## Rural Partners to Address Welfare-to-Work Concerns, Business Retention/Expansion

Gem Community team members from Deary, Grangeville, Kendrick-Juliaetta, Kooskia, and Nezperce met with Federal and state economic development "providers" at Lewis-Clark State College on Monday this week and shared concerns and plans regarding a number of issues. The Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Association was represented by spokesperson Lillian Howerton, Phyllis Berg, and your reporter.

There was general agreement among those present that politicians including President Clinton, had not thought through the ramifications of the Welfare Reform legislation currently being implemented by the individual states. Of particular concern to the Rural Partners group is the fact that rural communities have neither the jobs nor the training programs necessary.

Faced by a lack of work opportunities and/or job training in rural communities, welfare recipients may have to use the so-called relocation fund option—a program most of the Rural Partners had never heard of. This option allows the welfare recipient to apply for a six months "draw" on their state-administered Federal support and use those funds to relocate to an area where jobs and/or training are available.

It appears that little thought has been given to the problems this would create, both for the rural areas that might see a steep decline in school enrollments and for the already densely populated areas such as Boise. As for local business people providing jobs for welfare-to-work participants, Federal legislation and state implementation give businesses no incentive to cooperate.

A Job Service officer at the meeting reported that state economists are predicting a 2% increase in Idaho's unemployment rate as a result of the welfare-to-work program. Part-time workers in rural communities, including high school youth, are likely to feel the pinch as society tries to take up the slack in the fin-

ancial support of the welfare system.

As for business retention and expansion in small towns, there was agreement among the participants in Monday's discussion that business people and consumer/citizens need to sit down together in an atmosphere of mutual trust and reconciliation and discover first what their common stakes are in having a healthy local economy.

There was agreement, too, that small town business people by and large are reluctant to participate in structured "programs" to improve their lot—and that consumers lack knowledge of the pricing structure constraints placed on small town retail operations. There is a need to move beyond historic resentments and recriminations among the ranks of business people and consumers and to become focused instead on the welfare of the total community served by retail and service businesses.

The Rural Partners group also learned that the personal computer is becoming an increasingly important element in community and economic development efforts. Access to the so-called "home page" of the Idaho Department of Commerce via internet is the latest innovation of Commerce's ongoing efforts to inform, motivate, and assist local communities in improving their economies. The Small Business Administration office at LCSC is also prepared to help individuals in rural communities learn how to "market on the web."

Monday's informative session ended with Rural Partners agreeing to meet every four months with assistance from the Department of Commerce and LCSC's Small Business Administration and Community Development staff. The next meeting is scheduled for September 8 at Lewis-Clark State College and will focus on welfare-to-work issues. Community study leading to recommendations for change is encouraged.

## School Override Levy Vote May 20, Superintendent Answers Queries

On Tuesday, May 20, at the same time voters in Zone 5 will be voting on the Trustee Election between Fred Silflow, incumbent, and Dave Dudunake, voters within Kendrick Jr. School District No. 283 will be asked to approve a \$220,000 Maintenance and Operation Override.

Supt. of Schools Eldon Taylor said he has been asked questions by patrons, and to help understand the levy, has answered a few of the more frequent inquiries here.

Will a \$220,000 Override Levy increase one's property tax for those property owners within the boundaries of Kendrick Jr. School District No. 283?

No. The school board of trustees

froze the override amount for the third year at \$220,000. Maintenance and operations override levies cover such items of the educational program such as books, supplies, school utilities, building maintenance and supplies, employee medical benefits, etc.

## Memories of a wonderful Mother

Mother first came to the ranch near Juliaetta, Idaho when she married my father, a widower with an eleven-year-old daughter, in 1926. She loved pansys and her sisters always remembered her with birthday cards adorned with them. She loved the tree in the lane, her yellow roses, the red one that stood outside her bedroom window. She loved the two big fir trees and her lilac bushes. She loved magazines and reading. Listening to the radio with the windows flung open so she could hear it out to the clothes line,

chicken house and garden. She loved the cottonwood tree and her wooden bench. She loved music and hummed and sang as she rocked all her babies. Her large vegetable garden with an asparagus patch she loved sharing with ladies from town. She loved canning and cherry harvest with all the hustle and bustle. She loved big Sunday dinners and company from all over.

Spring brought the first violets from the canyon floor. New baby chicks and nighttime visits to the brooding houses. We always had new fryers by Fourth of July, new potatoes and creamed new peas. She loved going to dances with my father and putting the babies to sleep on the bed with piles of coats. She loved her little black shoes with a small heel and three eyelets, the same kind she wore all her life from Sears & Roebucks. She loved new dresses and getting a new slip and pocket book every year on her birthday.

She loved hearing about what went on at school as we all tumbled from the pickup to change into our chores clothes and grab a fresh biscuit from the many loaves she made every week. Wash day she would put on a big pan of red beans and ham, set her bread to rise. Dad would start the old green Maytag gas-powered washer and fill her tubs with water. Then he was off to the fields. She loved a pretty wash on the line, also freshly washed and waxed linoleum in the kitchen and living room. She loved the sunrise and the beautiful sunsets, the smell of mown hay, a rain to settle the dust in summer. She loved looking at stars and listening to the birds singing. She taught me the small miracles of everyday life. She loved it when she moved to the John's place on the edge of town and she could send us to Sunday School and go to the Ladies Aid Society at the church. She loved going back to the ranch each spring and clean house and put her geraniums on the window sill after Dad and the boys had batched all winter and fed and milked cows.

She never missed P. T. A. and Grange with Dad.

Most of all she loved the holidays and would prepare months in advance. But most of all she loved my Dad and us kids for 35 years and she loved Timmy, her grandson, very much. She died at age 56 of Bright's disease of the kidneys, very sudden and untimely.

It is very hard to lose a young mother that was the head of a large family. It is something you never get over. Some of us never did.

Her name was Carrie.
