> Agree upon reasonable deadlines instead of "Do it now!

The next step in our learning process is the discovery that you get a lot more cooperation from your children if you don't demand that they do things immediately.

It's much better to provide a reasonable deadline: "Would it be reasonable for you to have your rooms cleaned up by Saturday?" This gives us some time to figure out what we could do if they don't comply. We can even learn to say, "Everyone who has a clean room by Saturday at 9 a. m. will be going skating with us." As soon as they discover we mean business, life will become
