Christmas Memories—

Getting ready for Christmas wasn't an easy task for Mama. She had twelve children to shop and care for when the holiday season started on a large ranch four miles up the Little Potlatch Canyon near Juliaetta, Idaho.

She really enjoyed the excitement of the holidays. After Thanksgiving dinner was cleared away, names were drawn. Passing around the Whitman chocolates, she ask each one what they wanted Santa to bring.

Dad cut a special cord of Christmas wood months before and it was stacked and dried to be used only between Christmas and New Year's. He really made a big deal out of it as well as picking out the tree and bringing it home from up in woods with team and sled.

To find a hiding place we kids wouldn't find was a challenge. When Dad went to town on business, paint sets, color books, balls and bats were purchased along with a .22 rifle for Jr., Red Ryder BB guns for Lloyd and Bob. Cliff liked art supplies. Georgia and Carrie helped Mom wrap presents when we younger ones were fast asleep. A chore wagon for Billy and I and new wooden sleds for the boys were hidden in the garage, barn and milk house. Paint by number pictures and story books were tucked away in the large clothes basket. Mom and Dad tried to always shop with the local merchants and Marvin Long at N. B. Long & Sons in Kendrick put together a large order for chocolate drops, orange slices, hard candy, gum drops, mixed nuts and peanuts. A large box full of oranges wrapped in blue onion skin paper was always under the tree when we woke Christmas morning. Dad got up first and built fires in the kitchen and living room stoves. He "woke the older kids" which were usually laying "fully dressed" on top of the covers upstairs. I helped Mama get breakfast and set the table. It was understood no one touched the tree or presents until chores were done and everyone was up from the barn. Mama sliced grapefruit in half and sprinkled them with sugar placing one at each plate. We usually ate too much candy and she couldn't get us to eat much breakfast. The little ones, Kathy, Linda and Leonard, sat side-by-side on the couch, their eyes wide as saucers. The tree covered most of the living room and there was only room on top for the Christmas Angel as she touched the ceiling as she did for our 35 years. The branches went up two or three steps on the stairs so we usually had to crawl around them and jump off when we came down stairs. Dad, being the smart man he was, tied the tree to the wall so we wouldn't knock it over. All decorations were homemade. When we got electricity in 1946 Mom bought our first string of lights. Dorothy and Arnold would come down from Texas Ridge with baby Larry and his folks Fred and Mamie Zimmerman for dinner. Oh, how my mother loved company and her family! She always cooked and cared for other people's children from the time she as 14 until she took a waitress job in Moscow and met my father at age 21. She longed for a home and family of her own and I guess she really got it, and more too! When Daddy bought the Johns place on the corner of town in 1948 the big Christmas tree never went up again in the old ranch house and we only spent summers there. Mama and the girls, that is, Dad and my brothers batched and cooked for themselves, milked the cows and did chores. When Lula Bell Cunhans place as purchased in 1951, the dairy was moved there. The old ranch house stood empty until Jr. and Shirley married in 1954 and moved out there for a brief time. We had hard winters with snow covering the fence tops and the horses ran free. We coasted down from the wheat field to the barnyard laughing and hollering all the way!

Draper, 71, Passes December 14

Odetta M. Draper, 71, a longtime Kendrick and Lewiston area resident, died of cancer Thursday, Dec. 14, at her Lewiston home.

She was born January 22, 1924, at Leland, Idaho, to Herman F. and Viola Thornton Lohman. The family moved to Anatone to work on a cattle ranch. She attended schools at Anatone, graduating in 1942 from high school.

From 1943 to 1946 she lived at Bremerton, Wash., where she worked as a crane operator in the shipyards.

In 1946 she returned to Lewiston, where she worked at Nez Perce Tractor Co. for one year.

She married Ervin N. Draper on Feb. 5, 1948, at Clarkston.

After their marriage they moved to Leland, where they farmed for 24 years. They moved in 1970 to Kendrick, where she worked for Browning Cut Stock at Juliaetta.

For 14 years she worked for the Kendrick School District lunch program, retiring in 1986 and moving to Lewiston. Her husband died Oct. 10, 1994.

She was active in the St. Joseph Regional Medical Center Auxiliary and was a member of the Methodist church and Senior Citizens.

Her hobbies included quilt making, crafts and tending her home garden. She enjoyed spending time with family and friends.

She is survived by one son, Gary R. Draper of Everett, Wash.; one daughter Gayle V. Vandecar of Lewiston, three sisters, Juanita Talbot of Clarkston, Betty Pellegreen of Lewiston and Erma Campbell of Sandpoint; five brothers, Lavern Lohman and Everett Lohman, both of Lewiston, Jack Lohman and Gerald Lohman, both of Kendrick, and Dale Lohman of Clarkston; one grandson; and two step-granddaughters.

One sister, Dorothy Foredyce, died previously.

A service was held at 11 a. m. Monday at First United Methodist Church at Lewiston with Susan Butts officiating.

Cremation will take place with interment at Lewis-Clark Memorial Gardens at Lewiston. The family suggests memorial be made to First United Methodist Church or Hospice at Lewiston.





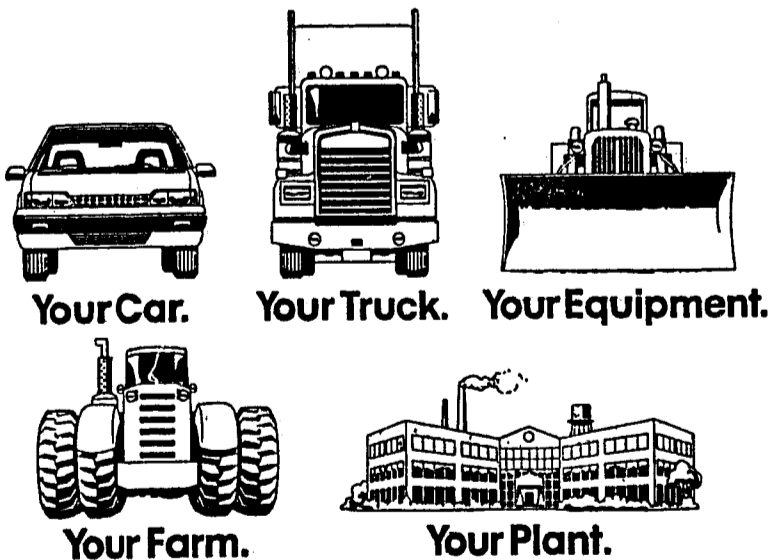
