He was born April 11, 1899 at Win-Kindergarten "A":: Sara Smith dom, Minnesota to John and Marie (Oveson) Slind, who had imigrated from Norway to Minnesota, drawn to this land of promise with a desire 1st Grade: Kayla Pea and Dustin to farm.

The family moved west to the Spokane area in 1899, which held 2nd Grade; Cassey Lohman and good promise for making a living for their growing family, and after reading an advertisement for Norwegian Lutheran settlers to come to Big Bear Ridge near Kendrick. The family purchased a homestead in 1902. It was that year that the initial planning began for the Bethany Lutheran Church. The Slinds were involved in the planning and construction of the Church and had been members ever since. The farm fulfilled the dreams of John and Marie and it was here that Oscar devoted his life to the land he loved and nurtured.






