Marie M. Fey, 63, a retired Kendrick bookkeeper, died Tuesday, Oct. 31, at scleroderma at St. Joseph Regional Medical Center at Lewiston.

She was born December 13, 1931, at Melrose, Idaho, to Gustav and Mary Schwab Heese. She attended elementary school at Reubens, Idaho.

In 1943 they moved to Lewiston, where she graduated from high school in 1949.

She married Harlan Fey, Nov. 17, 1950, at Lewiston and they moved to Kendrick. She worked as a waitress for Bert's Cafe at Kendrick for several years and also worked as a salesperson at Olderness's Clothing Store.

For 11 years she was a bookkeeper for Hedler Oil Co. and Coleman Oil at Kendrick, retiring in 1994.

She was a member of Cameron Emmanuel Lutheran Church and a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 3913 Auxiliary.

She enjoyed spending time with friends, participating in social and church activities, flower gardening, sewing and playing cards.

Survivors include her husband, Harlan at the family home in Kendrick; two sisters, Emma Howerton of Kendrick and Margaret Dehning Stotle of Lewiston; and two brothers, Edward Heese of Culesac and Conrad Heese of Lewiston.

One sister, Elizabeth Howerton, and one brother, Carl Heese, died previously.

Influenza Reported In This District

The first confirmed case of Type A Influenza was diagnosed in the North Central Health District October 30.

Influenza is an acute viral disease of the respiratory tract. The usual symptoms are: fever, headache, muscle aches, sore throat, runny nose, and cough. Sometimes nausea, vomiting, and diarrhea also occur. The cough is often severe and long lasting.

Influenza has a short incubation period, from 1-5 days, and is spread through the air.

The best prevention is to use tissues to cover coughs and sneezes and to practice good handwashing to prevent hand to face spread.

Immunization with flu shots should be considered if you have not already received one. It takes a minimum of two weeks to build immunity.

People with symptoms of influenza should contact their physicians because there is treatment for Type A Influenza if given early in the course of the disease.

Rest and fluids are the usual treatment for viral illnesses.

Joseph F. Frank Candler, 74, a retired warehouseman and Kendrick resident, died of cancer at his home Saturday, November 4.

He was born July 14, 1921, at Kendrick to Porter G. and Florence Waite Candler. He graduated from the eighth grade at Kendrick.

He worked for various farmers, truckers and bean growers in the area after he left school. In 1941 he worked with his brother at the Bunker Hill Mine at Kellogg, Idaho.

He joined the U. S. Marine Corps in August, 1942 and was discharged as a sergeant in October of 1945.

He married Phyllis Daugherty Crocker in December 1946 at Superior, Mont. He returned to the mines and worked as a logger from 1946 to 1960.

In 1960 they moved to Kennewick, where he worked for Elvrum Construction until 1964.

He then worked for Power City Electric until moving to Mountain Home, Idaho, in 1971.

Frank and Phyllis owned the Fall Creek Lodge from 1971 to 1976 at Mountain Home. In 1976 they moved back to Kennewick, where he worked as a warehouseman for Amfac Electric until he retired in 1986.

In 1986 they moved to Deary. His wife died in April 1992 and he moved to Kendrick after her death.

He was a member of Moose Lodge No. 389 at Yakima and enjoyed hunting.

Survivors include one stepson, Robert F. Crocker of Portland, Ore.; two daughters, Judith F. Robinson of Danville, Calif., and Teresa E. Littleton of Eagle River, Alaska; one sister, Ada Westendahl of Kendrick; three brothers, Charles Candler of Lewiston, Jim Candler of Kendrick and Gilbert Candler of Washington; eight grandchildren, and seven great-grandchildren.

He was preceded in death by one son, Dennis Candler, two grandchildren, three brothers and two sisters.

The funeral was held Nov. 8 at Malcom's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel at Lewiston with Kevin Littleton of Eagle River, Alaska officiating. Burial followed at Pine Crest Cemetery at Deary.

