

## Facts Fail, Sentiment Wins as Grange To Continue in Temple Building

Despite a review of the facts concerning Grange membership, the cost of maintaining the Fraternal Temple Building, and the seeming indifference of the community to the problems faced by the organization, nine members of Kendrick Grange No. 413 last Tuesday evening voted to continue operating in the present setting, seven of them being officers. The Master did not vote. Normally it requires eighteen officers to carry on in "full form."

Master Frank Jacobson pointed out that there had been a total of six responses to his letter to members and the article in the Gazette, four of them letters from members who no longer live in the community, one a conversation with a non-member, and one a call from a member leaving the community the next day for Europe.

In reviewing the costs of the

Grange remaining in the Fraternal Temple Building, Jacobson and Treasurer Ruth Heimgartner came up with an average monthly operating cost of over \$100. Major building maintenance in 1987 came to over \$5,000, \$4,000 of that for masonry involved in redoing the building's cap and \$1,400 for roof coating. Current assets of the Grange are in the \$6,000 range. Estimates are not yet available for dealing with the building's east side. Another year like 1987 would see the organization without enough money to pay its bills.

Jacobson not only questioned the groups. The Grange, obviously, lacks in the Fraternal Temple building, he also questioned whether the community needs four public meeting places, two of them (Kendrick's Fire Hall and the Senior Center) subsidized by the tax payer and another (the VFW hall) with a very active auxiliary able to serve large groups. The Grange, obviously, lacks the subsidies, federal and local, and finds its work force shrinking.

Faced with the challenge to rehabilitate the Temple Building, the Grange (and for that matter the community as a whole) has no access to the kind of risk capital required, the kind that made possible the rehabilitation of the Potlatch Telephone Company's building, the Medical and Dental Clinic building, and Phil's Family Foods. Some mistakenly think that the Fraternal Temple is on the National Register of Historic Places and that such status provides access to funds. Not so, although such status might be a factor in being a successful applicant for a grant. And grants, though available, seldom provide more than what amounts to seed money.

Possible solutions to the problem include transferring ownership to a public entity (for example the city or county) or selling the property to a venturesome entrepreneur with some risk capital in hand. Either solution might well be frustrated by Grange law which gives the State Grange authority to block the action. Meanwhile, as the Moscow, Pullman Daily News photos in last Saturday's weekend edition clearly show, the building continues to deteriorate.

There are, however, a few voices in the community that support, encourage, and challenge the Grange to keep going. Bob Hassoldt, a Golden Sunset Seniors volunteer and former board member of the K-J Community Development Association, has challenged the Grange to begin asking people to join, selling its public use facility for features none of the others have, and generally broadening its program appeal. Hassoldt, needless to say, left last Tuesday meeting with a membership application form in hand. And, Mrs. Grace Yenni, President of the Hill and Valley Garden Club, called the next morning to indicate that they (the club) might be able to contribute to the cost of reducing the threat of falling glass on the building's east side. The Garden Club has been a long-time tenant of what used to be a mezzanine apartment there.

At the Tuesday meeting, the Grange membership voted to let the Master advertise the fact that they would welcome a tenant or tenants who could possibly make some use of the upper stories while contributing to the costs of restoration. Whether current building codes allow this remains to be seen. It's an idea, at least, and better than mere hand-wringing. If you or any of our group have ideas, please share them with the Grange. It will be in the interest of the institution and the community.

## Teaching Staff At Kendrick High Is Completed

The regular meeting of the board of trustees of Kendrick Jr. School District was held Aug. 17, at Kendrick High School. Among the business of the board that evening was the approval of the contract for a half-time junior high English teacher. The contract was offered to Mrs. Charlotte Carpenter of Kendrick. She and her husband are finishing their new home on Cedar Ridge Road. Mrs. Carpenter has taught three previous years in southern Idaho—two in the Shoshone School District and one in the Twin Falls school district—before her husband was transferred to Lewiston as the District II highway engineer for the Idaho Department of Transportation.

Because of the increase in numbers of students at the elementary school, Emily Fredenberg, who has been the half-time junior high English teacher and half-time Elementary principal in the afternoon, will be at the elementary school full-time co-teaching in the 2nd grade class during the academic times and will be 6 elementary principal.

Mrs. Carpenter will be joining two other new teachers hired during the summer at the June and July board meetings. Jim Arkills will be the new science teacher. He is from Poulso, Wash., and taught last school year in a similar assignment for a teacher on a leave of absence in Seelye Lake, Mont.

Kyle Stapleton, a Nezperce, Idaho native, who taught the past two years in American Falls, Idaho, will be the new Vocational Agriculture teacher.

Jim Bellamy, the district's architect from Coeur d'Alene, reviewed with the board the progress of the construction underway at the two school sites. He indicated the high school projects was progressing a little ahead of schedule and the elementary school was being delayed two weeks until the Jones Company of Spokane can come on site to dig the pilings down to bedrock for concrete and rebar, before the footings and foundations can be poured on top of them. Test digs indicated one would have to be almost 40 feet. These pilings are a state and federal requirement for schools and hospitals because of earthquake standards.

The district had to go out to bid twice, once April 18 and again on July 13, before a bid was accepted. The voters approved a 12-year bond issue October 18, 1994 for \$700,000 which was to include the construction and architectural fees. This bond continued the taxpayer load without raising taxes that had previously been voted in for the Elementary Gymnasium addition that was retired July 1, 1995.

When the school board opened the bids in April, the lowest of the three bids came in at \$969,000, almost \$300,000 over the amount planned for the construction. The board rejected all the bids and went back to the drawing boards to make cuts where they could, without cutting down the size of the two additions, and on items that could be replaced as the money was available.

On July 12 the board accepted the lowest bid of \$783,000+, of Kenaston Corp of Lewiston, Ron Hewett, owner, contingent on change order negotiations to build the exterior of the buildings which came in at \$647,000+. Consequently, the district will be getting two shells of buildings with the challenge of trying to come up with the finances to finish the rooms as the money is available. According to Eldon Nelson of the State Department of Education, who is in charge of school facilities throughout the state, Kendrick was the first of 5+ districts (Gooding, Filer, Ririe, etc.) who have opened their bids since April, that has had to reject their initial bids.

With the building that is going on across the state, those contractors who specialize in commercial building are tending to bid on jobs such as shopping centers, etc., which do not have all the stringent requirements of schools and hospitals. Consequently, it is driving up the costs of school and hospital construction. Commercial costs before March could be obtained in the \$70 to \$80 per square foot range, are now over \$100 per square foot for schools and hospitals.
