Latah County Hazardous Waste Disposal Day Is Saturday April 27

Safe disposal of hazardous household chemical will again be available to every household in Latah

County free of charge on Saturday, April 27 between the hours of 8 and 4 at Tidyman's parking lot in Moscow. This annual collection event is sponsored by the City of Moscow, with additional funding from Latah County and Latah Sanitation, Inc. Supporting services are provided by Moscow Recycling and Tidyman's Common household hazardous chemicals that may be brought to Tidyman's disposal site on April 27 are: Insect killers, weed killers, air freshners, nail polish, nail polish removers, hair dyes, permanent wave kits, household batteries, auto batteries, moth balls, drain cleaners, oven cleaners, rug cleaners, spot removers, toilet bowl cleaners, metal polish car wax, bleach, floor wax, furniture polish, paints and stains, varnish, paint thinners, turpentine, solvents, gasoline, glues, motor oil, anti-freeze, photo chemicals.

NO explosives, NO asbestous, NO radioactive waste and NO infectious or biological waste allowed.

Candidate Minnick Reveals His Plan For Timber Industry

Accompanied by former Governor Cecil Andrus and emphasizing the need for certainty in timber harvests, U. S. Senate candidate Walt Minnick outlined a detailed plan to hep the timber industry and timberdependent communities in a series of meetings and campaign stops that included Kendrick last Thursday. Minnirk is the former President and CEO of TJ International, a \$630 million per year Boise-based building materials company.

While in Kendrick Minnick spent time on the streets and also in several local businesses, including the Gazette. "I've spent my entire life turning trees into jobs," he said. "I believe I bring the professional experience and industry background necessary to help Idaho's timber industry through these rough times."

Minnick will oppose incumbent Larry Craig in the November election. "I'm going to help Craig keep his word on term limits," Minnick ter, Roberta Horton of Nampa; three said, "he talks term limits at home sisters, Arlee Blewett of Lewiston, but doesn't vote it back in Washington.'

Also at the Gazette office waiting to listen and talk to Minnick were several local people including Everett Farrington and Jack Brown of Juliaetta. Farrington, a retired log-ging contractor, was critical of both the Forest Service's and big timber companies past logging practices. Farrington also told the candidate that the state needs an accurate ap-

praisal of what Idaho's timber supply really is, "we've got to find out what we've got," Farrington said,

before decision are made about how much logging to allow. "Fifty years ago I thought we'd never run out of timber-we wouldn't even cut Red Fir," he said. The veteran timberman also urged more selective logging, "we can't just cut it all."

The centerpiece of Minnick's proposal is a shift to 10 year forest planning whereby all timber sales would be incorporated into a forest's ten year plan. By making this change

Members of the committee would attend the regularly scheduled meeting called by construction authorities for that same reason and also serve to pass on to the authorities any public concerns and questions that they have become aware of.

Such a committee could also be used by the City Council to inform the public of its decisions and actions regarding the project.

The committee would not be responsible for—nor attempt in any way-to make policy decisions regarding construction.

Such a committee would consist of at least five members, including a representative of Kendrick's city government and at least one representative of Kendrick's business district. Members on the committee would not have to be residents of the City of Kendrick. Members will be appointed by the mayor. The committee will cease to exist upon the completion of the project.

In other topics and reports, the members heard reports from the Arts Committee, and the Framers Market committee. It was also learned that Kendrick and Juliaetta will have a combined Planning and Zoning Committee. The city's Disaster Plan is also being worked on. The local V. F. W. Post will assist in this. The possibility of railroad service in the area should be decided upon in the near future, reported Geo. Brocke, Jr.


