## Phone Service Disrupted In Area January 9

Long distance telephone service was restored last Thursday, Jan. 9, after being severed about 10 a. m. that morning. According to a spokesman for U S West, a crew from the Washington Water Power Co. was replacing a line and hit a fiberoptic cable about 10 a. m. near the Cougar Ridge subdivision between Lewiston and Lapwai.

The cable, 48 small fiberoptic cables sheathed in one large cable, carries long-distance lines for Koooskia, raignCont, Lapwai, Cottonwood, Juliaetta, Kendrick, Kamiah, Nezperce and Grangeville. Smaller long distance companies that use the cable were hit as well.

Service was restored by a U S crew out of Clarkston early Thursday. About 10,000 homes and businesses were affected.

The J-K Ambulance was caused some problems because of the disruption of service when calls to the relay center in Boise were unable to be made. The ambulance received three calls for assistance that day. Radio was used to send transmission calls to dispatch ambulances from Troy, Deary and Kendrick.

## Math Tests Coming Up For Some Students

The Idaho State Department of Education is preparing to test the mathematics ability of all fourth and eighth grade students on Tuesday, January 28, 1997.

The assessment will take 60 minutes to complete and must be handwritten using a number 2 pencil. There is no makeup allowed for this mathematics assessment, so parents are asked to help students to be present on that day to do their best. All mathematics answer sheets will be sent to Boise to be scored by a group of teachers from around the state. Each answer sheet will be evaluated by two teachers for:

- \* understanding basic mathematical skills
  - \* understanding the situation in the problem
  - \* communication skills associated with mathematics
  - \* process skills associated with finding the correct answer
- Students will answer the first problem and choose 3 of the remaining 4 problems to complete. Each problem has more than one part to answer and will require showing ALL work for that problem.

The writing ability of all fourth, eighth and eleventh grade students will be tested on February 4.

Students at the jr. high and high school will be writing during second and third hours. The test will last 90 minutes to complete and must be handwritten using either a blue or black ink pen (not felt tip). The elementary will be writing in the morning for an hour. There is no makeup allowed for this writing assignment so parents are asked to help students be present on that day. All writing assignments will be sent to Boise to be scored by a group of teachers from around the state. Each paper will be read by two people and will be scored as follows:

1. ability to set forth ideas and related thoughts that are logical and communicative on the assigned topic.
  2. readability of the writing.
  3. competence in the use of spelling, capitalization, punctuation, indentation, subject-verb agreement, noun-pronoun agreement, phrases, clauses, and sentences that are rhetorically and/or grammatically correct.
- Other students at both the secondary and elementary will be writing at the same time, with those papers being read for recognition at the local and state level.

Kendrick basketball fans were treated to a thriller Saturday night as the KHS Tigers took the Highland Huskies into double overtime and won 75-69. A total of eight players—five from Kendrick and three from Highland—fouled out in the match. Kendrick is now 2-3 in league play and 3-4 on the season.

Kendrick had suffered an early season loss to the Huskies but came into Saturday's contest as if they were the favorites. Cam Wallace hit the first points of the game with a short jumper 30 seconds after the game began and increased the lead to 8-3 by mid-way through the quarter. It wasn't until late the first that Highland got its offense moving and took the lead 12-11, Bryan Carter hit a two-pointer from in under the basket to give KHS the go-ahead point at the end of first 13-12. Highland paced by Phillip Way kept close to the Tigers in the second quarter and the half ended in a 25-25.

Neither team was able to gain an advantage in the second half—KHS outscored the Huskies 25-21 in the third quarter and Highland had outscored Kendrick 15-11 in the 4th quarter as the regular time ran out with the score 61-61.

Each team traded basket in the first overtime getting 4 point and the first OT ended 65-65.

Five Tigers—Matt Tefft, Richie Hitchcock, Cam Wallace, Tim Fischer and Bryan Carter all left the game via the five foul route and it was Alfonso Sahagun and Tony Cappa, both from the KHS bench who helped make the difference. ## If I Could Do It All Over Again

First of all, I would have given them a lot more hugs and reminded them more frequently of how proud I was to be their father. I too often assumed they knew how much I loved them and besides, I grew up with a father who did not feel right about touching us and bragging to us about what great kids we were. We all found later that he bragged to everyone else about us. You can't do too much touching hugging and expressing your genuine love.

**Criticism**  
I would have spent less time telling them what was wrong with their lives and a lot more time reminding them of their accomplishments. My years of experience have caused me to meet thousands of people who are stymied by their negative beliefs about themselves. Most of these people have taken over their parents' criticism by constantly telling themselves how incapable they are.

The most important issue about criticism is that children who grow up with criticism grow up to be critical adults who are chronically unhappy. They usually only feel good about themselves when they know what is wrong with others.

Have you ever heard of constructive criticism? There is no such thing! Kids don't learn from being told what they are doing wrong. They learn when loving adults allow to learn from experience.

I would have spent more time telling my kids why I did things, not why they should. I would have spent more time allowing them to make mistakes and then being genuinely sad for them as they lived with the consequences and learned from their mistakes. A little of this does more teaching than a ton of criticism.

**Warnings and Threats**  
"As long as you live in this house you are not going to drink. If I catch you drinking, you're in big trouble!" This kind of warning does no good. Kids who hear this become more stubborn, defiant or anxious. Instead, parents who state their expectations for their kids in a calm way get better results.

For example, "Josie, you are welcome to drive the family car as long as I don't have to worry about alcohol." Notice that this is not a warning. It is just an enforceable statement.

In the event that Josie uses alcohol, the parent can calmly state, "Josie, I smelled alcohol on your breath last night. What's your guess about the family car?"

"I don't get to use it?"

"Right, Josie. Good thinking."

"Well, when do I get to use it again?"

"I don't know, Josie. I guess that will depend upon when I stop worrying about the use of alcohol. Try not to worry about it."

Needless to say, Josie will do some major worrying at this point. The consequence for her misbehavior came "like a lightning bolt out of the sky."

I met a responsible young man who looked back on his father's parenting styles with great admiration saying, "When I was a teen, I thought my father never gave me any slack. He always punished me when I did something wrong."

"Later, I found out it was not my dad, but me, who up the clamps on my behavior. My Dad never warned me about consequences. He just laid them on when I did something wrong. After a while a voice played in my head telling me that if I did something wrong, my dad would do something. I never knew what if was going to be, and I didn't especially want to find out, so I behaved myself instead." (This article will be continued in next week's Kendrick Gazette.)
