## Sisters Thelma Meyer, Margaret Parks are Festival Grand Marshals

For those greeting sisters Margaret Parks and Thelma Meyer at Kendrick's 37th annual Locust Blossom Festival on Saturday, May 31, a history lesson could be as easily attained as a handshake.

That is because these two women, selected by the Kendrick-Juliaetta Lions Club to be this year's grand marshals for the annual event, represent a significant piece of the area's history that spans back some 80 years.

Meyer, born in 1905, and her sister who was born two years later, spent the first part of their lives in the Arlington, Oregon area where their father ranched and farmed. Along with their parents, Ernest and Otelia Schmidt, the two moved to Kendrick in 1916. Earnest had worked in Kendrick in addition to his time spent in Oregon and decided to move his family here after falling in love with the area.

"My dad worked out in the fields in the summer time for Herman Koepp, and he fell in love with this country," Parks said recently in describing the reason for the change of address.

Their father took a loan on 160 acres of land once his family was moved and the two sisters haven't lived anywhere in that time but Kendrick.

Parks attended Kendrick High School for one year and also went to Spokane for a year of post-secondary education. Her sister, meanwhile, was enrolled at Leland High School for three years. There was no animosity about Parks attending college while her sister did not. According to Meyer, this situation was born out of necessity.

"My dad needed us on the farm, and so one of us went to college and one didn't," she said.

Parks left Spokane early for the same reason.

"They needed me too badly at home," said Parks. "There was a lot of work that always needed to be done and Thelma and I had to help out on the farm."

Remembering the long hours spent on the farm seemed to bring a sense of nostalgia to both women. Lacking machines such as the mod-

ern combine, most farm work was done by hand. Besides the extensive work created by this required manual labor, the family was also kept busy raising a few hundred turkeys and other animals.

Since the family rarely if ever hired outside help for the farm, both Schmidt daughters and their mother helped with these tasks. Additionally, Othelia Schmidt also kept up with tasks around the home, one of which was the arduous process of churning butter by hand.

The summation of this work was a healthy physique according to Parks. "Thelma and I were the hired hands because on 160 acres, dad hardly hired anybody at all," chuckled Parks. "so we were husky. Thelma weighed about 180 pounds and I weighed about 150 pounds. We had some muscles."

This work paid off in other ways as well, especially the armada of turkeys in the mind of Meyer.

"I remember buying a piano with the money we made from the turkeys," she said. "I love music, and it started with that piano."

Both married a few years after arriving in Kendrick, Thelma to Herman Meyer in 1924, and Margaret to Homer Parks in 1928, tying them even closer to the region. Even after both of their husbands passed away, loyalty to the area and the people kept the two women in the area.

Meyer said her relationship with her sister has also been a factor in keeping both women in the area.

"We been together our whole lives and never had any problems," she said. "We never have had a serious (argumentative) talk."

They certainly won't be far apart during Locust Blossom festivities, an event that Parks said she has been to every year since the festival's inception.

When asked why they have been selected as grand marshals, Parks gave what probably represents the definitive answers.

"Usually, they get older people, but usually not two women," Parks said with a laugh. "We're both old-timers and there probably aren't two sisters that have been here (in Kendrick) that long, so maybe that is why they asked us."

## Robert B. Shores is a Grand Marshal For Locust Blossom Festival

Robert Benjamin Shores, affectionately known as "Bobbie" will be one of the Grand Marshals of the 1997 Kendrick Locust Blossom Festival at the 37th annual celebration Saturday, May 31. Mr. Shores, a long-time resident of this area, was chosen by Baker-Lind Post 3913, Veterans of Foreign Wars for the honor.

Bobbie was born April 13, 1913 at Asotin, Washington to Asa and Clydina Shores. His father, (1859-1937), came west from Arkansas to the Lewiston valley and married Clydina Fogarty, (1885-1964), from the Lapwai valley area. To this union five children were born: four boys, Robert, Clarence, Isaiah and Johnnie, and one girl, Beulah. Bobbie and Clarence are the only surviving offspring, with Bobbie still living in the same home into which the family moved when they came to Juliaetta in 1932. Clarence now lives in Colorado.

The Shores children were schooled in various schools on the Camus prairie, Whiskey Creek School near Orofino and at Lapwai. When Bobbie was a young man he worked for area farmers, and then when World War II was the concern of most of our young men he enlisted in the Army. In 1942 after basic training as an infantryman in machine guns, his unit was sent overseas to North Africa and then to India in the so-called CBI, "China-Burma-India" theater of operations as a anti-air-

craft machine gunner. Bobbie remembers that material and equipment were very short, so to implement the meager supplies, the Crown (British government) loaned the U. S. Army the needed weapons until the lines of supply were available to them from the American source.

When the war ended, his unit was sent back to the states to Fort Douglas, Utah where he received his honorable discharge in 1945.

