## Lloyd Slatter, 83, Dies February 28

Lloyd Slatter, a retired millworker, farmer, horse trainer and cattle rancher, died Friday, February 28, at his Lewiston home of causes related to age. He was 83.

He was born October 19, 1913, at Leland, to Jacob Henry Slatter and Rosa Melvina Rains. He grew up in the Bedrock Canyon area, where he helped on the family ranch and worked for area ranchers and farmers. He was educated through the eighth grade at Leland.

In 1939 he farmed in Mission, Idaho. He married Violet Irene Gaiser July 16, 1945, at Clarkston. They raised seven children while ranching and farming throughout central Idaho.

In 1959 he started what are believed to be the first pony rides in the area during Grangeville Border Days. He also worked as a farrier and broke horses, mules and ponies until he was 81 years of age.

Slatter worked for Potlatch Forests, Inc. at Spalding and Lewiston until retiring in 1976.

He was divorced in 1982.

He married Ethel G. Bamberg Foredyce Feb. 1, 1986 at Lewiston. Slatter enjoyed gardening and often shared produce with family and friends. He enjoyed raising farm animals, especially cattle, for much of his life. He continued to trap coyotes until 1988.

An active dancer until his death, he also enjoyed listening to the area's fiddlers, fishing with his grandchildren, playing cards and hunting. As a young man he excelled at painting.

He is survived by his wife of Lewiston; three sons, Ivan Slatter of Portsmouth, Va., Gene Slatter of Spokane and Leslie Slatter of Clarkston; four daughters, Bonnie Parvi of Kewatin, Minn., Shirley Watson of Asotin, Wanda Diamond of Clarkston and Susan Fauver of Lewiston; one sister, Paulina White of Lewiston; 25 grandchildren; and five great-grandchildren and five great-great-grandchildren. Surviving nieces and nephews include, Anna Hunter of Lenore, Jerry and Ethel Smith of Park, Don Smith of Moscow and Clem Smith of Lewiston.

He was preceded in death by two sisters, Helen Slatter and Eva Slatter Daniels.

A private graveside service was held at Clarkston Vineyard Cemetery prior to the memorial service Tuesday morning at Faith Tabernacle at Lewiston.

Randolph Wallace, 57, a Kendrick native, died Friday, Feb. 28, at the Valley Hospital and Medical Center in Spokane. The cause of death is pending a doctor's certification.

He was born to Glen and Cleo Wallace at Kendrick. He grew up and attended school here, graduating from Kendrick High School in 1958.

He served in the U. S. Navy from 1958 to 1967.

He married Dorothy Lynn Dennler in 1962.

The couple lived in the Spokane area for 27 years and were living at Otis Orchards, Wash., at the time of his death.

He was a construction electrician for 30 years. His projects included Sacred Heart Hospital at Spokane, the Grand Coulee Dam and the Usk Papermill.

He was a member of the Eagles Lodge, Aerie 3433, and the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers No. 73.

He is survived by his wife at the family home in Otis Orchards; a daughter, Teri L. Wallace, also of Otis Orchards; a son, Darrin J. Wallace of Nampa, and two grandchildren.

A memorial service will be held at 1 p. m. Thursday at St. Joseph's Cemetery Chapel at Spokane.

The Cremation Society of Washington is in charge of arrangements.

## Edna I. Bower, 85, Dies March 2

Edna Irene Bower, a longtime Juliaetta-Kendrick resident, died Sunday, March 2, at Gritman Medical Center in Moscow of complications of pneumonia.

She was born May 31, 1911, to Willie and Ella Belle Gurnsey Jones at Southwick. The family moved to Pomeroy when she was 15.

She married Lloyd Eckman Dec. 25, 1927 at Clarkston. They lived at Southwick, then farmed on Fix Ridge two miles west of Juliaetta.

They moved to Yakima in 1929 and returned to the Kendrick-Juliaetta area in 1937. They lived on American Ridge near Kendrick until 1948, then moved into Juliaetta. She worked as a cook and custodian for the Juliaetta Elementary School from 1951 to 1967.

Her husband died in 1964.

She married James Bower in Lewiston in June, 1969. They farmed at Avon, near Deary, then moved to Juliaetta in 1973.

They lived at the Royal Plaza Retirement Center at Lewiston from 1994 until June 1995, when they moved in with their daughter, Linda Horning, at Deary.

She was a charter member of the Kendrick Golden Sunset Senior Citizens, active since 1973. She attended the Juliaetta Community Church and the Deary Community Church.

She enjoyed fishing and picking huckleberries. She also enjoyed participating in the steelhead derby, and caught winning fish several times.

She is survived by her husband and daughter at Deary; a son, Leonard Eckman of Orofino; a stepson, Lester Eckman of Clarkston; a stepbrother, Norman Donaldson of Colville, Wash.; a foster sister, Anna Fairfield of Lewiston; five grandchildren; five great-grandchildren; and three great-great-grandchildren.

A stepson, Lawrence Eckman, and a sister, Bertha Tschantz, died previously.

The funeral will be held at 11 a. m. Thursday at Short's Funeral Chapel at Moscow with the Rev. Steve Harris officiating. Burial will be at the Avon Cemetery near Deary.

## Hidden Messages From Parents

(Part 2 of a 2-part Article)

(Parent says): "Are you sure Jimmy's parents will be there? Of course, I trust you. Yes, dear. Just call me in the morning and let me know what time you'll be home."

(Child thinks): Gosh, it's so easy. This will be the greatest party yet. It sort of bothers me, though. I wonder why none of the parents call to check. I can't believe our parents are so out of it, naive. Maybe sex, drugs and rock'n'roll are just a part of growing up.

(Parent says): "I love you, Sweetheart. Please be careful. I'm kind of nervous about you going on Spring Break with your friends. Promise me you'll be careful."

(Child thinks): Freedom, baby. I can do anything I want.  
(Parent says): "Calm down down. Don't worry. We'll take care of it. Dad has already contacted the lawyer. It was just a little bit of dope, and I know it wasn't yours. It could have been anybody who left it in your car. We're not going to let any felony get on your record."

(Child thinks): Cool. I could never afford Johnny Cochran on my own, but Mom and Dad can. I'll get out of this mess just like I always have.

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How sad when kids grow up over-protected out of loving intention, and learn to assume that someone will always protect them from the consequences of bad decisions and real life. Here are a few ideas to help you avoid this path:

1. As much as possible (not when it's life-threatening), give your children reasonable choices or allow them to solve their own problems. Practice saying, "That is a tough problem. What are you going to do?"

2. Let your kids feel the consequences of their action. If they choose not to eat a healthy meal, let them wait with a little hunger for the next. If they lose your trust, help them regain trust before you offer it freely again.

3. Avoid fighting words and use enforceable statements. You might try screaming, "You will not talk to me with that snotty tone. I am your parent and you will treat me with respect. Wipe that look off your face right now!"

Or you might say softly, "I'll be glad to talk to you about this when your voice is as soft and calm as mine."

4. Let your words be golden. There is little benefit to arguing with and screaming at your kids. If you say, "Everyone who wants to ride with me to the park, please be in the car in 10 minutes," have a plan and stick to it. Your 2-year-old may need a bit of extra help until she learns to tell time, but your 6-year-old does not need a reminder.

Some of you may someday say, "I'll be glad to let you use my car again when I no longer have to worry about alcohol use." Let your children use their brains and energy developing a plan to regain trust.

5. Chores. To feel valued, kids need to be valuable to their families. Establish responsibilities for family and household. Help your kids see themselves as contributing
