Helen I. Clark, 85, Former Area Resident, Died January 28

Helen I. Clark, 85, a longtime Lewiston resident and retired sales clerk, died of pneumonia Tuesday, January 28 at the Lewiston Rehabilitation Center.

She was born July 17, 1913, to Luther M. and Mary E. Henderston Snyder at Southwick. When she was a small child the family moved to Juliaetta, where she attended school.

She married Willard S. (Keith) Clark June 6, 1928, at Moscow. The couple made their home on farm on Fix Ridge near Juliaetta. They farmed there until the winter of 1943.

They then moved to Lewiston, where they lived most of the rest of their lives. She worked as a sales clerk for J. C. Penney as well as for the Idaho Department Store, both formerly in downtown Lewiston. She also worked some summers for Seabrook Farms, a Lewiston cannery. She retired in 1996.

She is survived by her husband at the couple's Lewiston home; a son, Gale Clark of Lewiston; a daughter, Marilyn Jean Clark Armstrong of Van Buren, Ark.; two sisters, Corrine Ogden of Lewiston and Iona Garner of Cullendale; two brothers, Bernard Snyder and Ervin Draper, both of Lewiston; eight grandchildren; 20 great-grandchildren, and 12 great-great-grandchildren.

The funeral was held Friday at Mountain View Funeral Home at Lewiston. Burial followed at Lewis-Clark Memorial Gardens.

Margaret Amelia (Millie) Corkill, 81, a longtime Kendrick homemaker and retired reporter, died Wednesday, Jan. 29, at the Royal Plaza Care Center at Lewiston of cancer.

She was born March 4, 1915, to Edwin and Margaret Turnbull Brookshaw at Alexander, Manitoba, Canada.

She attended Daybreak School at Neville, Saskatchewan, Canada.

She married Louis Wilbur Corkill, Dec. 14, 1937, at Swift Current, Saskatchewan. The couple moved to Kendrick after their marriage.

She was a regional reporter for the Lewiston Morning Tribune for many years and also reported for the Kendrick Gazette.

Her husband died in 1980.

She was a Nez Perce County voter registrar and a member of the county election board for many years.

She belonged to the Leland Methodist Church and the Kendrick Community Methodist Church for 59 years and the Kendrick Grange for 54 years.

She was a life member of the Hill and Valley Garden Club and belonged to the Kendrick Camper Klub and Golden Sunset Senior Citizens.

She was known for the cakes she baked and decorated for weddings and other occasions. She took pride in her flower garden and arrangements. She enjoyed playing bridge, square and round dancing and picking huckleberries.

She is survived by a son, Louis Edwin Corkill of Kendrick; a daughter, Margaret Patricia Heimgartner of Clarkston; a brother, Reginald David Brookshaw of Surrey, British Columbia, Canada; six grandchildren; and eight great-grandchildren. A son, Larry Gene Corkill, preceded her in death.

The funeral was Saturday at the Kendrick Community United Methodist Church with the Rev. Susan Butts officiating.

Frank Barton, Former Kendrick Attorney, Dies January 28

Frank Vincent Barton, 77, a Lewiston lawyer in practice since 1952, who also maintained a law office in Kendrick, died Tuesday, January 28 from complications of Alzheimer's disease at Lewiston's Idaho State Veterans Home.

Barton first established his Lewiston practice in the Carrows Building at the age of 33, returning to Lewiston after service in the Korean War, and retired in October 1990.

He was born Feb. 4, 1919, at Winchester, the son of Ruth Reilly and Max Barton.

He attended Lewiston schools, entered Lewiston State Normal School (now Lewis-Clark State College) in 1938, and attended the University of Idaho from 1939 to 1940.

His first of two active military callings was in World War II as a member of Lewiston-based Troop I, 116th Cavalry, Idaho National Guard, which he had joined at the age of 16 in 1934.

He served from September 1940, first with the 940th Field Artillery Battalion in Europe, and was discharged as a captain in December 1946. He returned to the University of Idaho in January and completed undergraduate degree.

He graduated from the University of Idaho law school in January 1951 and was associated with the law firm of Parry, Kennan, Robertson and Daley at Twin Falls.

