

## Project Figures Test Reassurance

Thanks to Bill Roth's generous and concerned follow-up story in last week's Gazette, most readers are probably reassured that the sidewalk replacement portion of Kendrick's Main Street Project is still alive and well so far as the Mayor and city council are concerned.

In fact, the desire for better sidewalks was cited as a "contributing factor in the city's decision to adopt the more expensive Option B plan," the alternative offered by the city's hired engineering firm out of Coeur d'Alene.

The fact is, however, that the figures offered by the city in support of our editor's reassurance don't add up. Indeed, if one were to substitute the vowel 'a' for the second vowel in the word *adopt*, one would be closer to reporting what the city has been doing. It has been *adapting* Option B—and in ways that leave questions for this writer.

Let's keep it brief; The Gazette story of Oct. 19, "Sidewalks Still a Priority," cites the sources of funding for the project as follows: Idaho Transportation Department \$750,000; bond issue, \$500,000; block grant, \$476,050, for a total funding of \$1,726,050.

The Gazette then cites the costs as follows: highway improvement, \$750,000; work to bring water and sewer lines to acceptable state standard, \$954,900, for a total cost of \$1,704,900.

Net results: Funds available, \$1,726,050, would be \$21,150 greater than the estimated costs. Question: What does that \$21,150 figure represent? Some additional cost, perhaps, not cited above? A fund to help cover potential over-runs? What?

The reader is encouraged to take time to discover that the difference between the cost of Option B (at \$1,790,000) and the project cost provided to the Gazette by the city (at \$1,726,050) is \$63,950. Add that figure to the \$21,150 questioned in the previous paragraph and you're looking for a way to explain what amounts to \$85,100 in reductions and/or reallocations in specified, spelled-out costs cited in Proposal B, which I repeat has not been adopted, but rather adapted by the city. That this \$85,100 figure comes very close to the \$90,000 originally included for sidewalks in Phase 1 of Proposal B does little to reassure this figure cruncher concerning the future of the sidewalks issue. Suppose, just suppose, that the city council can't find the dollars to cover the cost of replacing the sidewalks, what then? Will it seek another way to finance the cost or will it simply end up tripping once again over this historic impediment to public safety?

Thanks, Bill Roth, for letting me go one more round on this issue. And thanks for whatever assurances can be provided to the questions raised here, whatever their source. The voters deserve to have figures before them that add up.

## City Elections Are Nov. 2

Residents of both Juliaetta and Kendrick will elect city official on Tuesday, Nov. 7. Juliaetta will vote on a mayor and two council members and Kendrick will vote on three council positions.

In Juliaetta only incumbents are seeking re-election without opposition. Mayor Jeff Lohman is unopposed in his bid for another four year term, and council members Richard Groseclose and Candice Holsington are seeking another four year term and likewise have no opposition.

In Kendrick three candidates are seeking the two council seats of four years each. Incumbent Darrell is seeking another term. Two newcomers are making their first run for municipal positions. Lillian Howerton and Dennis Hamilton are seeking terms on the council. Incumbent Rita Blewett will not seek re-election.

Milt Patterson is seeking election to the council's two-year term and is unopposed in his bid. Patterson was appointed to finished out the unexpired term last year when Mike Boe resigned because of moving to Juliaetta.

Juliaetta voters will vote at the city hall and Kendrick at the Firehall between the hours of 8 a. m. and 8 p. m.

## Revenue Bond In Kendrick

In Kendrick voters will be asked to approve a \$500,000 revenue bond issue that will decide the fate of a planned main street improvement project which would give the city funds to apply for a Block Grant and bring the water and sewer lines under Main Street up to specifications required by the State Transportation Dept before it will rebuild that portion of Highway 3 that serves as main street. Approval of the bond issue would also give the city sufficient funds to replace the sidewalks adjacent to main street, dig a new water well and replace the water line out to the high school with one of a larger capacity.

There will be a public hearing on the bond issue Thursday evening, Nov. 2, at 7:00 p. m. at the Kendrick Firehall. The city council, engineers and a project coordinator will be available to discuss the project and answer questions. All interested persons are both invited and encouraged to attend and participate.



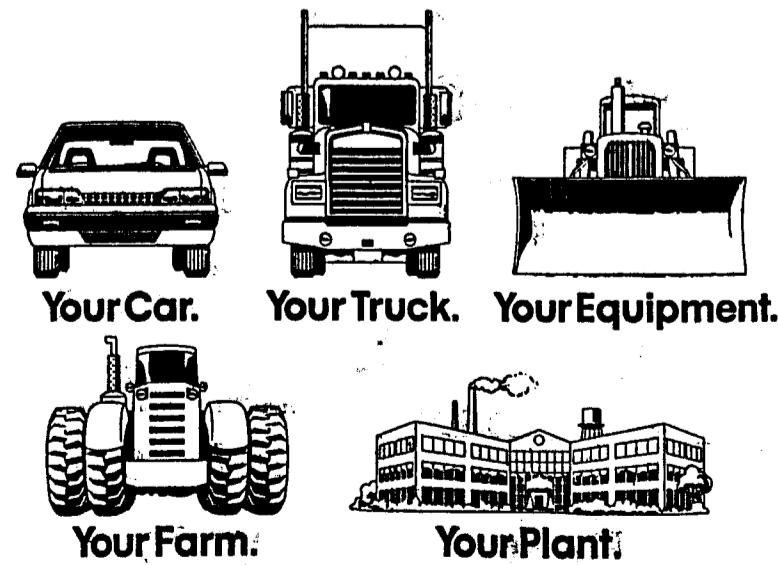
