#### Maud H. Hunter, 92, American Ridge Native, Dies in Moscow Jan. 13

Maud Hazel Hunter, 92, a longtime Moscow resident, died Saturday, Jan. 13 at Good Samaritan Nursing Center at Moscow of causes related to age.

She was born Feb. 6, 1903, at Kendrick to Claus and Bertha (Otto) Eichner.

She went to primary school at American Ridge School and secondary school at the Ursuline Academy at Moscow.

She graduated from Lewiston State Normal School and worked as a teacher in the Spokane Valley. While there, she met Kenneth M. Hunter, a newspaper reporter for the Coeur d'Alene Press and later the Spokesman Review.

She had taught at the American Ridge School in 1921 and 1922. They were married Sept. 11, 1924

at Coeur d'Alene. They lived at Spokane until World War II, then moved to Colorado Springs, Colo. where he served in

the Army Air Force. Following the war, the couple returned to Spokane and she worked for Washington Mutual Bank until they moved to Moscow in the late

Her husband was director of publicity for athletics at the University of Idaho and she was active in numerous campus and community projects, including the Gritman Hospi-

tal Auxiliary. She also was an expert bridge olayer and avid golfer. He died Nov. 27, 1974.

Survivors include a sister, Julia M. (Lu) Simpson of Lewiston. She was preceded in death by three brothers, Otto, Tony and Harley Eichner, and a sister, Mabel

Austin. A private burial took place at Normal Hill Cemetery. No service was held.

Her family suggests memorial contributions may be made to the Latah County Historical Society.
