

District Votes On School Levy Tuesday, Oct. 17

Taxpayers in Kendrick Jt. School District No. 283 will go to the polls next Tuesday, Oct. 17 to approve a special three-year plant facility levy issue that would allow the district to finish a remodeling project at both Juliaetta Elementary and Kendrick Jr. and Senior High. The total cost of the levy is \$135,000.00, paid over three years at \$45,000 per year.

Voting may be done at Juliaetta Elementary, Kendrick High School, Cameron Church and the Albert Lawrence home from 12 noon to 8 p. m. on Oct. 17.

Supt. of Schools Eldon Taylor is again answering some more frequently asked questions concerning the levy. These are the questions he is addressing this week.

Question:
Are we anywhere near being at the bonded indebtedness limit?

Answer:

No, with our market value of the district being \$70+ million we are far from the 5% indebtedness as stated in Idaho Code 33-804. Kendrick Jt. School District No. 283 has been blessed to have an informed electorate who has been supportive of education and the issues we have put before the voters whether it be bond elections, plant facility or maintenance and operation over-ride levies. The school board, administration and staff has taken this support as a major responsibility to make sure that every dollar is closely scrutinized. Because you have supported us in major bond issues such as the \$530,000 elementary addition in 1984 and upon paying off this obligation continued the same payments without raising taxes on a \$700,000 bond in 1994, we have been able to keep up with our needs at an affordable rate to our taxpayers. Neighboring districts who have not been working along for the past 20-30 years on major building needs have now, or are now having to go, to their voters with heavy requests: \$1.2 million (Highland); \$3.2 million (Whitepine); and a possible range of \$2.5-4.5 million (Genesee).

Question:
Why is this plant facility levy needed?

Answer:

After the voters approved a 12-year bond issue October 18, 1994, the district went out to bid twice: on April 18 and again July 13. When the board opened the bids in April the lowest of the three bids came in at \$969,000, almost \$300,000 over the amount planned for construction. The board rejected all the bids and went back to the drawing boards to make cuts where they could without cutting down on the size of the two additions, and items that could be replaced as the money was available. On July 12 they accepted the lowest bid of \$793,000+ of Kenaston Corporation of Lewiston, Ron Hewett, owner, contingent on change order negotiations, to build the exterior of the buildings which came in at \$647,000. Consequently the district will get two shells of buildings with the district having to finish them as needed. Consequently, this plant facility levy for \$45,000 for three years will yield \$135,000, the amount needed to finish the interior.

With the increased enrollment we have been experiencing these classrooms were really needed in September of 1995, but with the passage of the override should be ready for September of 1996. At Juliaetta Elementary School we currently have two kindergarten sessions, two fourth grade and two fifth grade classes. We have 35 students in the 6th grade and have 2 teachers serving most of the day in the same classrooms in the 2nd and 3rd grades because we have no available classrooms to split them. This situation will cause comments on the state accreditation report response sheet. The elementary cafeteria is currently housing: 3 lunch sessions, library and music classes. The pre-school sessions are housed in a hallway.

Kendrick High School houses its art classes on the gymnasium wood stage which raises the eyebrows of the state safety inspector because of the ceramics kiln. The high school currently does not have an actual computer lab, and the the small high school library no longer meets the size for A-4 accreditation standards.

Question:
Will this \$45,000 plant facility levy cause a significant increase in property taxes?

Answer:

No, as was explained in last week's Gazette, it will cost \$19.20 a year for a typical \$55,000 home in Kendrick and Juliaetta for those with homeowners exemption. It will cost \$63 a year for businesses or farms valued at \$100,000. The small increase will be 6.3c per thousand.

Children to be Photographer for Safety IDs Oct. 16

Parents can obtain free photographs of their children at a KidCare Photo Identification event hosted by Potlatch Telephone Company at the Juliaetta Elementary School Monday, October 16, at 7 p. m. One in seven missing children are found because of a photograph distributed by the NCMEC, so authorities recommend that parents obtain standardized safety documents such as the KidCare Photo ID for their child.

