The financial troubles of the Rochdale came to a head on July 12 when the Idaho Department of Agriculture's Bureau of Warehouse Control and the Commodity Indemnity Account Program determined that the Rochdale had failed as defined by Idaho Code and issued a Notice of failure. Facing this notice, the nineman board of directors called a membership meeting on July 19 where the 62 members present voted 53 to 9 to accept an offer from Stegner Grain and Seed to purchase the company. Board president Eddie Galloway and board secretary Dale Silflow signed the sale agreement Monday, afternoon, July 28 in Lew-

Both Galloway and Silflow, whose family history is deeply linked with the Rochade, Eddie is the third generation of Galloway to serve on the board of directors, expressed sadcated the board would stay in existance until all legal matters are resolved.
