Some thoughts on snopping locally.

Last month while on a shopping trip I stopped at the Safeway store in Moscow and asked for a coupon book. They were happy to give me one and to sell me stuff at the sale prices. Most items I wanted were in stock and in fact there were large stacks of the most popular, fastest selling items. As they like to say at Walmart, "Stack it high and sell it low."

On the way home I stopped at Phill's Family Foods to buy some meat and maybe some sale items, I think they have the best meat dept. around and the best deli too, this store is always nice and clean, much more so than the other local grocery store. Anyway, I asked for a coupon book and I got a bunch of guff about didn't I get one in the mail (I did) and they were one to a customer. Well, finally I was given a book, even though they "weren't supposed to give one to anyone who received one in the mail." As the employee handed me the book they kind of looked around to be sure the owners didn't see them and I wished I hadn't even asked since I didn't want them to catch hell for something so innocent as giving a paying customer a coupon book. Most of the things in the book that I wanted to buy were out of stock or unavailable anyway. This seems to happen a lot at this store. Guess they haven't heard of the Walmart method mentioned earlier. Let me be very clear I am not criticizing this particular employee in any way, they were very nice and polite. What I am commenting on is store policy itself and the contrast with the Safeway store policy. It is this remarkable contrast that prompted me to write this.

Where was the vaunted small town friendliness this day? Here I was, that most precious commodity to a retail store, a customer looking to spend money and I was thwarted by No. 1: the store policy against giving out coupon book, and, No. 2 the fact that most of the sale items I wanted were not in stock. There is a lesson to be learned here and this is meant as friendly and constructive comment. If you want to compete with the bigger stores or the store a ways down the road then you must be competitive in every way.

## Spring Burning Advice Given

Spring weather has arrived and brought with it the annual spring cleaning of the home, garden, farms and ranches. The annual ritual often includes debris burning in some form. The warmer temperatures, spring winds and longer days remove moisture from the still brown grass and brush. Fires will often spread rapidly in last year's dry grass and brush before this year's new green growth has arrived, surprising the individual doing the burning.

Some precautions need to be taken to avoid a fast spreading escaped fire. Check the weather forecast for predicted winds and avoid burning under windy conditions. Prepare a fuel break around the perimeter of the area to be burned by removing all flammable material down to bare soil. The necessary width for a fuel break varies from eighteen inches in grass to as much as twenty feet in wheat stubble.

Burning slash and brush in the forest also requires caution and may necessitate a prepared fuel break to help control the burn. Always light the fire on the up hill and/or down wind side of the area to be burned. Stay with the fire until it burns down, and monitor it periodically until all smoke and heat are totally gone from the ashes. The fire is the responsibility of the person doing the burning until it is completely cold.

Be courteous to close neighbors by avoiding smoldering debris piles in the evening hours and consider where the smoke and fire may go before burning.

Closed fire season begins on May 10 in the State of Idaho and burning permits are required in Forest Protective Districts and outside incorporated cities. More information on burning and burning permits for Latah and the northern portion of Nez Perce county may be obtained from the Ponderosa Forest Protective District at 877-1121 and from other forest protective district offices in your area.

 Latah, Nez Perce, and Clearwater Counties, Idaho

**NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN:** That, the annual school election of Kendrick Joint School District No. 283, Latah, Nez Perce, and Clearwater Counties, State of Idaho, will be held on May 20, 1997, and the polls of said election will be open between the hours of 12:00 noon and 8:00 P. M., on said day.

Only those qualified electors residing in Trustee Zone No. 5 may vote for a Zone No. 5 candidate. The purpose of said election shall be to elect one trustee to serve for a period of three years from the date of the election who resides within Trustee Zone No. 5.

Trustee Zone No. 5 is more specifically described as follows:  
**TRUSTEE ZONE NO. 5—Cameron—Leland—Southwick**  
 Nominations of candidates must be filed with the Clerk of the Election not later than 5:00 P. M. on the fifth Friday (Friday, April 18, 1997), preceding the day of election of Trustees. As provided by Idaho Code, Section 33-502A, no write-in vote shall be counted unless a declaration of intent has been filed with the District Clerk indicating that the person desires the office and is legally qualified to assume the duties of school trustee, if elected. The declaration of intent shall be filed not later than five (5) days before the day of the election.

Polling place for Trustee Zone No. 5 shall be at the Cameron Lutheran Church, Cameron, Idaho and the Albert Lawrence home at Southwick, Idaho.

Said election shall be by secret and separate ballot.  
 Absentee voting shall be permitted as provided by Idaho Code, Section 33-406, as amended. Any qualified trustee zone elector who expects to be absent from the District on the day of election or who will be unable, because of physical disability or blindness, to go to the polling place may make written application to the Clerk of the District for a ballot of the kind to be voted on at election, which application shall contain the name of the elector and the elector's present address.
