School Board Hears Building Progress Report; Sets Levy Election Date for Oct. 17

The regular September board of trustees meeting of Kendrick Joint School District No. 283 was held on Thursday, Sept. 14, in the home economics room of Kendrick High School. Jim Bellamy, the district's architect from Coeur d'Alene was in attendance and gave a status report of the school construction projects going on at both schools. The high school library and computer room construction is on or ahead of schedule, the trustees heard. The roof trusses for the high school are on site as of Thursday afternoon and will be put into place over the next three weeks. The 28 pilings have been dug and rebar put in place as well as concrete poured for the foundation footings at Juliaetta Elementary School. The pilings varied in depth from 4' to 32'. Footings and foundations at the elementary school should be in over the next two weeks. Framing for the four classrooms (one is a music room/pre-school/stage) will begin after the foundations are completed and inspected.

Curbside Recycling To Begin Oct. 1 in Kendrick-Juliaetta

Both Kendrick and Juliaetta has entered into an agreement with a Lewiston-based firm which will provide a curbside recycling program for the two towns effective Oct. 1. Juliaetta mayor Jeff Lohman and Kendrick mayor Jerry Brown said this week. The new program will allow local residents to put their recyclable material into large plastic boxes (these will be furnished to each household or business), and the boxes will be collected each Thursday between 8:00 and 3:00.

There will be a fee of \$2.00 a month made on each household, but both Lohman and Brown said the fee will probably not be assessed because the city hopes to save enough from its payments to Latah Sanitation to meet the recycling program charges.

The recycling program will be operated by Hogwild Recycling of Lewiston. James Hamman, the manager/owner of the firm told the Gazette Tuesday that newsprint, cardboard, magazines, number 1 and 2 plastics, clear glass, tin and aluminum cans will be collected in the 14 gallons containers that will be provided.

The two towns are enthusiastic about the program. Both towns pay Latah Sanitation \$65 a ton to collect garbage on a weekly basis. If the new program is successful the savings could be substantial.

More information will be printed next week.

Voter Registration Deadline for October 17 School Election

On Tuesday, October 17, voters in Kendrick Joint School District No. 283 will vote on a Plant Facility Election. Eligible voters wishing to cast ballots in the precinct and county on the bond issue must be registered.

You may register with your precinct registrar or at your county courthouse auditor's office until Friday, Sept. 22. Mail registrations must be received by the county clerk prior to the close of registration. Any mail registration applications postmarked not later than Sept. 22, will be deemed timely. Forms are available at your city hall and the school district offices. Voters not registered the day of the election can register at their polling place on election day (identification to prove age and residency must be provided).

If you expect to be absent from the district on October 17, the day of the election, or will be unable, because of physical disability or blindness, to go to the polling place, you may make written application for a ballot to be voted on at the election. To receive an application, contact the Kendrick Jt. School District Office of the Superintendent (289-4211). Applications will be available by Tuesday, Sept. 19, and must be filed at the same office not later than 11 a. m., October 17, the day of the election.

Kendrick Residents will Vote on \$500,000 Revenue Bond Issue November 7

Faced with an aging and rapidly deteriorating water and sewer system, and to meet its share of the cost of the Idaho Transportation Department's rebuilding Main Street, the Kendrick city council decided to ask Kendrick taxpayers to approve a \$500,000 revenue bond issue at an election set for Tuesday, November 7.

Although the condition of the water and sewer lines that service main street have been known for a number of years, it was the state's project to rebuild that portion of Highway 3 that is main street, forced Kendrick to face its problem. Before the Transportation Dept. will go ahead to a complete rebuilding of the highway, they wanted a guarantee that the water and sewer system that is under the road could have a 25-year life expectancy. The Transportation Dept. did not want to invest \$750,000 taxpayer dollars on a new highway only to see it being chopped up continuously to patch and repair water and sewer lines.



AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE WATER AND SEWER SYSTEM OF THE CITY OF KENDRICK, IDAHO; PROVIDING FOR AND CALLING A SPECIAL ELECTION AT WHICH THERE SHALL BE SUBMITTED TO THE ELECTORS QUALIFIED TO VOTE THEREON THE QUESTION OF ISSUING THE CITY'S WATER REVENUE BONDS FOR THE PURPOSE OF DEFRAYING IN PART THE COST OF RENOVATING, IMPROVING, UPGRADING AND BETTERING THE CITY'S WATER AND SEWER SYSTEM; PROVIDING DETAILS IN CONNECTION THEREWITH; THE ELECTION ON THE QUESTION; AND PROVIDING THE EFFECTIVE DATE THEREOF.

**CITY OF KENDRICK
 LATAH COUNTY, IDAHO**
 A Summary of the principal provisions of Ordinance No. 657 of the City of Kendrick, Latah County, Idaho, adopted on September 19, 1995 is as follows:

Section 1. Ratifies all previous consistent actions taken by the City Council.

Section 2. Provides for construction of water and sewer system improvements upon the assent of a majority of the electors.

Section 3. Describes the water and sewer system improvements to be constructed with the proceeds of the bonds to be voted upon by the electors (the "Project").

Section 4. Describes the engineering studies relating to the Project and where they may be inspected.

Section 7. Schedules a special municipal bond election for November 7, 1995 from 8 a. m. until 8:00 p. m. to enable electors to vote on the question of issuing not more than \$500,000 of revenue bonds to fund a portion of Project costs, pursuant to this Ordinance.

Section 8. Identifies the voting precinct(s) for the election for residents of the City.

Section 9. Identifies the polling place for the election and the Judge and Clerks who will conduct the election.

Section 10. Sets the hours of the election from 8:00 a. m. until 8:00 p. m.

Section 11. Sets forth the form of the ballot to be used for the election.

Section 12. Provides for preparation of sample ballots and publication of sample ballots at least twice before the election.

Section 13. Provides for furnishing of ballots to the Judge and Clerks who will conduct the election.

Section 14. Provides for publication of notice of the election at least 45 days before the election and then at least twice more before the election.

Section 15. Sets forth the form of notice of the election and canvass meeting.

Section 16. Provides that revenue bonds will be issued pursuant to law if a majority of the electors vote in favor of issuing bonds.

Section 17. Authorizes officers of the City to take appropriate action to put into effect the provision of the Ordinance.

Section 18. Repeals prior inconsistent actions.

Section 19. Provides for severability.

Section 20. Authorizes officers of the City to apply for issuance of revenue bonds by the Idaho Water Resource Board and/or for purchase of revenue bonds by the Farmers Home Administration.

Section 21. Provides for publication of the Ordinance.

Section 22. Provides the effective date of the Ordinance.
