## Has Council Taken a Walk on Need for Sidewalk Replace?

John and Gladys Wilson and other elderly Kendrick residents could very well be in for the disappointment of a lifetime if the so-called Main Street Project doesn't include replacing the treacherous sidewalks along the city's scenic but unsafe main thoroughfare. The Wilsons and other seniors were heartened by the fact that sidewalk replacement was a high priority item in plans presented at a public meeting called by the city back on August 31.

Since then the sidewalk component appears to be slipping between the cracks. An inside source that prefers to remain anonymous says it won't happen—there will be no money anywhere for sidewalks!

Plausible reason for concern can be found in reviewing what this newspaper has reported on the sidewalk issue since the August 31 meeting. In the Sept. 7 issue of the paper the sidewalks were right up front as part of the first sentence of the lead paragraph: "Kendrick residents received their first solid, sobering information on the costs and scope of proposed plans to rebuild that portion of State Highway 3 which serves as Kendrick Main Street, repair and replace the aging water and sewer lines under that part of the street, and repair and/or replace present sidewalk along much of the street."

In the September 21 issue, sidewalks don't get mentioned until the next to the last paragraph in a story with the headline: "Kendrick Residents Will Vote on \$500,000 Revenue Bond Issue November 7". The paragraph reads as follows: "Even if the bond is approved and the grant received, and the highway completely renovated there is still a serious need—adequate sidewalks along side of the repaired highway improvement. All who have walked main street is aware of the poor condition they are in. At its last meeting (that would have been Sept. 19), the council took a long, hard look at the situation and voted to add another \$90,000 to the bond levy that would be used to replace the sidewalks throughout the Main Street Project."

While its position in the overall news story suggests a down grading in importance as an issue, the language used in this next to the last paragraph keeps a clear focus on justified need. Unfortunately, in other ways this September 21 story contradicts what the public has heard in good faith back at the Aug. 31 public hearing. And the contradiction shows up clearly in the \$500,000 figure referred to in the headline and the legal advertisement for the bond election as it appears in the classified section in the same September 21 edition of the Gazette.

In the October 12 issue of the paper, under a headline reading: "City Urges Voter Approval of Revenue Bond Issue for Water, Sewer Project," and in the news story that details specifics of the project never before seen in print, there is no mention of sidewalk. Repeat: Sidewalks are nowhere in sight! What a quick slide to oblivion! From emphatic lead paragraph position to still emphatic next to last position—and thence to limbo! What is going on, folks?

The reader at this point probably needs to be reminded of what JUB Engineers of Coeur d'Alene presented at a public meeting back on Aug. 31—and at the request of the city council, we can be sure. The engineering firm presented the council and the citizens with two options, each consisting of four phases. Option A had a total cost of \$1,700,000, called for a \$450,000 bond issue, and made no provision for sidewalks, period, resulting in a monthly fee increase of \$12.38. Option B had a total cost of \$1,790,000, called for a \$540,000 bond issue, and made provision for \$90,000 in sidewalk replacement as part of a proposed \$420,000 block grant within phase 1 of the project. This option would see the monthly fee increase by \$14.86.

The question is, where does the city council come up with a bond proposal in the amount of \$500,000, \$50,000 greater than the no-nonsense, no sidewalks bond issue included in Proposal A, and \$40,000 less than that cited in Proposal B? Note that the difference between the proposed bond issues is \$90,000, the very amount needed to offset the greater block grant proposal included in the first phase of Option B for the obvious purpose of covering sidewalk replacement. And let it be said here that we're not just talking replacement of sidewalks that have been in sad repair for years; we're talking replacing sidewalks that will be a major obstacle course for all but the most nimble once all those repairs have been made to correct changes in grade and provide the new service connections all up and down Main Street!

## School Levy Squeaks by

By the closet margin in years, voters of Jt. School District No. 283 went to the polls Tuesday and approved a special three-year plant facility levy that will bring in \$135,000 that will allow the district to finish a remodeling project at both Juliaetta Elementary and Kendrick Jr. and Senior High. While district patrons have always supported bond and levy issues strongly, this time the district board received a 66% approval for its levy. The district needed a 60% margin.

It was the Juliaetta Zone that gave the margin of approval for the levy, casting 70 Yes votes and 15 no votes for a large 82% favorable vote.

Here is the breakdown by Zone in the Tuesday election.

Cameron — Nez Perce County: 33 Yes votes; 28 No. 54%.

Southwick: 9 Yes, 6 No. 60%.

Kendrick: 63 Yes, 41 No. 60.5%.

Juliaetta: 70 Yes, 15 No. 82%.

Supt. Eldon Taylor, speaking for the board of trustees after the votes were cast, said the school is very grateful for those who supported the issue.

Wally Butler will be presenting a special program at the November meeting when all winter project plans will be finalized.

## It's Dennis Hamilton!

As the Gazette is all too often prone to do, we made a mistake in the story concerning the forthcoming Kendrick city elections in last week's issue, referring to those who will be seeking a four-year term on the council is DENNIS Hamilton, the owner-operator of Kendrick Upholsterly. We gave Dennis the wrong first name. Sorry, DENNIS.

If this writer—and more importantly, you the voter—has reason to raise such questions about the fate of what appeared to some to have been a key selling point at the Aug. 31 hearing (that is, to include sidewalk replacement), then he does so because of an inconsistency between the engineering firm's carefully prioritized listing of project elements and the possibility that the city council has somehow assigned sidewalks a different priority or even dumped them entirely!

