Property Tax Reductions Are Available for Some

Less than 60 percent of homeowners who qualify for Idaho property tax reduction are taking advantage of the opportunity, according to State Tax Commission estimates.

"That means thousands of eligible Idaho homeowners are missing out on a chance for property tax relief," said Sandy Bowens, who coordinates the Property Tax Reduction (Circuit Breaker) Program for the Tax Commission.

To qualify for 1997 property tax reduction, an applicant must be in one of the following categories as of January 1, 1997:

- * Age 65 or older
- * Widow(er) of any age
- * Blind
- * Child under 18 with only one parent
- * Former prisoner of war or hostage
- * Veteran with at least 10% percent service-connected disability or receiving VA pension for a non-service-connected disability
- * Disabled as recognized by the Social Security Administration, Railroad Retirement Board, or Federal Civil Service.

In addition, qualified homeowners must have no more than \$18,380 in household income (after deducting medical expenses) for 1996.

Applications are available from the county assessor and must be filed no later than April 15, 1997. A new application must be filed each year a homeowner is eligible for the benefit.

Optional Forms of County Govern. Meeting Here Apr. 7

The Latah County Optional Forms of County Government Commission will hold a public meeting Monday, April 7 at 7:30 p. m. at the Kendrick City Hall. The Study Commission was appointed in June of 1996 by the Latah County Commissioners to analyze the current structure of county government and make recommendations to the Commissioners for changes as provided by state statute. The legislation which outlines the available options was brought about by a constitutional amendment passed by Idaho voters in 1994.

From statehood in 1890 to the present day, county government in Idaho has been composed of nine elected officials . . . three commissioners, clerk, treasurer, assessor, sheriff, prosecutor, and coroner. The optional forms statute permits the presentation of many options, including changing all or some of the elected officers (except the commissioners) to appointed (hired) positions; combining two or more offices in one position; hiring a county manager or electing a county executive; and/or increasing the size of the county commission to five or seven commissioners. Any recommendations of the study commission would be presented to the county commissioners who would then determine whether to accept or amend it for placement on the ballot at the next general election or reject it altogether.
