Martha Wilken To Observe 100th Birthday Feb. 16

On February 16, Martha Wilken will be celebrating her 100th birthday anniversary at Emmanuel Lutheran Church in Moscow. All her friends are invited to the observance which will be held from 2 to 4 p. m. in the church social room.

Martha Finke Wilken was born in LaMars, Iowa, on February 19, 1897. Her family moved to Cameron, Idaho, when she was about two years old. Her father, a Lutheran minister, was one of the early pioneer preachers in the Pacific NW. After serving in several other congregations, the family settled in Cameron where he preached for about twenty years.

Her mother died when Martha was five years old. He father married her mother's sister. Her step-mother died when Martha was 18 and she was left to care for her younger brothers and sister, the youngest of whom was 2 years old.

Her memories of her childhood include how poor the family was. Food was scarce and they had to depend on the generosity of congregational members. Their mattresses were sacks stuffed with straw and laid on a board. She and her sisters had two dresses each—one for everyday and one for Sunday. But her stepmother was good to the children and they got along all right.

After a few years, she began working out as a maid. She worked for the Alford family in Lewiston for a while and in Spokane and Portland at the Multnomah, a large fancy hotel.

Martha married George Wilken in 1923. They had three children, Kenneth, Margaret (Kerbrat), and Marlene (Meyer). They lived on George's family farm near Cameron.

In the early days on the farm, harvest was an especially busy time, as it is now. She would get up at 4:30 to prepare breakfast for the threshing crew. Then midmorning lunch at 9:00, noon dinner at 12:00, afternoon lunch at 3:30 or 4:00, and supper around 7. The men, too, had to get up early to feed the horses and couldn't work into the night as they do now as the horses would get too tired, unlike the tractors of today. She made hundreds of cookies ahead of time to prepare for when the threshing crew came to their place. Many cakes and pies were baked as well to feed to the crews.

On the farm she always had a big vegetable garden and canned hundreds of jars of fruits and vegetables each year. She and George butchered hogs and cured sausages, hams and bacon for the winter. They also raised chickens and milked cows.

When her youngest child was born, the doctor told her husband that she wouldn't live very long because of a heart problem. This was in 1933.

She was a great cook and made especially delicious pies. Her husband always bragged about them. One of her special treats was chocolate popcorn balls. She says now the reason she lived so long was because she ate plenty of sweet things. "Sugar is a preservative."

Martha was baptized and raised in the Lutheran faith and attended the Lutheran church at Cameron. She played the old pump organ there for about six years and was active in the Women's Missionary Society and the Ladies Aid. She was one of the first members of the Cameron Home Demonstration Club and took part in the many projects of that group.

After 44 years of marriage her husband died in 1967. They had lived on the farm until he had a heart attack and was forced to retire. They moved to Kendrick and their son, Kenneth, took over the farm.

She became quite ill a while after her husband died, and Effie Powell came to live with her and care for her. Effie stayed with her for almost 20 years. After Effie "retired" again, several other ladies came to care for her until she became unable to walk and so had to enter Good Samaritan. She spoke affectionately of these women as "my ladies."

When the Golden Sunset senior citizens group was formed in Kendrick, she was a part of it. Martha acted as registrar at the senior citizen meal site for about fifteen years.

In 1986, she helped celebrate the 100th anniversary of the farm on which she and her husband lived. It has been designated as an Idaho Centennial Farm.

She has always loved to play games. At grade school one of her favorites was called "pump-pump-pull-away." She liked checkers, dominoes and any game the grand-kids could talk her into playing with them; but her all-time favorite is pinocle.

Stevenson, who are missionaries to the Republic of Northern Ireland. The Stevensons were appointed missionaries in 1971, serving first in Bolivia as Mission Directors. In 1984 they were transferred to Spain and in 1987 they were requested to reestablish the work of the Nazarene Church in the Republic of Northern Ireland. A strong Church has now been planted there with building and continued outreach plans in place.

Rev. Stevenson received his Theology degree at the British Isles Nazarene College and Certificate of Printing from the College of Technology. He was ordained as a Nazarene Minister on the British Isles North District.

The Stevensons have three children: Howard, married and living in Johannesburg, South Africa; Gwyneth Muriel, married and living in Michigan; and Joanna Jane, married and living in Northern Ireland.