Potlatch Telephone Company is hosting the KidCare Photo ID event as part of a national effort to provide parents with personal safety IDs of their children in the event of an emergency. The National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC) and the Polaroid Corporation have developed the KidCare Photo ID as part of a national campaign to increase awareness about the steps they can take to help protect their children. when construction bids come in over the amount expected is to blame it on the architect. Jim Bellamy, the district's architect, who has spent most of his career specializing in school construction working with this district over 18 years and has built many schools around this area (Camelot Elementary in Lewiston, Lapwai Elementary, the gymnasium at Genesee, and Hartung Theater for the University of Idaho), was as surprised as any of the board members and superintendent. Jim used the latest architect price material manual, as well as checking at the architect plans center as to what commercial building per square foot in the greater Spokane area is as well as the Quad City area. According to Eldon Nelson from the State Department of Education, who is the state supervisor of school facility construction, plan checks, etc. throughout the state, Kendrick was the first of 5+ districts (Gooding, Filer, Ririe, etc.), who have opened their bids since April, that has had to either reject their initial bids or have negotiated change orders to be within budget limitation. With the buildings that is going on across the state, those contractors who specialize in commercial building are tending to bid on such jobs as shopping centers, etc., which do not have all the stringent requirement of schools and hospitals, such as handicap provisions and seismicographic (earthquake) standards. Commercial costs before March could be obtained from long established reliable builders versus out-of-state contractors that have come in during the building era in the \$70 to \$80/sq. ft. range, are now in the \$100/sq. ft. range for schools and hospitals. Even home construction costs per square foot have gone up in those ranges if one looks at the building permit notices in the area daily newspapers.

City Elections In Kendrick Nov. 7

Kendrick residents will have a choice in an election to be held on Tuesday, Nov. 7. There are three positions on the Kendrick city council to fill and four petitions of candidacy have been filed as of the filing deadline on Tuesday, Oct. 10.

The four year terms of incumbents Rita Blewett and Darrell Brocke expire Dec. 31, and the two year term of appointed councilman Milt Peterson also expires. Both Brocke and Peterson filed to seek another term, but Blewett will not seek reelection.

Filing petitions of candidacy for the four-year terms have been Lillian Howerton, a bookkeeper at Gem State Lumber Co., and Darrell Hamilton, owner of Kendrick Upholstery. Both are making their first bid for public office.

Milt Peterson, the school bus maintenance man, was appointed to the council by Mayor Jerry Brown when elected councilman Mike Bee had to resign when he moved his residency to Juliaetta.

The election will be held at the fire hall next to the Kendrick Park. Contact clerk Lynne Bruce for information about absentee ballots or other election questions.

City Urges Voter Approval of Revenue Bond Issue for Water, Sewer Project

Mayor Jerry Brown earnestly urged local residents to approve a \$500,000 revenue bond issue that would provide funds for a major water and sewer project. Also tied to the issue is the future of a Idaho Transportation plan to reconstruct that portion of State Highway 3 that serves as the city's main street. Voters will approve or disapprove the revenue bond at an election Tuesday, Nov. 7. Brown also urged a good voter turnout for the Nov. 7 election.

The water sewer project includes replacing waterlines, water services, sewer lines and sewer services in the downtown area of Kendrick. Additional water and sewer lines which are also seriously deteriorated and require high maintenance will be replaced as part of this project.

The water and sewer lines are in excess of 50 years old and in poor condition. Kendrick has recognized the need to replace these lines for several years. The city was presented with an opportunity to proceed with the replacement, at a reduced cost when the Idaho Transportation Department advised the city it would reconstruct State Highway 3 in 1996. The ITD project has precipitated the need to accelerate the water and sewer replacement project.

The Idaho Transportation Department has indicated that the City must submit evidence to them that the utility lines under this section of the street would have an effective service life of 25 years. The City retained Wyatt Engineering to do a preliminary study of the water and

sewer system. As part of the sewer study, the City of Lewiston was contracted to do an internal camera review of the sewer lines. A video survey found cracked and broken pipe, protruding services, grade irregularities and general failure. Based on this study and past repairs of the sewer collection system, it is evident the sewer lines will not be able to satisfy the 25-year requirement proposed by the Idaho Transportation Department.