He was recalled to military service in July 1951 in the Korean War. He served with the First Armored Division at Ft. Hood, Texas, and was sent to Korea in April 1952.

He was attached to the office of the Judge Advocate General of the 25th Division, serving as a defense counsel for courts martial, until his discharge in October 1952. His Lewiston practice opened a month later.

He married Geneva P. Kite of Juliaetta on Feb. 4, 1942, at Lewiston.

He was the city attorney of Kendrick for many years and maintained a law office until he retirement.

He was active in both Nez Perce and Lewiston political and civic affairs.

He was a member of the Lewiston Gun Club, Clarkston Golf and Country Club and a life member of the Lewiston Elks Lodge. He enjoyed hunting, fishing, trapshooting and golf.

Survivors, in addition to his wife, include a daughter, Charlene Archibald of Suisan, Calif.; a son, Douglas Barton of Lewiston; and four grandchildren.

Rosary and a funeral Mass was celebrated at Our Lady of Lourdes Catholic Church in Lewiston. Burial was a Normal Hill Cemetery in Lewiston.

January Rainfall Almost 4 Inches

Although the threat never materialized there was enough rain and snow during the month of January to cause worry about flooding. Frank Dammarell, who records rainfall at his ranch on the southwest end of Big Bear Ridge, reported this week that there was 3.8 inches of rain in this 31 day period. Dave Morgan who keeps track of the moisture at his home on school house hill recorded 3.6 inches of rain. There was 2.8 inches of rain in January of 1996, just before the floods of last year but the difference was in the snowfall and when it came and went. The 1996 January rainfall was 2.8 inches, but there was 41" of total snow. This year while the rainfall was 3.8 there was 24 inches of snow, and it was the snow pack melting so quickly that caused the problems.

Facts on Blood Donation

There's no substitute for human blood—vital for delivery oxygen and nutrients, removing waste, healing and fighting infection. A person's blood can, however, be shared with others.

Every day, thousands of Americans in need of lifesaving blood, including trauma victims and surgery patients, rely on the efforts of volunteer blood donors.

"We need a steady flow of blood donors to keep our blood supply stable," says Dr. Thomas Price, professor of medicine at the University of Washington and medical director for the Puget Sound Blood Center. "Many people are eligible to be donors. The biggest requirement is being healthy."

Approximately 4 million Americans receive donated blood each year, a demand of nearly 40,000 units each day.

Donating blood is a simple, relatively painless procedure that requires a small time commitment.

Understanding the steps involved with donating can make it easier for those who may be considering rolling up their sleeves.

In addition to good health, blood donors must weigh at least 110 pounds, be at least 18 years of age or be 16 and have parental permission. Those who are currently taking medications such as aspirin, allergy medication, sleeping pills and Tylenol are still eligible to donate, as are those who have received a hepatitis B vaccine.

People who cannot donate include anyone who has a blood-borne disease or who might be at high risk of contracting one. Other conditions excluding potential donors are being pregnant, having low iron or having a cold or the flu. Those who have been in a malaria area during the past year or who have had malaria within the last three years also cannot donate.

Prior to donating, volunteers must complete a standard screening procedure. This includes filling out a questionnaire on health history and answering standard health question screening. Donors will then receive a brief physical exam, which includes reading of temperature, pulse and a test anemia.

After completing the screening process, persons may be deferred from donation if they fail to meet any one of the requirements. "Donors need to understand that we don't want them to be at risk," Price says. "We want to make sure there's no chance that giving blood may do them harm."

Donors who satisfy screening requirements will then have approximately one pint of blood extracted. The entire process usually lasts 45 minutes. Price points out that a person cannot contract hepatitis or AIDS by donating blood.

Catfish can be raised for food inside a solar greenhouse. They are kept in translucent silos filled with water. If at their first daily feeding the catfish rapidly swim to the surface, stick their heads out of the water and gulp for food, everything is o. k. If they are sluggish or don't come to the surface, promptly change the water.

For standard residential construction with wall studs on 16-inch centers, plan on using one stud per linear foot of wall plus two per opening and you'll be pretty close.
