Parent Project to Begin in Lewiston March 4

Nez Perce County Juvenile Probation will be presenting an award winning collaborative parenting skills program specifically designed to help parents prevent and intervene in the most destructive of adolescent behaviors. The project operates in conjunction with schools, local law enforcement, mental health care professionals, juvenile courts, probation, and community based organizations.

The project goal is to reduce drug use, gang violence, high school dropouts and family conflict by identifying and assisting concerned parents of high risk youth.

This model program has received the "Distinguished Program of the Year" award by the California Youth Authority. Because of its specific focus on the prevention and intervention of the most destructive of adolescent behaviors, the Parent Project is the ideal parent education program for parents of high risk youth.

Program facilitators will be Julie Hamm, Renee Behrens and Randy Martin, from Nez Perce County Department of Juvenile Probation.

First class beginning Tuesday, March 4, through June 17; second class beginning Thursday May 8 lasting through Aug. 21; and the third class beginning Wednesday, July 2 through Oct. 16.

Deary Soldier Completes Army Unit Training

Army Pvt. Damien J. Greenwell has graduated from One Station Unit Training (OSUT) at Fort Knox, Radcliff, Ky. The training combines basic military training and advanced individual training.

The first eight weeks of initial entry training (IET) include drill and ceremonies, weapons, map reading, tactics, military courtesy, military justice, first aid, and Army history and traditions.

During the advanced individual training (AIT), soldiers learn to serve as a member of an armor unit in defensive and offensive combat operations. In addition to basic combat training, the soldier was taught to drive the armored weapon, load and fire the weaponry, perform ammunition supply duties, and to process intelligence and operations data.

Tigers Top Troy 54-51 To Win State Championship

The Kendrick Tigers and Troy Trojans played against each other six times this season—Kendrick won three games and Troy won three. But the girls from KHS won the game that really counted Saturday afternoon at the Idaho Center in Nampa when the Tigers edged out Troy 54-51 to claim the 1996-97 State Class A-4 championship. They won in the usual Troy-Kendrick match manner: a close, hotly contested game that was in doubt until the final buzzer. This was Kendrick's second state title, their first was in 1983. The Trojans were Dist. champions. The Tigers were the second place team—but not last Saturday when they won all the marbles.

The Road to the Championship
Coach Lisa Wolff, who was on the 1983 championship team, and her Tigers played four games in four nights on their way to the title. Wednesday night in the opening session the Tigers simply blew away

Garden Valley 67-28, jumping out to a 12-2 lead and eventually building it to a 32-15 halftime advantage. Coach Wolff emptied the bench in the second half but still went on a 33-6 win to overwhelm Garden Valley. Kendrick's Ferris Dudunake hit the opening shot of that game, a three-pointer on her first shot. She went on to hit two more and finished the game with 19 points. Kendrick also got strong offensive help from Alyssa Heier who scored 13 points.

Tigers Win it All

Two teams who could have been champions in any class Idaho basketball this year clashed for the sixth time this season and, as Coach Lisa Wolff predicted, it was Kendrick's turn to win. And win they did; the Kendrick Tigers defeated the Troy Trojans, last year's defending state champion, 54-51 at Nampa Saturday night to win the 1997 Class A-4 Idaho State girls' basketball championship. Troy and Kendrick had played each other five times this season with Troy winning three times and Kendrick twice. Neither had won by more than four points and two times the margin was two points. This final and all-important game would be no different.

Kendrick raced out to an early lead, outscoring the Trojans 19-7 in the first quarter. But the Trojans weren't about to fold under pressure and snapped back in the second quarter to score 12 points while the Tigers hit for 13. The half ended 32-19. But no lead is safe when the Trojans and Tigers battle and Troy rallied in the third period and at one point in the third went on a 17-4 run that tied the game. Troy led 41-39 at the end of the third.

