City Qualifies to Apply for Block Grant; Needs to Set Election, Determine Costs

At last week's meeting of the Kendrick City Council, community development specialists outnumbered council members. The professionals were on hand to hear the council say "go" or "no go" to the sewer and water system project and to set the date for a bond election to help underwrite its cost. Lacking a quorum, the council could only listen to the experts instructing them and encouraging them to take action as soon as possible.

Representing the Clearwater Economic Development Association (CEDA), Dodd Snodgrass reported the good news that the Idaho Department of Commerce had tabulated the results of the income surveys distributed in Kendrick by members of the K-J Community Development Association and that Kendrick qualifies to apply for a community block grant. Of the 130 survey forms submitted, 110 were properly completed and show that 69.7% of the residents of Kendrick fall in the low to moderate income category. This figure contrasts sharply with the 51.3% figure that just barely qualified the city to apply for the block grant to build the new fire hall.

Snodgrass and Joe Glick of CEDA were both full of praise for the city and the development association in conducting the survey and for encouraging discussion of the issue.

From that point on, the mood became one of urgency, with the professionals stressing the importance of getting cost figures now and for setting the date for a bond election. While public notice may be given concerning the council's intent to hold a bond election this November, it is imperative that the public be informed as soon as possible what the costs of the project are to be.

Representing the Federal Rural Economic and Community Development Agency (previously known as Farmers Home Administration), Mac Cavassar of Coeur d'Alene said his organization has loan money available to make up the difference between any possible grant and the total cost of the project. Like Joe Glick of CEDA, however, he stresses the need for "figures" so that the people of Kendrick know what the city will need to bond for. And the city needs to know, too, how "deep its constituents' pockets are."

Using ball park figures, Cavassar estimated that a project with costs of \$860,000 to this city (that is, exclusive of grant funds of cash match) would, over 30 years at 6%, cost the home owner an additional \$5 per month for water and \$5 per month for sewer service. Keep in mind, these are ball park figures. As one of the other professionals pointed out after the meeting, a 30-year pay-back period is more common when much, much larger loans are involved.

Cavassar also commented on two of his concerns: Kendrick very much needs of look at its water and sewer rates. If his agency provides loan money, they will insist that Kendrick do this. "Don't make Mom and Pop, the old folks in Kendrick, subsidize the cost of water for the big users." And he suggests that sewer rates might well be based on water usage. A second concern, one that has Cavassar in his words "reeling," is the tight time frame being imposed by the Idaho Department of transportation.

This latter concern is one that Dale Baune, regional manager of J. U. B. Engineers of Coeur d'Alene, feels can be worked out with the Highway Department. He was frank in criticizing their idea of doing the reconstruction of Kendrick's Main Street on a block-by-block basis. In his view, this isn't practical—and furthermore isn't needed. What is needed, however, is a way to route traffic. Thought is being given to sending one lane of traffic down Kendrick's back alley, and the larger trucking firms are considering bypassing Kendrick completely during the construction period. Lacking a way to divert some traffic will result in tremendous overrun costs for traffic control according to Baune.

Identified as the cause of the delay in getting cost estimates before the public, the engineering firm that undertook the study of the existing water and sewer delivery systems was roundly criticized for its slowness in completing its study of the sewer system. Joe Glick, frustrated by the delays this has caused and calling for putting some pressure on the firm, said directly to Jerry Brown, "Mayor, that pressure can come from you. Tell them, they are holding up the project."

Meanwhile, a special meeting was to be called for the city council to affirm that it's "go" for the project and that there will be a bond election in November. The council is also to pursue hiring a bond attorney to assure that all legal requirements are properly met.

It is reasonable to expect that the city council will soon have some cost figures to share with the public. And if Joe Glick has his way you can be sure that there will be public meetings in which you the reader can raise questions and express your concerns. And not, as some readers may think, out of disrespect for elected officials but rather out of concern that the best decisions are made. That, in this writer's book, is what makes democracy work.
