Questions Answered On School Levy Vote

Supt. of School Eldon Taylor said this week that several people have asked questions about the Oct. 17 plant facility levy. This week he picked several of the more frequent inquiries to respond to.

They are:

Question:
What is the difference between a school plant facility over-ride levy and a maintenance and operation over-ride?

Answer:
A school plant facility over-ride levy can be used only for purchasing or remodeling capitol outlay kinds of expenditures (buildings, land for buildings or playground), equipment (such as school buses etc.) A separate budget is prepared and administered as well as closely audited to make sure that monies are not commingled with the general fund which operates the academic programs. A maintenance and operation over-ride, in contrast, supplements the academic program through the general fund. The district has had a plant facility levy almost continuously since 1948 and over the past few decades they have been 10-year levies. The current 10-year plant levy will expire in 1999 and has made possible the remodeling of the elementary school basement, kindergarten room, 6th grade room, new cafeteria and kitchen as well as two small offices and a small special education room. In addition a new school bus has been purchased every other year (thus a new bus is changed every 12 years on our six main home-to-school routes). By watching every dollar spent closely, the district has been able to do all this without raising additional taxes. However with our increase in enrollment the past few years even though we gained one additional classroom by our remodeling project at the elementary, we still need four extra classrooms to meet the needs and accreditation standards at the elementary level.

Question:
Will this small additional 3-year plant facility levy raise our property taxes?

Answer:
Unfortunately, the answer to this is "yes", it will to a very small amount of 6.3c per thousand. A typical home in Juliaetta and Kendrick of \$55,000 with homeowners exemption will be \$19.20/a year. Madison Avenue would say that is less than a "Big Mac" a month per household. The tax for businesses or for farms valued at \$100,000 would be \$63 per year. This small tax increase amount is worst scenario. If the district market value increases anywhere near 5 million dollars like it did this year, the small tax increase will be considerably less for the 1996 tax year.

Question:
Will this 3-year plant facility levy raise our 1995 property taxes?

Answer:
No, taxes are always certified by the first week in September so that this will have no effect on this year's taxes. The slight increase will not be reflected until the 1996 tax year. This year's 1995 property tax should see a noticeable decrease as far as the school portion of it because of three reasons: House Bill 156 shifted \$40 million from property tax to sales tax revenues and the effect to District No. 283 taxpayers was 5.1c per thousand. Second, our district's market value jumped from \$64-plus million to \$70-plus million thus causing our tax levy rate to go down. Third, the way we had the bank structure the \$700,000 bond levy payments which will approximately be the same as the recently retired bond levy of 1985 except for this first year and it will be 2.7c per thousand less than either 1994 or 1996 will be. This bank structure of the bond repayment was structured so that it would not put the district in a cash flow crunch situation.

Statewide Testing In Local Schools Due Next Week

The Iowa Tests of Basic Skills (K-8) and the Test of Achievement and Proficiency (9-12) will be administered at the schools during the week of October 9-13. At Juliaetta Elementary, teachers will be testing second, fourth and sixth grade with a survey test. A complete battery of tests (longer and more comprehensive) will be given to Kindergarten, and first, third and fifth grade.

At the high school and junior high, students in grades 8, 10, 11, as well as 12th grade make-ups will be taking the survey test on Tuesday, Oct. 10. Students in grades 7 and 9 will be taking the complete battery of tests on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday, first through third hours.

Parents: you can help by 1. making sure your child gets plenty of sleep the night before the test, 2. has breakfast on the morning(s) of the test, 3. goes to school on the day(s) of the test, and 4. knows you think she/he will do well on the test. Opening of hunting season arrives the same week, and school does not close for hunting season; therefore, it is important to consider the schooling/school work that your son or daughter will miss if absent for hunting, or the testing they will miss if absent and/or work they will need to make up if they are busy making up the missed tests. If your child will be absent from jr. high or high school, it is their responsibility to obtain a pre-arranged absence slip, so that they can complete assignments before the absence. There is only a certain window of time in which to give the tests, which are then sent to the State Department of Education.
