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Plan on Retirement Before Need to Move Becomes Urgent

It's difficult to face the prospect of getting older; of reaching the point where maintaining the family home becomes a daunting task; of leaving one's familiar surroundings and moving into a retirement community.

Because it's difficult, many older adults put off too long the decision

to move. They wait until a crisis—declining health, or perhaps the death of a spouse—takes away their ability to remain independent and forces them into a choice that may not be best for them.

In a new book "Choices: Making a Good Move to a Retirement Community", two University of Washington faculty members take readers through the process of planning, deciding, moving and adjusting to retirement living. Dr. Heather Young is an assistant professor of nursing

and executive director of a retirement community in Seattle. Dr. Rhea de Tornyay, professor of nursing and former dean of the UW School of Nursing, has more than 40 years' experience working with older adults.

"Your working or family-raising years are about one-third of your life," said de Tornyay. "Retirement is another third of your life. As people live longer, they spend a longer time in retirement. As my mother said at age 94, 'I never planned to live this long.'"

Planning is the key to retirement living, say the authors. "Many of us spend more time planning for death than we do for living," said Young. "We make living wills and advance directives. We should plan the same way for retirement living."

"Moving takes place over time," said de Tornyay. "It's not just the day you change addresses. There's a time of preparation, and a time of settling in after you move. Planning can make the process go well."

People need to be aware that they have choices, say the authors. There are many options for retirement, from independent living to assisted-living communities. People have become more aware as consumers; they're more accustomed to comparison shopping, and should do the same as they weigh alternatives for retirement living.

The two researchers believe strongly that older adults need to take charge of their own planning for an eventual move. Others, like one's adult children, can help, but the authors' research shows that if seniors are involved in their own move, they do much better. "The kids may say 'Mom needs this,'" commented de Tornyay, "but Mom is saying 'I don't want anything to do with this.' Our society doesn't see older people as decision-makers."

While older adults should take charge of their move, they shouldn't be afraid to ask for help. The authors advise figuring out what you can delegate. Make your own decisions on what possessions to take

with you. Take time to give cherished possessions to loved ones in a meaningful way. And, they suggest, use the transition period as an opportunity to organize and simplify your life.

Paradoxically, many older adults find a new sense of independence once they're moved from the family home to a retirement community. Freedom from the demands of work, family life, home maintenance and homemaking, as well as support services and opportunity to pursue enjoyable activities. "Suburban neighborhoods may be great for raising kids," said de Tornyay, "but they're terrible for transportation if you don't drive, and for support services for older adults. Older people often become isolated in their homes."

"Many people wait too long to move," said Young. "They overestimate how long they'll be able to remain living on their own. It's important to become part of a new community earlier, rather than later."

Living in a retirement community or assisted living community can offer both privacy and the type of support that allows older adults to remain independent as long as possible, postponing the day when nursing-home care might be required. The retirement community offers a web of support; people can better maintain their health, with nutritious meals and a network of social ties and activities.

"The people who adjust best focus on gains, not losses," said de Tornyay. "Our interviews with residents of retirement communities showed that those who plan ahead make wiser decisions and are more satisfied with their choices."
