Grange Helps Build Social Capital

At its last meeting on November 21, Kendrick Grange continued to build social capital by discussing policy issues of concern to all citizens. Legislative concerns discussed included the future of family farm subsidies and the need to move ahead on balancing the national budget. Discussion also touched on the proposed reductions in Federal spending for Medicare and Medicaid.

Turning to local matters, the Grange reviewed the status of the Kendrick Main Street Project. The Grange had addressed a letter to the Idaho Department of Commerce in support of Kendrick's application for a community development block grant, citing the fact that the project involved a regional approach to the solution of a local problem—involving as it does, Federal state, and local dollars. Such an approach is consistent with a fundamental principle advocated in the Gem Community Program, which the Grange has long supported.

The Grange also noted that the larger community of Kendrick-Juliaetta has two new churches, one meeting in Kendrick's Fire Hall and the other in the space vacated by the Chicken Coop. It was announced that a children's preschool is operating in the Methodist Church and that the Food Bank had prepared 31 baskets for distribution locally.

A generous gift from the Hill and Valley Garden Club will help in the project to secure the upstairs windows in the Fraternal Temple. Carl Hulquist, Master of the Latah County Pomona Grange and an independent contractor, will be heading up the project to reglaze windows where necessary. The Grange will welcome volunteer help once Hulquist works the project into his busy schedule.



SUMMARY OF ORDINANCE
NO. 659**

The City of Kendrick has passed Ordinance No. 659 on the 16th day of November, 1995, descriptively entitled the City of Kendrick Water and Sewer Revenue Refunding Bonds, Series 1994 Ordinance (the Ordinance). The Ordinance relates to the water and sewer system of the City of Kendrick, Idaho and to the City's Parity Lien Water and Sewer Revenue Refunding Bonds of 1980 (the "Prior Bonds") and the issuance of the City's Water and Sewer Revenue Refunding Bonds, Series 1995 and in summary the Ordinance provides: definition of terms; authorization of refunding of the Prior Bonds in the amount of \$118,000; a description of the refunding of the Prior Bonds and improvements to the municipal water and sewer system; an authorization of the City to issue bonds in the principal amount of \$118,000 to be payable as to principal and interest solely from the net revenues of the City water and sewer system; a description of the bonds indicating that they will be in the denomination of \$5,000 bearing interest at the rates set forth in the Ordinance, for semiannual

payment of the principal of and interest on the bond on May 15 and November 15 of each year with the first payment due May 15, 1996, permitting no early redemption of the bonds; for bond registration, appointing First Security Bank of Idaho, N. A., as bond registrar, paying agent, escrow agent and transfer agent; that the City and its officers shall treat the person in whose name any bond is registered as the owner thereof; sets forth the procedure for the execution of the bonds, that the principal of and interest on bonds shall be payable solely out of the net income of the water and sewer system; that the facility to be acquired with the bond proceeds will be useful for at least fifteen (15) year or until December 1, 2010; for the bond preparation, execution and delivery; that the bond proceeds may be used to refund the Prior Bonds that the system shall be operated upon a fiscal year commencing October 1 in each year and ending September 30 of the following year; for the creation of a special fund and account known as the "Income Fund" into which all revenues of the water and sewer system shall be deposited; sets forth the procedures for the general administration of funds in the "Income Fund", the "1995 Sewer Revenue Bond Fund" and the

"1995 Sewer Revenue Reserve Fund"; the general administration of such funds; that the bonds constitute an irrevocable lien upon the net revenues of the water and sewer system; the procedure for issuing additional bonds; the privilege of and procedure for refunding any outstanding bonds constituting a lien on water and sewer system revenues; for protective covenants that the City agrees to with each and every holder, including, but not limited to, the use of bond proceeds, payment of bonds, authorizing use charges, levy of charges, efficient operations, record keeping, inspection rights of the purchaser, audits and budgeting requirements, billing procedures, use of bonds and reserve funds, charges and liens upon the system, construction contract and the bonding and insurance requirements to be provided by the City, requiring the City not to grant a franchise or license to any competing water or sewer systems within the City, providing the City shall not be allowed to sell or otherwise alienate the water and sewer system of the City, requiring the City not to extend or be a party to the extension of time for paying any claim for interest, obligating the City with regard to management of the system and requiring the City to provide a surety bond for the City Treasurer covering the receiving and
