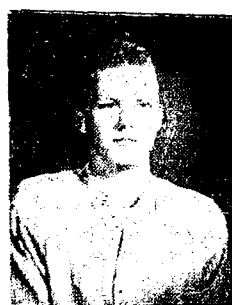

The Kendrick High School Track team ended the '97 season last weekend at the State Track Meet in Boise. Seth Parks jumped his personal best in the long jump (19'x11 1/2"), and finished with a tie for fourth place in State. Parks is only a sophomore this season and is expected to vie for a state championship in the coming years. Seth also qualified for state in the 200 meter dash.

Kendrick's other State qualifier was Tim Fischer in the high jump and 100 meter dash. Fischer (a senior) joined the team with only a month remaining in the season. Although Tim was short in practice time, he proved himself naturally

gifted in jumping and running. He placed first in the high jump and 2nd in the 100 meter dash at districts and was competitive in the State meet.

Other athletes who excelled this year were Jamie Harris (jr.) who placed 4th in the 100 meter dash at district, Tony Cappa (jr.) who finished the 400 meter dash in 56.9 seconds; Daniel Bunch (sophomore) who had a personal best triple jump of 33 feet; Dustin Leras (fresh) who ran a 2:27 800 meter run; Kristy Flatt (sr.) who threw the shot putt 26 feet, and Patrick Hamilton who competed in the sprint events.
