hazeltine at Lewiston Grain Growers also reported that harvest deliveries were off to a good start last week until the rain came. "We had about 60 deliveries on Sunday," Hazeltine said, adding "what came in was looking real good—both in quality and yield." LGG was getting grain in from all sections except the higher Gold Hill areas where it is traditionally later. Hazeltine likewise predicted farmers could be combining again late this week if the weather stays dry, "especially if we get some warm winds."

Wheat was coming in from all the ridges at Kendrick Rochdale before the Monday rain, reported manager MaryBelle Larson Tuesday morning. Larson said their growers were getting a good start on wheat and that which had come in was just excellent, "most of it was testing No. 1," she said. Rochdale is also taking in and storing peas for Brocke and Sons who have leased part of its bins. The coop is just taking wheat at the new bins.
