**Editor:**  
From my point of view, the biggest problem with our local school district is lack of proper funding. Instead of being proud that our supplemental levies are the lowest around we should be ashamed of the lack of meaningful local support that this illustrates.

There is no doubt that the current system based on property taxes is unfair to farmers, especially those who rent or lease their land and get 33% of the income but pay 100% of the taxes. But it is what we have to work with right now until changes can be made for the better.

It is difficult to attract and keep good help in any vocation if you do not pay the going wage, and our teachers and staff are some of the lowest paid around.

Still, we must be doing something right. Our restrooms do not reek of marijuana smoke during class breaks as some do in Clarkston. Violent gangs do not openly terrorize our students as happens in Lewiston. I personally know of three young men who were forced out of Lewiston schools by gangs. If a suspected drug dealer is seen at or near our school, our administration is right on top of it along with local law enforcement. No one shrugs and looks the other way. Anytime my kids have had a problem I have found the staff ready and willing to help, if approached in a friendly manner.

Kids are not afraid to go to school here and parents are not afraid to send them. People do move here to send their kids to our schools, I don't know how many but I know of one family that moved from Lewiston to Juliaetta for this very reason. As for learning, like a lot of other things, how much you get out of it depends on how much effort you put into it. Our administration is doing the best they can with what they have to work with. If you want improvement in our schools then vote for more funding for them, it is after all an investment in our future.