Just as Troy never quit, Kendrick wouldn't either. The contest saw-sawed back and forth in the final quarter. Troy led by as much as two points, and with 1:12 left in the game Kendrick led 50-45. With 34 seconds remaining Troy cut Kendrick's lead to 52-51. With 34 seconds remaining.

With less than 10 second, Dudunake hit two free throws for the final margin. Two last gasp free throws by the Trojans bounced high off the rim and Kendrick won its game and the title.

(Parent says): "Stop picking on your brother. How many times have I told you not to do that? Now look what you've done. You've made him cry again. I am sick and tired of this. Do you hear me? There is going to be no more teasing, and I mean it! Are listening to me?"

(Child thinks): Boy, is it ever easy to get Mom to pay attention to me, even when she's on the phone. It kind of bothers me how she lets me torture Billy. It sort of makes me wonder if I'm safe. If she doesn't protect Billy from me, do you think she could protect me from something really scary?

(Parent says): "We are already 10 minutes late. Haven't I told you to pick up your toys? Come on, we are going to be late for the movie. You guys are no help at all. You just make messes, and I clean them myself. Just get out of the way."

(Child thinks): It's easy to make Mom clean up for me. I just wait or the last minute and she'll always clean up. No problem for me.

(Parent says): "Johnny, you're not wearing your bike helmet again. How many times have we talked about this? You should know how important it is for you to wear a helmet. Do I need to remind you every day?"

(Child thinks): Mom is willing to put an awful lot of energy into reminding me. I guess she realizes I just can't remember on my own.

(Parent says): "Don't you talk to me in that tone of voice, young lady. I am your mother, and I expect some respect around here. I will not be screamed at and ordered around by you. Are you listening?"

(Child thinks): Nice red face. It amazes me the range of colors I can cause. In a little while, I think I'll see if I can get her neck all blotchy.

(Parent says): "Have you learned your lesson? How many times have I told you not to jump your bike over the car? Look at that poor knee. Don't worry, Sweetheart. As soon as we get your knee cleaned up, we'll go get you a new bicycle wheel. It sure is wrecked. But, maybe we shouldn't tell Daddy what you did to the hood of the car."

(Child thinks): I'm sure glad Mom knows how to get my stuff fixed.

(Parent says): "That teacher said what to you? Well, I'm calling the principal right now. Don't worry. Daddy's going to take care of this right now. I'm sure those kinds are picking on you."

(Child thinks): My dad will bail me out when I make a problem. I do it myself. It's really my parents' guess it's better than trying to solve job. Besides, it's my word against those other kids anyway.

(Parent says): "How much do I ask? Take out the garbage and make your bed. That's all we ask. But, do you ever do it? No. I have to do it. What's the point in giving you chores at all?"

(Child thinks): Nobody can make me contribute to this family if I don't wish to. All this parental whining certainly does detract from my quality of life. All I have to do to get out of work is put up with a little nagging. I can tune that out easily enough.

(Parent says): "We going to leave Wednesday for a long ski weekend. But let's not tell that to your teacher. Let's say we're going to visit relatives, and we are. Your uncle Ted is going to be there."

(Child thinks): Small lies never hurt anybody, and school can wait. Johnny, we've talked about this.

(Parent says): "Well, I'll just call their parents. It's so mean for those kids to exclude you like that. I don't know why you like those kids anyway."

(Child thinks): I deserve to be treated nicely no matter how I act. But I'm not sure if I know how to make friends.

(Parent says): "Johnny, what is this? What are you boys doing? (Glue in a bag.) This is terrible. And I know they taught you about sniffing at school. Surely you know..."

(Child thinks): Parents always make such a big deal about stuff. I've been sniffing for a year and it hasn't hurt me.

(Parent says): "Is your homework done yet? Come on, show me. You think I like having to check your stupid homework? I'm sick and tired of getting those calls from school."

(Child thinks): I guess I need someone to check my work or else I'd never do it. I only do it to avoid getting hassled.