Elizabeth Mickelson Dies October 31

Elizabeth Mickelsen, a Juliaetta resident and a longtime nurse, died Tuesday, October 31 of causes related to age at the Valley Rehabilitation and Living Center at Lewiston. She was 78.

She was born March 2, 1917, at St. Anthony, Idaho, to Stephen Samuel and Martha Beam Broadhurst. On July 29, 1939, she married Morris (Tony) Mickelson at Jackson Hole, Wyoming.

She graduated in 1938 as a registered nurse from the Idaho Falls School of Nursing at the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints Hospital at Idaho Falls. She was head nurse at Fremont General Hospital at St. Anthony for several years and taught the first Idaho Licensed Practical Nursing course in 1943. Her mother and sister were among the students in the class.

In 1949 they moved to Elk River, where she served on the school board, was a board member of Valley Memorial Hospital at Orofino and practiced nursing.

Because of the area's location, she was the only trained medical practitioner in a 50-mile radius of Elk River and became known as the Florence Nightingale of the North Woods.

In 1961 she was awarded the highest degree of chivalry from the Rebekah Lodge. In 1973 they moved to Juliaetta, and she worked as a home health and hospice nurse for Gritman Memorial Hospital at Moscow and volunteered as a caretaker for the elderly in the Juliaetta and Kendrick area. Her husband died Jan. 28, 1978.

She was named Citizen of the Year in 1984 for her volunteer efforts. In 1980 she became a member of the Juliaetta Volunteer Fire Department and was an emergency medical technician for several years. She was a patient at the rehabilitation and living center at the time of her death.

She enjoyed oil painting and making arts and crafts.

Survivors include one son, Dale Mickelson of Moscow; one daughter, Deana McGarvey of Juliaetta; one foster son, Peter Nikitich of Beaverton, Oregon; four sisters, Vera Rawson of Juliaetta, Ruth VanderLinden of St. Anthony, Lois VanderLinden of Spokane, and Jenne Adams of Victoria, British Columbia, Canada; four grandchildren, and three great-grandchildren.

In addition to her husband, one sister, Elnora Rawson, and a newborn child, died previously.

Kendrick Approves Bond Issue

Kendrick took another step forward in its effort to improve the city's infrastructure Tuesday when voters went to the polls and approved the passage of a \$500,000 water and sewer revenue bond. Of the 114 ballots cast, 96 voters said "Yes" and only 18 voted "No", for an 84.2 percent margin. A simple 51 percent margin was required to approve the issue.

"We're very happy with the vote," said Kendrick mayor Jerry Brown, speaking on behalf of both he and the council. Brown went on to thank the council for its many hours of hard work in planning the project and seeing that the public was informed of its efforts to update and replace the water and sewer lines under main street. Brown also had high praise for the citizens of the community for the solid support and votes in the Tuesday election.

Now, with the voter's approval to issue up to \$500,000 in revenue bonds, the city can submit its application for a \$476,000 Block Grant from the Idaho Community Development office. The passage of the bond issue provides the city with the necessary matching funds for a Block Grant and assures that in addition to replacing the aging water and sewer lines under main street and replacing the sidewalks that are adjacent to the new highway that will be built on much of Highway 3 running through Kendrick, the city may also go ahead with plans to upgrade the water main from well No. 1 to the downtown area, up Ninth Street to residential areas and the high school; drill a new well for supplemental and back up water supply and rebuild and pave Highway 3 from Mill Street to East of Pike Street.

The Idaho Transportation Department has already allocated a sum of \$750,000 to reconstruct the highway through Kendrick.

October Rainfall Totaled 4.4 Inches

While there was plenty of rainfall in the town of Kendrick last month the amount was even greater in the rural area, reported Frank Dammarell this week. Frank said he recorded 4.4 inches of measurable rainfall in the 31 days of October, including a drenching 1.2 inches in one 24 hour period. Two days saw almost an inch (.8 inches and one day had .7 inches). The other days had rainfall of from .1 to .4. In all, rain was recorded on eight days.

On Bear Ridge, where Dammarell lives, the wet month of October closed out on the 31st with light snow flurries.
