When planning your vacation it is important to plan to secure your home while you're away. These few suggestions can help prevent heartache and personal loss.

1. Mark your valuables with an identification number such as your driver's license number.

2. Record all serial numbers and

3. Do not leave large amounts of cash, jewelry, or untraceable valu-

4. Consider renting a safe deposit box to store the above inormation

5. Try to find a trusted friend or relative to house sit while you're

are using, license number and travel itinery.

7. Personally contact the sheriff's dept. and notify them you will be gone and for how long, include the name of a neighbor as, a contact.

8. Don't make it common knowledge that you will be gone.

As you leave, check all locks, windows and doors. Leave a key with a trusted neighbor and make arrangements to do the following list:

- \* Pick-up newspapers and mail daily.
- Change the position of your drapes, leave a different light on.
- Clean up debris in the yard regularly.
- Watch your house and have them park their car in your driveway.
- Mow and water the lawn if needed.


