Ray Snyder, speaking on behalf of downtown business owners, identified the source of difficulty by saying, 'The trouble is, the town was'nt built level." More specififically, the elevation of buildings, particularly in the block between 6th and 7th Street, is an individual matter having less relevance to curb height and highway grade tha engineers might ideally desire. And the engineers designing the reconstruction did not take into account this typical oddity of a small town.

Instead, argue the critics, the Main Street project was designed as though the highway were out in open country. The critics hold that the engineers should have "shot" every building in the downtown section, determining its elevation, and then designing the curb height and sidewalk grade to match the real world. Not doing so has resulted in some nesses. And in some tacky modifications by way of solution.

The State Transportation Department sticks by its responsibility to stalling sidewalk. At the same time, they stand ready to have the city or the private property owner assume potential liability by doing whatever they ask be done by way of a solu-

The purpose of Child Find is to identify children who have some individual needs that result from disabilities (handicaps) or developmental delays.

Child Find helps determine if a child has a disability and what type of educational services would meet his or her needs.

What is Child Find Looking For? Child Find is looking for children with disabilities, especially children

between 3 and 21 years of age. Child Find is looking for children who are "not exactly the same as for raking. Donation basis. Please others their age". These youngsters may have difficulty walking, talking, hearing, or learning. Or they 1t22p may have behavioral problems.

Who Can Call Child Find? Parents. Grandparents. Doctors. Teachers. Anyone concerned about a youngster who isn't eactly the same as others the same age.

Many of the youngsters who are eferred to Child Find may be entitled to special education and rereferred to Child Find may be entitled to special education and related services. And, the younger the child the more effective those services will be.
