**IN OUR OPINION—
 Snake River Dam Bypass
 Is Only One of Many
 Options for Salmon Recovery**

 Devising scientifically credible, economically feasible salmon recovery measures is one of the most complex challenges facing the Pacific Northwest. It is a complex challenge because recovery measures must demonstrate both biological and economic effectiveness before they can be funded, and they must fit within a limited annual budget of about \$435 million. In 1997, the Northwest Power Planning Council will take up this challenge as we amend our Columbia River Basin Fish and Wildlife Program.

ly to generate the most controversy. A similar reservoir-lowering has been suggested for John Day Dam on the Columbia River.

Lowering these reservoirs permanently, whether by removing parts of the dam or modifying them in some other way, make the river flow around, or bypass, the dams. Permanent drawdown and bypass at these dams, whether at natural-river level or a higher level, is seen as a means of restoring riverine habitat where young salmon rest and feed during their migration to the ocean, and adult fall chinook salmon spawn.

Until recently, bypassing the dams was considered implausible—and it may be. But the idea gained new interest—and controversy—as the result of three recent scientific reports. None flatly recommends it, but each discusses dam bypass as an option for salmon recovery. Continued barge transportation of juvenile salmon downstream past the dams also remains an option. The U. S. Army Corps of Engineers is investigating salmon recovery options or the dams, including draw-downs and continued transportation, and will decide on a permanent strategy by mid-1999. The Corps is required by law to take our fish and wildlife program into account when it makes such decisions.

Meanwhile, as we amend our program in 1997, the Council will face a difficult balancing act. It is likely that dam bypass would increase er Snake River in order to lower salmon survival, particularly of endangered Snake River fish. On the

other hand, dam bypass would have social and economic impacts. The Council's challenge will be to seek a balance between biological benefits and economic impacts of recovery measures for salmon, as well as for other fish and wildlife, and to devise appropriate mitigation where it is needed.

When we begin amending our fish and wildlife program next February, a process likely to last into

mid-1998, dam bypass will be one of many complex and controversial issues we will consider. With the advice of our scientific and economic panels, and with active public participation, we will devise a pack-

The Facts of Foot Pain

Do your feet ache? Well, you're not alone. Sore feet are a common, bothersome problem for many people. Since opinions and remedies about alleviating foot pain are as plentiful as the troubles themselves. It's important to understand some basic facts about the causes and treatment of foot woes.

"The majority of foot problems actually stem from one or two underlying causes," explains Dr. Sigvard Hansen, head of foot and ankle surgery at University of Washington and Harborview medical centers. "A lot of people treat the symptoms of foot problems—such as bunions, calluses, or heel pain—but they won't treat what's really causing them."

Some foot problems can be traced to the leg. Tight muscles in the upper calf that lead to the Achilles tendon can cause the tendon to tighten. This tightness, which pulls the heel upward, results in too much weight being placed on the front of the foot. If not treated, this can lead to a variety of problems such as bunions, calluses, inflammation of the foot, inflammation of the Achilles tendon, or flat foot following the rupture of a tendon at the back of the lower leg.

Another source of foot pain is the first tarso metatarsal joint of the foot—the point where the toes bend away from the foot. Hansen explains that a looseness in this joint results in a flattening of the foot (lack of an arch support). Without such support, people may experience pain under the ball of the foot.

Treating these abnormalities is relatively simple, Hansen explains. A tight tendon can be remedied by lengthening it; a simple outpatient procedure. This allows the Achilles tendon to relax and more weight to go comfortably to the heel. Surgery can also be performed to fuse the first tarso metatarsal joint in the mid foot and bring back needed weight bearing in the area of the big toe.

If not treated early, basic foot problems will lead to further discomfort. Being overweight, standing for long periods of time on hard surfaces or engaging in high-impact exercise can increase the progression and severity of secondary problems.

"People can ignore basic foot problems and think they're normal," he says. "But while you may adjust, the problems will eventually worsen and most likely require treatment." Hansen says it's also important to clarify some of the myths about foot pain. Here are the real answers to some of the the more commonly held beliefs:

— High heels are bad news—Wearing shoes with a heel can actually be better for the feet, especially in cases of people with a tight Achilles tendon. By raising the heel, pressure on the front of the foot may be lessened. Hansen points out that shoes with an overly high heel or narrow toe box are not good for feet.

The Hon. Ida Rudolph Leggett, District Judge with resident chambers in Nez Perce County, has been elected to the position of Administrative District Judge for the Second Judicial District, by vote of her colleagues on the district court bench.

— Foot surgery is the last resort—People can be spared further troubles by having some foot problems corrected early with minor surgery. Hansen says people should keep in mind that it takes several weeks to recover from surgery.

— Foot problems only affect older people—Foot problems can affect people of all ages, from young children to senior citizens. Hansen points out that one to two percent of adolescent girls have bunions, and that the rate at which the foot problems develop depends on each individual.

— Over the counter remedies are the best cure—While many store-bought products are helpful in providing immediate relief from secondary foot problems, they will not help the trouble disappear.

Early warning signs of foot troubles include a tight feeling in the back of the heel, pain in the back side of the ankle or a sudden change in the shape of the foot. Hansen advises anyone experiencing these troubles to visit an experienced orthopedist or podiatrist.

**New Laws Affecting
 Idaho Drivers
 Begin January 1**

As of January 1, Idaho drivers will be subject to several new laws passed by the 1996 Idaho Legislature:

A. License Suspension for Deadbeat Parents—Senate Bill 1304

This bill suspends the Idaho driver's and vehicle salesman licenses of anyone 90 days or \$2,000 behind in child-support payments. Notices will be notified to take appropriate action, who then has 21 days to appeal the suspension at a hearing before the Department of Health and Welfare. If no appeal is filed, the suspension will go into effect, and the Idaho Transportation Department will be notified to take appropriate action in the case of drivers and vehicle licenses.

B. Release of liability to protect motor vehicle sellers

Beginning Jan. 1, a release of liability law protecting motor vehicle owners goes into effect in Idaho. When the owner of a motor vehicle sells or transfers a vehicle (in compliance with the requirements of the law), he or she cannot be held liable if negligence in the subsequent operation of the motor vehicle results in death or injury of a person or property.

Anyone who sells or transfers a vehicle will need to submit a release of liability statement to the Idaho Transportation Department* within five days of the transaction, along with a \$2 fee. Although the title will continue to display the seller's name until it has been properly transferred into the new buyer's name, the transportation department will record the release of liability in a computer database as proof of non-liability. Release of liability forms are available at any county assessor auto licensing office.

Anyone who acquires a vehicle is required to present the title for transfer into their name within 30 days of the transaction. Failure to do so will result in a \$20 late filing fee. Vehicle owners are also reminded to keep their license plates when they sell a vehicle.

*Automobile dealers are exempt from this requirement. However, vehicle owners who trade in their vehicles to dealers must submit a release of liability statement.

C. New License Plates—Senate Bill 1553

Idaho vehicles will be sporting slightly modified license plates. The change won't be immediately noticeable to anyone—except law enforcement. The new plate design will still feature the red, white and blue colors, "Scenic Idaho" and "Famous Potatoes" captions, and the same mountains and trees in the background. The mountains and trees have been toned down, as has the red coloring. A white background will be more prominently displayed in the center where the plate's numbers are located. The county designator will also be full size. These features will make the plates easier to read at night and at greater distances.

D. License Plates for Military Veterans—Senate Bill 778

The department will offer a license plate for military veterans.
