

## Kendrick Merchants are Struggling To Recover from Last Summer's Road Work

Traffic moves easily through the reconstructed portion of State Highway 3 that forms Kendrick's main street. The street is wider in some places, very smooth and cars and trucks glide right through town. Right through — without interruption — and that is a problem for some local merchants who are finding that potential customers glide right on through Kendrick without stopping to shop. And it hurts. This situation was a topic for discussion at the meeting of the K-J Community Development Association held Thursday noon at First Bank of Pizza in Juliaetta.

Last summer the city welcomed the beginning of the main street project which would remove the

pot holes, removes the bumps and widens the streets. New sidewalks were also part of the plan as well as new water, sewer and drainage lines and better curbs. We got them all! For the most part the streets, sewers, water lines and curbs are working well (a few bugs to be resolved) but it's better than it was — thank you.

But during that summer of torn up streets, sidewalks and problem parking, many people couldn't, or just didn't want to, face the situation that existed. Rather than struggle over the broken sidewalks, going in through rear entrances and dodging holes, a number of customers just headed to Lewiston or Moscow. Make no mistake about it — business was hurt. The small retail merchants especially felt the blow, but even the larger retail and service businesses felt the impact. The problem is they're still feeling it.

Making a trip to "town" can have a snow-balling effect. A trip to Lewiston or Moscow to purchase one particular item may end up in a supermarket and/or clothing store, drug store.

Merchants and business or professional people can't demand patronage or loyalty. It has to be won and freely given. How do you win back customers who have become accustomed to shopping out of town? This is a free country — people may spend shopping dollars where they wish. Realistic store owners know this, but how can they convince shoppers to try the home town first?

Times change, too. It wasn't too many years ago that a trip to town was almost a major undertaking. This is 1997 and many residents in the towns of Juliaetta and Kendrick work in Moscow, Pullman or Lewiston and commute to and from every day. On the way home there are supermarkets and malls. That is deadly for the small merchant back home.

Most people live in small towns by choice. There are advantages here that can't be found in a larger, more populated area. Friendliness, more space, more freedom, more security. Better schools and opportunities for children, and better safety for children. Some things are very difficult to obtain with money. A good atmosphere for raising a family or a child is one of these.

In the coming weeks the Gazette will publish a number of articles concerning small towns, the people and merchants in them and what the problems are and maybe how they can be met. We would appreciate ideas and opinions. Your name will not be used without your approval.

## Kendrick Tree Group Meets, Makes Plans

Interest in preserving, encouraging and protecting trees within the city limits of Kendrick is still evident this week as a newly formed tree committee met Monday night at city hall. The first meeting was held two weeks ago and there was enough interest shown to warrant moving ahead with the project to promote a comprehensive plan.

Present at the Monday meeting were council members Lillian Howerton and Kaye Morey and committee members George Brocke, Dana Magnuson, Bill Roth and Dennis Lukehart. Later in the meeting Lukehart was chosen as committee chairman and Bob Hassoldt was named secretary. It was also decided to name the group the Urban Forestry Committee. A name easily recognized by the state agencies the committee will be dealing with.

It came as a surprise to learn that Kendrick does not, at present, have any ordinance pertaining to trees. It had been assumed that at least there might be older ordinances on the books, but council member Howerton said neither she nor city clerk Lynn Bruce could find any reference to trees. Both committee members Magnuson and Brocke expressed their surprise at this information, as each are former councilmen.

The committee now faces the task of getting organized (this step has already been accomplished); determining what its goals will be and how to achieve them; and begin to draft a proposed ordinance to present to the city council. Council members Morey and Howerton had obtained examples of tree ordinances from other small towns and distributed these that evening.

Lukehart reported that he has already been touched with Michael Bowman, the city forester from Lewiston, who told him he would be pleased to assist Kendrick in any way he could in the formation of an urban forestry program. Efforts will be made to have Bowman present at the next meeting.

It was also agreed that the committee needs much public input on an urban forestry project as it can get in the goal setting phases and the creation of an ordinance that is reasonable, effective and acceptable.

"We need to start making good decisions now," council member Morey told the committee and she reaffirmed the council's desire to help with this project.

It is also realized that getting the public informed and involved is vital to success. To succeed the effort cannot be achieved by a committee and a council. It will take schools, organizations and clubs all working, planning and cooperating.

History has shown that few if any projects truly succeed in the Kendrick and Juliaetta community unless it has the approval, support and knowledge of the community — not just people within the city limits but from those who live outside these limits who consider the towns their homes, too.

The committee will meet again Thursday, April 10 and again Monday, April 21.

## Glen Howerton, 81, Passes March 6

Glen E. Howerton, a retired mechanic and longtime Juliaetta resident, died of pneumonia Thursday, March 6, at St. Joseph Regional Medical Center in Lewiston. He was 81.

He was born March 20, 1915, to Frank E. and Maggie Skelton Howerton at Lookout, near Reubens.

He attended schools there and at Forest, south of Winchester.

He worked for ranchers on the Salmon River during his teens and packed supplies to hunters in the Lochsa and Selway area by horse.

He worked for the Civilian Conservation Corps in 1934 and 1935 and for Potlatch Forests Inc. at Headquarters, Idaho, from 1937 to 1942.

He married Elizabeth Heese Dehning December 16, 1942, at Lewiston.

He served in the U. S. Navy for four years during the World War II on the USS Alcor and USS Pilot.

He was a machinist's mate 2nd class and a petty officer. He was discharged in 1945.

He and his wife lived at Lewiston until 1947, when they moved to Pierce.

They moved to Lookout in 1952, then to Lewiston in 1959. In 1965 they moved to Juliaetta, where they had lived since.

He retired from Fleming Equipment at Kendrick and was a mechanic with several area shops during his career.

He patented and invented a locking gun rack for all types of vehicles in 1972.

He was a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the American Legion and the National Rifle Assoc.

He enjoyed crafting leather, building remote control model airplanes, fishing and hunting. He was also an airplane pilot.

He is survived by three daughters, Lorraine Wood of Deary and Glenda Kress and Linda Nelson, both of Lewiston; a son, Steve Howerton of Juliaetta; three brothers, William Howerton of White Bird and Garold (Pat) Hoerton and Kenneth (Mike) Hoerton, both of Kamiah; three sisters, Velma (Peggy) Kunze of Lewiston, Delores Harrington of Kamiah and Maxine (Rusty) Stickney of Culdesac; 11 grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren.

He was preceded in death by two sisters, Betty Randall and Myrtle McKenzie, and a brother, Lavern Howerton.

Services were Tuesday morning at Malcom's Brower-Wann Memorial Chapel at Lewiston with the Rev. John Blom of Troy officiating.