He then came back to his home in Juliaetta where he resides to this day. Bobbie worked again for area farmers, building contractors, in the woods and for many years at the mill in Juliaetta as a fireman/boilertender, and at the age of 84, he still maintains this position. When asked if he had ever married, he responded that he hadn't found the right woman or one that would have him!

In 1956 Bobbie became a Life Member of Baker-Lind Post 3913, Veterans of Foreign Wars and when a work detail, color guard, memorial ceremony or a firing squad mission for a departed comrade is needed Bobbie Shores is there to do his part for the Post, God and Country, and the community.

Bobbie, we salute you. You are a credit to your native American heritage.

## 37th Locust Blossom Festival Saturday

For thirty-seven years Kendrick has been celebrating its Locust Blossom Festival, and so far, no parade has ever been rained out.

Now once again, Kendrick is preparing for its annual celebration on Saturday, May 31. Everyone in the community is hoping that the blossoms on the Locust trees that line Main Street will hang on for the duration of the month. This year's theme is, "The Great Outdoors." The 37th annual Locust Blossom Festival is a family event with something for everyone who is looking for fun and entertainment. A concert, historic slide show, arts and crafts show, vendor booths, demonstrations, 3-on-3 basketball, the "Wacky Duck" race, plus the traditional barbecue dinner, and so much more good 'ole fashioned fun that you can remember.

The day begins with the Locust Blossom Run that features two distance runs: a 5.3 mile and a 2-mile event. Registration starts at 7:15 a. m. Saturday morning and the runs begin at 8:00. With a \$10 entrant's fee the runner receives an official Locust Blossom Festival T-shirt. The 5.3 mile run begins at R&R Homes on Hwy 3, west of Juliaetta. The 2-mile run begins near the Old Swinging Bridge Ranch—look for the signs.

The finish line for both distances is located on Main Street of Kendrick between Abrams Hardware and the TDS Telephone office. T-Shirts may also be purchased the day of the festival at the OldTimers registration booth.

At 10:00 a. m. the Kiddie Parade marches down a newly finished and reconstructed Main Street and the main parade will follow. Children and youth entries always bring a smile to your face with mini-floats, wagons, bikes and an array of pets. The children will be promptly lined up at 9:30 next to the Kendrick Garage on 8th Street. At this time they will be judged and assembled in order to lead the parade. The other entrants will follow the kiddie parade. Don't forget to bring a chair and maybe a hat—there has been known to be sunshine in these parts.

The Main Parade will be led by the Color Guard of the Baker-Lind Post 3913, Veterans of Foreign Wars. This year's Grand Marshals are Margaret Parks and Thelma Meyer (sisters and life-long residents), and Bobbie Shores of Juliaetta. You can meet the Grand Marshals and enjoy a cup of coffee before the parade at the TDS TeleCom office. The annual parade regulars include floats, classic cars & trucks, royalty, horse riding groups, bands, commercial entries and more.

The new grass in the Park will be initiated with the Kiddie races at 10:45. Adults, youth, and children can all enjoy the various vendor booths, including the chance to win a Hells Canyon Jetboat Tour and over 100 other prizes at the Kendrick-Juliaetta Community Development Association's booth. You can also purchase a raffle ticket from a Lions Club member to win one of three big prizes. Prizes that include a night for two at the Best Western in Wallace, a dinner cruise on the Snake River, or a \$50 gift certificate at the First Bank of Pizza.

Eleven o'clock is the big hour as awards will be presented in the park and several other events kick off.

The Arts and Craft Show will be in the Rush Building at 609 East Main. The flower show will be at Grange Hall this year. Next door, between the Grange and the telephone office will be the Show and Shine Collector Car show and there will be a Quilt and Handicraft show at the Methodist Church. The 3-on-3 basketball tourney will be played on 6th Street between the Clinic and the pharmacy. From 11 to 2 a historical slide presentation will be held every half-hour (listen for the sound system to announce the location or this event). For the gambler in you, don't miss the VFW Auxiliary bingo games in the park.

Be sure to buy your official 1997 Locust Blossom Festival button for many of the events and for the BBQ dinner. The buttons are only \$5 each. The famous festival barbecue will be serving nearly 500 pounds of beef, generous amounts of coleslaw, gallons of baked beans, plus pickles, punch and coffee. The barbecue will be served in the park from 11:30 to 1 and over 1,000 are expected to be served. During the lunch diners may listen to the ever-popular "Old Fiddlers in the park. For dessert there will be pie available from the Kendrick Grange's pie booth.

Dance off lunch with a street dance at 1 p. m. in back of the Antelope Inn. Live music will be provided by the band "Riptide" featuring Country, Rock, and Jazz. Jump on a bronco bull (that is a mechanical one, to test your "stuff", which will also be at the Antelope. After lunch is a good time to experience the heritage of the area with a self-guided walking tour of Kendrick and Juliaetta, tour pamphlets are available at various businesses. During the day, the Jr. Miss committee will be selling chances on your favorite duck in the "Wacky Duck Race" which launches at 2:00 at the Bear Creek Bridge out by the high school. One lucky winner will receive the grand prize.