The water system study reviewed the condition and hydraulic capacity of the water distribution system. Based on the analysis it was determined the water distribution system was not adequate to meet the hydraulic capacity of the City. In addition, most of the existing water lines in Main Street are constructed of lead joint cast. These joints are failing at an accelerating rate. Services are constructed of galvanized steel pipe. Many of the services have failed and many more are near the failure point.

The Main Street water main replacement would start at Well No. 1, on the West edge of town and continue along Main Street (State Highway 3) to Pike Street on the East end of town. All water services would be replaced to reduce or eliminate future pavement removal and disruptions. New water lines and services will meet the required utility conditions for the ITD project.

In addition to the Main Street water line replacement, it is proposed water lines will be replaced up the hill along 9th Street (old school house hill) connecting to the booster pump. The 3-inch water line serving the high school is also to be replaced to increase fire flows at this critical area.

The Main Street sewer line project includes replacement of the sewer line from the Mill Street to the Pike Street. All services connecting to this section of sewer line would also be replaced as they are deteriorated and mis-routed in most cases. A two block (450 feet) section of sewer line on Pike Street is included. Although constructed in 1965, this section of pipe showed serious deterioration and failure during the video inspection. Significant leakage into the sewer system occurs in this section.

In addition to the water and sewer line replacements, Kendrick must construct an additional water supply well. The City of Kendrick currently has two wells, one with a capacity of less than 30 gallons per minute. With essentially one water supply well, the City has no backup supply. The volume that the small well can deliver is not adequate even with additional storage. The City needs the supplemental and backup water supply. The new well will provide the additional flow.

If this bond is approved and providing current interest rates hold steady, it has been estimated that user costs will increase \$14.88 per month.

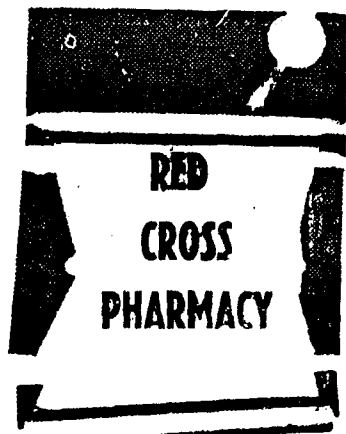

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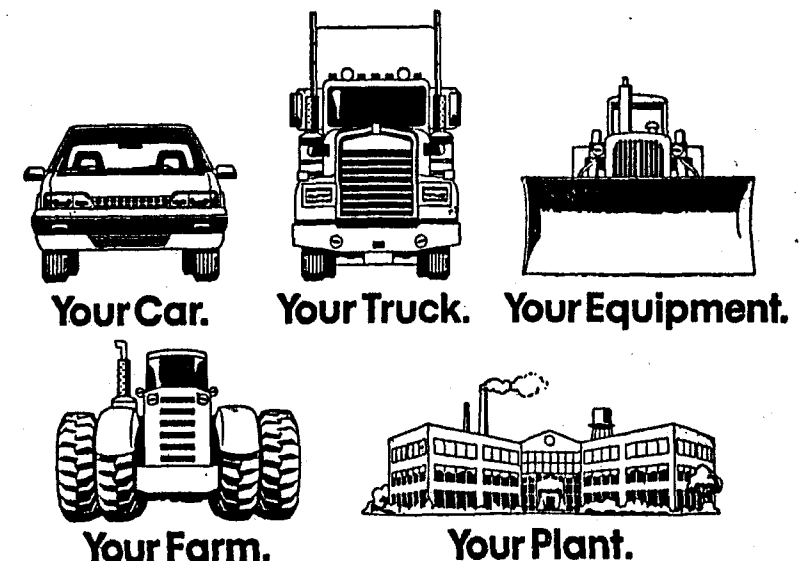
