LEGAL NOTICE

CITY OF JULIAETTA Fair Housing Resolution

LET IT BE KNOWN TO ALL PERSONS of the City of Juliaetta that discrimination in the sale, rental, leasing, financing of housing or land to be used for construction of housing, or in the provision of brokerage services because of race, color, religion, sex, national origin is prohibited by Title VIII of the 1968 Civil Rights Act (Federal Fair Housing Law).

It is the policy of the City of Juliaetta to implement programs to ensure equal opportunity in housing for all persons regardless of race, color, religion, sex or national origin. The Fair Housing Amendments Act of 1988 expands coverage to include handicapped persons and families with children. Therefore, the City does hereby pass the following Resolution.

BE IT RESOLVED that within the available resources the City will assist all persons who feel they have been discriminated against because race, color, religion, sex, national origin, handicap, or familial status to seek equity under federal and state laws by filing a complaint with the Idaho Human Right Commission or the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, Seattle Regional Office Compliance Division.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City shall publicize this Resolution and through this publicity shall cause owners of real estate, developers and builders to become aware of their respective responsibilities and right under the Federal Fair Housing Law and amendments and any applicable state or local laws or ordinances.

SAID PROGRAM will at a minimum include, but not be limited to: (1) the printing and publicizing of this policy and other applicable fair housing information through local media and community contacts; (2) distribution of posters, flyers and any other means which will bring to the attention of those affected, the knowledge of their respective

Study Habits

Last a Lifetime

There's more to helping a child learn than asking: "Have you done your homework yet?" By providing a proper learning environment, support and encouragement, parents can help their children develop good study habits they can use for a lifetime.

"There are some simple things parents can do to help make learning easier and more enjoyable for their child," says Dr. Jan Carline, associate professor in the Department of Medical Education at the University of Washington. "These general guidelines can apply to students of any age—from grade school to college."

Providing a comfortable study environment is essential to maximizing study time. Carline suggests identifying one place in the home for school work, such as a desk in the study. This area should be free of distractions and equipped with pencils, paper, reference materials, or anything else that may be needed while studying.

"The child should be able to go to that area, sit down and get to work without having to get up and search around for things," Carline explains. "Don't select an area used for playing because you want a child to relate this space with studying."

Establishing a regular study time can be very helpful to cut back on conflicts with other activities and reduce disagreements. The time should be mutually agreed on by parent and child and selected for when the child is most alert. If your

child needs a nap immediately after school, schedule study time after dinner.

Children may vary in their preferences for study time and in their attention span. "Some students can study for 45 minutes, some can only study for 10 minutes," Carline relates. "You have to take into account what your kid is like."

Putting a positive spin on studying can also make hitting the books easier. Parents should not force the children to study or use studying as a punishment or replacement for other "enjoyable" activities such as playing or watching TV.

If getting a child to sit down and do homework is a challenge, Carline suggests setting simple expectations associated with small rewards. An example may be having a child study 30 minutes before a favorite TV show starts.

Help make learning an active process to keep interest and retention levels high. If homework consists primarily of reading, try having a child write up questions about the material to answer with you later or list the major ideas of what they have just read. When the reading is complete, parents can sit down and ask the child to teach them about the subject.

Recognizing a child's study accomplishments can help build a child's confidence and willingness to learn. This can include inquiring about and exam and providing fun alternative learning experiences, such as visiting a museum or watching a history show together on television.
