YOU CAN BLAME BACTERIA FOR WATER'S "ROTTEN EGG" SMELL

When tap water has a "rotten egg" odor due to the presence of hydrogen sulfide gas, it's time to fight the bacteria that are living in the hot water heater, says Ernestine Porter, University of Idaho Extension textiles and consumer environment specialist.

"The bacteria that produce the offensive gas will not endanger your health," Porter said, "but you'll want to control them." She suggests these lines of attack:

— Use of chlorine in the water system can control the problem-causing bacteria.

— Increasing the temperature of the hot water heater to 160 degrees for several hours should kill the bacteria. Afterwards, flush the heater and turn down the temperature. Be sure to avoid scalding yourself or

someone else. The high heating method should only be done if the hot water heater has a pressure relief valve.

— Flush low-flow lines and looping water mains to eliminate dead ends. This will reduce bacterial activity.

— Another approach to solving the problem is to locate a magnesium rod inside the heater. The rod's function is to corrode steadily, forming a protective coating on steel surfaces. It does a good job of protecting steel parts from corrosion, but it also produces excess electrons that provide bacteria with the energy needed to form hydrogen sulfide gas. A plumber can replace the magnesium rod with another material that does not produce so many electrons.

On the 16th of May, 1925, Mary Pauline Hays was born to Myrtle Julia and Albert W. Jones of Big Bear Ridge, near Kendrick, Idaho. She was a happy, sweet baby, the darling of her five sisters and five brothers. Pauline and her sisters and brothers grew up on a diversified farm during the depression, making their own recreation with Sunday School picnics, country school programs, and visiting neighboring farm families when school and chores allowed. There was also the miscellaneous snake snuck into the house, outhouse knocked over on Halloween, and other mysterious happenings.

Pauline attended Taney Grade School on Big Bear Ridge and when that school was closed, rode the bus to Kendrick, where she finished grade and high school. During World War II, she attended business college in Spokane, sharing an apartment with her sister Erma. Pauline moved to the Connell, Washington area in 1951. She and her first husband, Ray Shoemaker, farmed for the Francis Havalina family for many years. After Ray's death, Pauline moved into Connell, where she for many years worked at the B&H Apparel. In the late 1970s Pauline married Rodney Hays of Connell. Pauline and Rod were very active in the local American Legion, and she was an avid needle worker and a master cook. Despite ill health following Rod's death in 1993, she continued to hold many offices in the Women's Auxiliary of American Legion Post 195.

Pauline passed away at Sacred Heart Medical Center in Spokane, Washington February 8, 1996. At the time of her death, she was the historian of the American Legion Post 195 Women's Auxiliary. She leaves behind a multitude of beautiful afghans, quilts, tablecloths, and other needlework all given to her friends and family. Pauline is survived by her sister, Erma Bennett of Spokane, many nieces, nephews and cousins and numerous friends, all of whom remember her with love.
