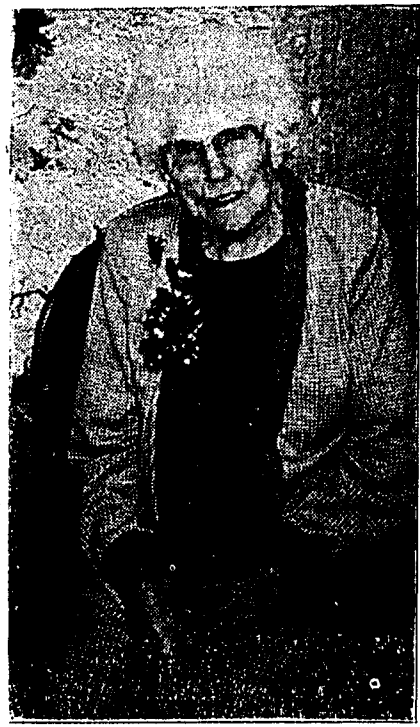

Virgil V. Hurlbert, 87, Am. Ridge Farmer, Dies December 3

Virgil V. Hurlbert, 87, long-time American Ridge area farmer, died of a heart attack Sunday, Dec. 3 at his rural Troy, Idaho home.

He was born June 21, 1908, to Alberta and Calle Horton Hurlbert in Walla Walla, Wash. He was reared by his grandmother and attended school in Clarkston, Wash.

He worked as a farm hand for his uncle in LaCrosse, Wash., for a short time before farming in Genesee, Idaho.

He married Myra Louise McCall Nov. 2, 1928, in Colfax, Wash. They farmed in Genesee until 1946 when they purchased a farm on American Ridge between Troy and Kendrick. They continued to farm there until he retired in the early 1980s. She died in November 1991.

For many years he had a dance band that played throughout the area. He also was an avid fisherman and enjoyed hunting.

He is survived by a daughter, Virginia Anderson of Deary, Idaho, and three grandchildren. He was preceded in death by a half brother.

A graveside service will be a 1 p. m. Thursday at the Moscow Cemetery. Rev. Marc Stroud of the Troy and Deary Lutheran churches will officiate.

The family suggests memorial may be made to the Deary Ambulance Fund.

Verna E. Vincent, 89, Bear Ridge Native, Passes December 3

Verna E. Vincent of Clarkston, a retired teacher, died Sunday, Dec. 3 of a stroke at St. Joseph Regional Medical Center at Lewiston. She was 89.

She was born June 20, 1906, in a log house on Big Bear Ridge to William H. and Zua Nedium Fairfield. She attended a country school, Clarkston High School, Lewiston Normal School and Wayne State University of Michigan at Detroit.

Drunk and Drugged Driving Prevention Month Begins

On Dec. 15, Idahoans are encouraged to participate in the national Lights On For Life Day. Motorists are asked to drive with their vehicle headlights on all day in memory of those persons who died or were injured in alcohol-involved crashes.

Last year in Idaho, 84 people lost their lives due to alcohol-related crashes and 1,970 people were injured. The deaths and injuries sustained from these crashes equated to an economic cost of more than \$80 million. The impact on individuals and families, and the economic cost to society are particularly significant when you consider that motor vehicle crashes are for the most part, preventable. Especially DUI.


