J-K Development Assoc. Begins Membership Drive

The Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Association is undertaking an ambitious effort to increase membership and encourage community participation in the association. The association was formed in 1987 to serve as the Gem Community organization for Kendrick and Juliaetta and the surrounding area. The Idaho Department of Commerce established the Gem Community program as a method of helping Idaho's communities to organize and decide on priorities for community development. It is designed to address all areas of community interest, including business, recreation, tourism, the arts, infrastructure, law enforcement, planning, education... whatever citizens feel is important. Government is important and should provide the vehicle for achievement of goals; community volunteers need to be interested enough to help establish these goals and assist their leaders in achieving them. Community means the people working together, exchanging ideas, setting goals and priorities, and working to achieve those goals. The association has been very successful over the years in achieving what it set out to do (welcome signs at city limits, the swimming pool mural, art classes, community theater, Christmas lighting, etc.), but the more participation by community members, the more truly representative the organization is of community wishes. If all the work and worry is left to the interested few, some of the best ideas may never be heard. Many ideas and projects are already underway. Your help and participation is needed in order to make them successful and bring new ones to the foreground.

Please consider becoming a dues-paying member of the Development Association, as a business or as an individual, when an association member calls on you or by contracting one of them. Annual dues have been set at \$100 for a large business (7 or more employees); \$60 for a medium-sized business (3 to 6 employees); \$30 for a small business (1 or 2 employees), and \$10 for individuals. A husband and wife business with one employee will be considered a small business. Membership is Not limited to city residents. In fact, it is felt that one weakness has been the limited participation by the farming and ranching industries and citizens who live and/or work outside city limits. We are members of the community and need to work together to make it what we want it to be.

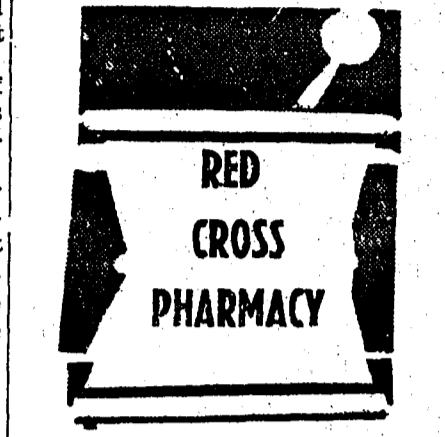

The range of anticipated rates is from Five percent (5.00%) to Seven percent (7.00%). The total amount estimated to be repaid over the life of the proposed bonds, based on the anticipated interest rate is \$1,130,400.
