"Unfortunately, disaster victims are at risk of being taken advantage of by those who will try to capitalize on others misfortune," said Boise attorney Stanley Tharp, state director of the American Bar Association Young Lawyers Division of the Dis-ter Legal Assistance Program. 'Our goal is to prevent this from happening by offering free legal advice to the victims and hopefully help these people rebuild their lives wthout additional complications."

Free legal advice is available in the areas of insurance claims, hospital bills, and loss of life or property; drawing up new wills and other legal papers lost in the flooding: home repair contracts and contractors, landlord/tenant problems; preparing powers of attorney; help with guardianship and other similar legal papers and any other area directly related to the flood disaster.

Flood distaster victims may obtain a referral to an attorney who will provide free legal advice by calling the Idaho State Bar Flood Disaster Hotline at 1-800-221-3295.

### Flood Waters Receding **But Health Risks Remain**

Contaminated flood water is serious threat to many family in Idaho( says Marilyn Swanson, University of Idaho Extension food saf-

ety specialist. "When you're cleaning and mopping up after a flood, be sure to protect yourself and your family from exposure to the raw sewage, oil. chemical wastes, and other contami-

nants contained in flood water, Swanson said, adding: "Keep children away from flood water and contaminated areas. Wash your hands very thoroughly after

you've worked in post-flood clean-The most frequent health problems after a flood are diseases that involve diarrhea, Swanson said.

After any storm that results in flooding, drinking water may be unsafe to use, Swanson said. "Listen to public service announcements and check with your local health depart ment regarding possible contamination of the water supply," she

"If flood water has entered cabinets or other food storage areas, food contamination is a potential danger," she emphasized. "Discard juice and other foods in cardboard boxes. paper, foil, cellophane or other flexible materials. It's risky to eat homecanned food that has been covered by flood water.'

She said one basic rule should be followed regarding food that may have been exposed to contamination: "If you can't be certain it's safe to use, throw it out!"