The 'Missions Work Team' at the Juliaetta Nazarene Church meets regularly to help meet the needs on the mission fields. Some of the projects completed include: boxes of used clothing for world needs areas, boxes of quilts for Madagascar, and in March a shipment of medical supplies will be sent to Bulgaria.

Martha grew up speaking both German and English. In those days they had German school for a few months of the year. Her dad taught this, and of course, she and her brothers and sisters attended. Public (English) school was held for only a few months of the year also. It depended on when they could get a teacher as well as on the weather and how many children were needed at home to help with the work on the farms.

When the Cameron Lutheran Church was writing its history for its 90th anniversary, she translated records and early writings from German to English and remembered stories about the early days. She was able to identify many of the people on old pictures and tell about the events at which they were taken.

She has outlived all her friends from her early days, but because Martha has a real interest in and enjoyment of people, she has made many new friends.

Her mind is still active and good. She is unable to walk because of knee problems, but gets around with a wheelchair. Martha has lived at Good Samaritan in Moscow for the past two and one-half years.

Disaster Assistance Deadline Nears

It is important that everyone is aware of the upcoming deadline for applying for disaster assistance through the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) via the Tele-registration number at 1-800-462-9029.

March 5, 1997 is the last day to apply for most disaster assistance programs. These programs are available to victims of the severe winter storms and flooding which occurred between Nov. 16, 1996 and Jan. 3, 1997.

Low interest loans from the U. S. Small Business Administration (SBA) are the primary form of federal assistance for long-term recovery for homeowners, renters, and businesses of all sizes. If you are not approved for a SBA loan, you may be eligible for an Individual and Family Grant (IFG).

The IFG program is a safety net available only to individuals and families. It is not applicable to businesses. IFG is intended to meet essential needs not met by any other forms of assistance. Grant monies do not have to be repaid.

You will be limiting your options by not returning your SBA application. Your loan packet must be returned or you will jeopardize your chances for any non-SBA recovery assistance.

Improving Johnson Manor is Goal of Management

To renovate and update all 22 of the apartments of Juliaetta's Johnson Manor is the goal of the management and the project is currently underway, according to Sandy Wheeler, who has been in charge of the 22-unit complex for the past three years. Johnson Manor Apartments is a community for senior citizens and/or disabled and was constructed in Juliaetta in the early 1970s.

The 22 apartments, 1 bedroom and 1 bath units have carpeting, vinyl blinds, range, refrigerator and air conditioning. There is a day room with a full kitchen, a patio and an area for gardening. Several of the apartments have been updated and that is the plan for all the apartments until all have been completed.

David Bolin of Everett, Wash. is the owner of Johnson Manor, which is now managed by Dujardin Property Management, Inc. Steve Apodaca of Everett is the property manager. Sandy Wheeler is the resident manager.

Wheeler and Apodaca said their goal is to complete all renovations, inside and out, to make Johnson Manor an attractive, affordable asset for the residents and the communities of Juliaetta and Kendrick. A public open house is planned later to re-acquaint area residents and prospective renters with the facilities that are now available.

The parking area was updated in 1994, with new paving and striping added. The landscaping is taking time and improving each year—it all takes patience, time and money.

Senior persons and/or disabled with incomes of less than \$21,150 (single) or \$24,200 (two people) may qualify. Rent is based on 30% of adjusted gross income.

Ms. Wheeler invites any who are interested to stop by the office or call her and she will be happy to show those who wish around and answer any questions.

Tiger Girls Win Trip to State

The Kendrick High School girls' basketball team won a trip to the state tournament at Middleton and Kuna next week. KHS had to come back through the loser's bracket to win its place. Kendrick defeated Deary 42-30 in its 1st tournament game; lost 39-37 to Troy Friday night; came back and romped to a 71-41 over Deary Monday night and then edged out Troy 43-41 on Tuesday in overtime play to force an extra game contest on Wednesday. The extra game was needed to determine which team would be the District II champions.

Tuesday night the Tigers got off to an early lead with its effective full court press and were ahead 10-4 at the end of the first quarter. Troy battled back and were trailing 18-16 at the half. The two teams each scored 11 points in the third quarter. Troy went ahead on free throws with 1:06 left in the game and added two more points with just 28 seconds remaining, 41-38. In the final frantic seconds, Ferris Dudumake hit a three-pointer to tie the game with 10 seconds left.

In the overtime period Rachele Eberhardt was fouled and went to the free throw line where she sank both shots to give Kendrick the 43-41 victory.