One wonders what will guide the council in appropriating bond monies, assuming a successful day at the polls on November 7. If the issue fails, then it's back to the drawing board on all matters, and this protracted analysis will all be moot. Future actions of the council will also relate, of course, to Kendrick's success with its block grant application. Let's assume that Kendrick doesn't come out 100%. Let's say it comes out with 70 or 80% of its request—or, worse case scenario, less. Now what? What will guide the council's decisions regarding what now stands in the public mind as a four phase project? What elements will remain and what will be set aside. And how much do they proceed to borrow against their \$500,000 limit?

If the sidewalk replacement issue is any kind of example, it appears possible that what was presented in good faith to the public on Aug. 31 may in the council's hands become a flexible, changeable plan that will thrive on false assumptions and spell nothing out with the charity that the voter deserves.

In making the decisions that it did regarding the total of the proposed bond issue (\$500,000), the city council has obligated itself to explain to the voters just how they arrived at this figure. And it is further obliged to be up front about the possible future of sidewalk replacement.

Voters, they're your council. Hold them to their responsibility. And in considering candidates running for election to the council, also to be decided on November 7, consider which of them will put public communication high on their priority list and on the council's way of doing the public's business.

## Sidewalks Still Priority Item for Main St. Project

Only the Kendrick Gazette editor's careless haste caused the omission of mention of new sidewalks for that part of Main Street scheduled to be rebuilt by the State Transportation Department next year. The omission was made in a story in the Gazette's Oct. 12 issue telling of the \$500,000 water and sewer revenue bond issue to be voted on in an election Nov. 7. The editor wrote the story late on Tuesday night (Oct. 10), and in his haste to get the story written never even thought to include the word sidewalk. This omission made frequent contributing writer Frank Jacobson wonder if the lack of mention of the word "sidewalk" was a possible down-grading in its priority on the entire project (see separate article on this page). When Jacobson submitted his story Monday afternoon the editor realized what had happened and that it was the Gazette, and the Gazette alone, that was responsible for the confusion. To Jacobson, to Mayor Jerry Brown, to the members of the City Council, and to any reader who might have been confused and disappointed, we sincerely apologize. The blame is ours entirely.

To be on the safe side, the Gazette talked to Mayor Brown Tuesday morning, who quickly confirmed that new sidewalks on that portion of Main Street involved with the State's rebuilt project were, indeed, an important part of the project. "We (the council) have always felt that new sidewalks were part of the plan," Brown said. This was also the opinion of the majority of those attending a public hearing on August 31. This desire for better sidewalks was also a contributing factor in the city's decision to adopt the more expensive Option B plan for the entire project rather than accept Option A at a lesser level.

Whatever the Option the future of the the Main Street Project hinges on the passage of the \$500,000 water and sewer revenue bond vote on November 7. The State Transportation Dept. requires that the city guarantee that the water and sewer lines which are under that part of Highway 3 that serves as Kendrick's main street, be good for at least 25 years. The State is naturally reluctant to spend taxpayer dollars to build a new highway over water and sewer lines that would need constant patching and repair.

To make the replacement and repairs that would bring the water and sewer lines into acceptable state standards that would justify the expenditure of \$750,000 in taxpayer money, the city is going to have to pay for the work. Work that require an estimated \$954,900. To raise this amount the city is asking for the voters to approve a \$500,000 revenue bond issue. This would be repaid through increased water and sewer rates each month over a period of 30 years. The remainder of the needed money would be acquired, it is hoped, from a \$476,050 Idaho Community Development Block Grant.

The fate of the entire project depends on voter approval of the Nov. 7 revenue bond issue. Mayor Brown said Tuesday morning that he wanted to stress that he and the council want the citizens of Kendrick to know that they are very aware of the costs involved and that nothing that isn't absolutely necessary has been added to the project. "We all live here," he said, "and we'll be paying just like everyone else." The city council will hold a public hearing on the issue Thursday, November 2, at 7 o'clock in the fire hall.

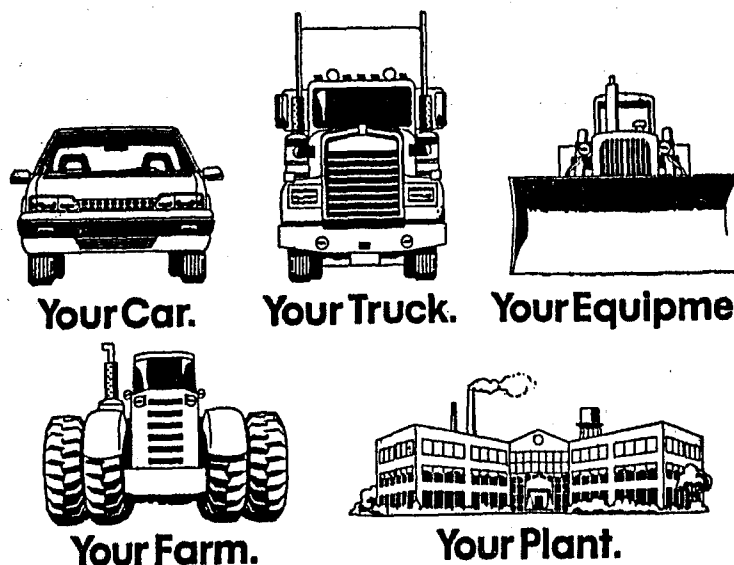