Kendrick's Arbor Day Tree Dedication and rejuvenation of the Urban Forestry planning will be addressed by Mayor Jerry Brown at 2:30 between the Rush Building and Zoe's Cafe. All interested are invited. In the evening there will be live music and dancing in both Kendrick and Juliaetta for the adults who are not too tired.

Writing about all this, and reading it as well, I am sure almost wears one out. You get the point—there is an abundance of fun for all ages at this year's Locust Blossom Festival. It is often difficult to find good, wholesome family entertainment these days, but this weekend you can find it in Kendrick. Weeks have gone into the planning and preparation to make this year's celebration a wonderful experience and no one should miss it!

**Letters to the Editor . . .**

To the Editor:

It may be ill advised to spend five thousand dollars in order to fix up the building currently under consideration for use as a youth center, first of all there is no plumbing to the building or toilet facilities and the idea of renting a Porta-Potty for the young people to utilize sounds as if it could pose a serious health problem, besides what it sounds like is someone is trying to relieve our recreation district of their funds. These are public funds and ought to be used far more prudently! The money would be much better used to purchase a possibly used single-wide mobile home that could be placed adjacent to the high school and used as a youth center there, staffed by professionals we already trust with our youth, possibly people who are working with the school system. I don't think we should entrust the guidance of our youth to just anyone, besides why do they need a "hangout?" many of the young people ought to just try hanging out with their own folks anyway instead of planning to be out on the streets all hours of the night up to no good.

I strongly believe a summer jobs program might be a very good option for our young people, jobs always help them learn responsibility and give them opportunities to earn references.

The folks down at city hall don't seem thrilled with the idea of a youth center with no toilet facilities utilizing a stinky porta-potty for the sanitary facilities.

I would like to see a youth center adjacent to the school staffed by people we all feel good about to have working with our youth, I would like to see it as a permanent facility, possibly a mobile home either single or double wide and in that youth center there could be an office for a youth employment counselor. It would be nice to see this become something for all the youth, not just the teenagers, for the Cub Scouts, 4-H and Campfire kids to have desk space and filing cabinet space. That way these groups that

already work with our youth could have their meetings there.

I would like to see the recreation district funds be carefully administered, and not throw good money after bad to fix up a facility which can never be a permanent facility, there are no sewer connections to that particular building.

This does not happen to be a community of underprivileged youth, the opposite is true. If they are hanging about getting into mischief it is because they are making mischief as a clear choice.

If a youth center is adjunct to or adjacent to the school then sometimes the school facilities can be used, like for shoots and hoops.

It would also be nice to see more open swims for at risk kids this summer and we need to keep supporting our law enforcement, they are working very closely with our youth also.

A teen hangout is not necessarily the answer. A youth guidance center is one thing where kids can go to learn about job opportunities and job corps and education opportunities, if it were near the school then facilities could be combined and resources shared. The school has been in the kids business longer than anyone else in this community. I would hate to start something unless we had something more likely to help young people move in the right direction. I would like to see evening basketball games again this summer for all young people, again the best facilities are already in existence at the school. Why re-invent the wheel?

I oppose any plans for a youth center in the building currently under consideration for very good reasons!

A youth center also needs to have air conditioning, because lots of kids hang out in the streets in the summer just because their homes are too hot! It is my opinion that our schools should have air conditioning. The staff and the students suffer so much during the last hot days at school and in the early fall. Kids can't learn when they are miserable and the staff does the best it can with fans, but our schools should have modern climate control in summer and winter. It is unfortunate

that our schools are afraid to ask for the amount of funds they really need and have to be concerned about whether maintenance levies will be passed. By the way, anyone who wants to check out the budgets of the schools and where they spend the money is welcome to ask to review a copy of the budget at the district office. It's a matter of public record. I can assure you there is no waste!

We could be a lot more supportive of our schools and be grateful that we live in a country where we have the option of public education available to all our citizens. Can you imagine if we had to pay for private education for these kids what it would cost? Our local schools are really very good places to educate our young people. I have lived in countries where everyone does not get an education because it isn't free and the poor have no opportunities to rise above their poverty. This is a wonderful system we have here and I am very proud to be a part of it and I exercise that pride when I vote to support the democracy I believe in. I grew up outside the U. S., for the most part on military bases overseas. I pledged allegiance in a faith to flag of this country, a country I did not remember, but when my father brought me back to the U. S. I found I was a citizen of a really great country and I really don't understand why many people who have lived here all their lives don't vote and also go out and break the laws. Maybe the young people here ought to live in the third world for a while then they could appreciate what we have here a lot more.

I see the problems of the young people in this town and in this country as being because they don't appreciate what they have. They don't know what the alternatives really are. That's sad, really.
