Studded Snow Tires Legal From Oct. 1 to April 15

Studded snow tires can be used on Idaho's highways starting Oct. 1, the Idaho Transportation Department announced.

Studded tires are snow tires with small metal cleats embedded in the tread. They are legal from October 1 to April 15 in Idaho.

Motorists should be aware that studded tires vary in some neighboring states. Studded tires are legal in Montana and Nevada starting Oct. 1 in Utah, Oct. 15 in Washington, Nov. 1; and Oregon, No. 30. Wyoming has no restrictions.




